

Dear Friends of St Thomas Aquinas,

As promised, this week I'd like to REVEAL A NEW PARISH PROJECT. This is the "cherry on top" of our Thomas Together Campaign, which has deepened our parish connectivity and engagement. Now it's time to get to work as a community!

The Eucharist is the "source and summit of Christian life," as the Second Vatican Council reminded us. It's the Beating Heart of our community, bringing Jesus' life into his Body every day and night. It is what energizes all our works of love and service to each other.

So I propose this November we raise the funds to build a new, permanent chapel to help us deepen our love for the Eucharist. It will be to the right of the vestibule and hold about one hundred people. I want it to be warm, intimate, and beautiful—a place you can come whenever you want to, alone or with friends and family. We will use it for small Masses, lots of Eucharistic adoration, prayer groups, quiet visits throughout the day or night, and more.



Of course, we'll want it to be a good architectural fit on our southwestern mission style campus. I think it'd be amazing for it to have a similar feel to both our original mission church in Litchfield Park, while paying homage great chapels of the southwest, especially in Santa Fe and California. It'll be as beautiful as we are generous! So please prayerfully consider making a gift to make this chapel a reality. This week, I will personally make the first donation. Then, I hope you'll join me in this wonderful project...and we'll have it done in a matter of months.

There are a few ways to participate in this quick but exciting campaign:

Make a one-time gift through our new PushPay online giving platform, through the website or parish app. Set up a recurring gift through PushPay—many folks are shifting over their diocesan campaign gift to this one. A great idea!

Make a one time gift through the envelopes I'll mail you in a week or two, or use an envelope from the doors of the church.

Stop by the parish office to ask for help to make a donation.

Here's a bonus aspect of this project that is really neat. If we can raise the funds, I'm working on plans to upgrade the altar "reredos" and tabernacle (altar backdrop with the crucifix) and integrate the tabernacle into it. Fr Kieran, my predecessor, used to tell me his dream was to make this key part of the church even more beautiful than it is, but he lacked the funds back in 2003. He wanted the reredos to look like a radiant "doorway to heaven." Let's make that dream a reality!







#### October 30, 2022 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time

Barry had a life sentence in prison for doing unthinkable crimes. He would often remark to the chaplain that he was an atheist and could not bring himself to believe in any "god." When the chaplain asked why, Barry quickly retorted that the book of Genesis speaks of God creating everything and feeling very good about it. God's creation of people and things is beautiful. Barry continued, "If there is a God who creates something and likes what He makes and that God is good, then how could He have created someone as evil as me?" The chaplain fell silent as tears welled up in his eyes. "God loves you too, Barry. The stuff that you did is another matter. God puts His image and likeness in each one of us, in our souls. How can God not love himself?" God cannot despise or hate anything or anyone. He made you. Life hurt you. He is always about unconditional love and mercy. Barry found a glimmer of hope that day and was touched by love.

Zacchaeus met love incarnate in Jesus. He knew there was something special about him, and he had to see Jesus for himself. Realizing and knowing God's unconditional, penetrating love is a game-changer. Sinners don't repulse Jesus, he wants to eat with them! We can often find ourselves conflicted about how God sees us. We want to believe that He loves us, but other tapes playing in our heads convince us that this cannot be true. We carry our sins around like heavy sacks weighing on our shoulders. We are crippled.



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
## GIRD THY LOINS

It's just about Halloween, and Christians around the world should be teeming with excitement to celebrate a beautiful tide of holy days. Unfortunately, that is not the case. Some Christians cower in fear of this holiday, or bunker down with lights off so as to not seem like they are taking part in "spooky season" festivities. Others celebrate the day, but are completely ignorant of its Christian roots. Halloween, unbeknownst to many American Christians, Catholic and Protestant alike, is indeed a Christian holiday and should be celebrated as such. Since Halloween's origins are in the Catholic Church, Catholics should lead the charge in taking it back from the secular and pagan cultures that claim to own this day. Halloween is the Eve of All Saints day, preparing Catholics for the Triduum of Hallowtide. Hallowtide is a three day observance that honors the entire Church - The Church Militant, Suffering, and Triumphant. Starting with "All Hallows Eve" on the evening of October 31st, then All Hallows (Saints) day on November 1st, and finally All Souls day on Nov 2nd. "Hallow" is an old English word for holy (like we say in the Our Father). In the British Isles, English speakers commonly pronounced "All Hallows Eve," as Hallow E'ven or E'en (evening) eventually formulating the slang word "Halloween". When English, Scottish, Irish, and French immigrants started to colonize parts of North America, they brought many old Catholic Halloween festivities with them. However, as tensions grew between Catholics and Protestants, many Protestants seeking their own religious expressions, started to disassociate Christianity with anything remotely Catholic, especially its holidays like Halloween (we see a similar dichotomy with many old English Christmas celebrations as well). Halloween traditions such as trick or treating, carving pumpkins and dressing up in costumes actually come from Old World Catholic-Christian traditions. Sadly, anti-catholic rhetoric claimed that these traditions stemmed from Old World Paganism instead. Fast forward hundreds of years, and now Halloween traditions aren't even recognized as having anything to do with religion, let alone Christianity.

Another common accusation of Halloween's pagan origins is that of the Celtic festival, Samhain (pronounced sau-wihn). This attribution is historically inaccurate as there is virtually no actual historic evidence of Samhain traditions leading to Halloween traditions. 20th century Neo-pagan groups such as Wicca, also try to claim Halloween as their ancient holiday, but in historic reality, it is not. Some protestant groups even accuse Catholics of merging Samhain with All Saints Day. This is vaguely true, but not in a negative sense. All Souls Day was first celebrated in Rome in the 600s when Pope Boniface IV consecrated/converted the Pantheon in Rome to become a Christian Church dedicated to all the Saints and Martyrs, celebrating All Saints on May 13th. Then in the 800s Pope Gregory III moved it to November 1st (possibly to replace any remnants of druidic culture and Samhain in Ireland - yet Ireland was already Christianized for almost 400 years by then). His successor Gregory IV then officially made the holiday universal throughout the Catholic Church. All in all, besides being instituted on the same day, no substantial historic connection to Samhain or other pagan festivals exist.

This Halloween, research some Catholic Hallowtide festivities, and start some new (and old) traditions to celebrate these solemn feast days, where we honor the heroes in heaven, our faithful departed, and reflect on our own coming death - and the hope that we have for eternal life in Christ Jesus.

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
