THE BAPTISM OF JESUS

The Church recognizes three manifestations of Christ's divinity – the adoration of the Magi, the baptism of Jesus, and the first miracle at the wedding in Cana. Even though Jesus has no sin, he receives the baptism from John in order to "fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15). That is to submit to the plan of God for the salvation of mankind. In receiving baptism, Jesus identifies Himself with us sinners.

In Christ's baptism, the mystery of the Trinity is revealed. Heaven is opened, and the Holy Spirit descends upon Jesus, anointing Him as the Christ and empowering Him to bring the Good News of salvation to humanity. The voice of God the Father is heard saying, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well

pleased" (Luke 3:22). The Father gives witness to His Son and tells us to listen to Him. The Father is pleased with Jesus because He does His Father's will and is the perfect image of God the Father.



Like Jesus, we receive baptism. However, many of us may not realize the power of this sacrament, what is done to us, and what we are called to do. In our baptism, the Holy Spirit descends upon us. God's Word is spoken to us through the ministers performing our baptisms. The Trinity is invoked, and we are baptized "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." The effects of our baptisms are the forgiveness of all sins, adoption as children of God, initiation into the Church, bond with other Christians, and the indelible spiritual mark of belonging to Christ.

By virtue of baptism, we are anointed like Jesus and share in His mission as priest, prophet, and king. As priest, let us offer ourselves, our gifts, and sacrifices to God. As prophet, let us spread the Good News and live the Gospel in our families, communities, and the world. As king, let us exercise our leadership in our families, in our ministries, and in our works by our sacrifices and services to better the lives of others. We hope that one day God welcomes us into Heaven, saying "You are my child; with you I am well pleased."

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


For cradle Catholics, baptism may be the most important step on the Christian journey that none of us actually remembers. Which is too bad! After all, the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* instructs us that baptism is "the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit." (#1213) Yes, baptism cleanses us of original sin, but it's much more than that! We need only look to Jesus to see that. Though without sin, Jesus' baptism is a turning point in his life all the same. The Holy Spirit descends upon him and a voice from heaven cries out, "You are my beloved Son." So begins the public ministry, in which Jesus would carry out his Father's saving mission. Through our baptism, at any age, we, too, become God's beloved sons and daughters. Through word and sacrament, Jesus invites us to share in his mission by turning our lives over to our Father as we embrace our Christian journey.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Baptism is often referred to as "the doorway to the Church" because through this sacrament, our sins are forgiven and we are united to Christ and his Church. It is the door which gives access to all the other sacraments. (cf., ccc 1213) At the conclusion, the celebrant asks God to continue to pour out his blessing upon those being baptized, and send his peace to all who are gathered. As baptized Christians, we are now adopted children of God; we are disciples who are empowered, through the wisdom and strength of the Holy Spirit, to share the Good News and help build the kingdom of God on earth. Sound intimidating? It shouldn't. Each day that we "put on Christ" and do his work, God is re-creating us and making us into something far better than we could ever be on our own. Embrace this faith you have been given and go out and share your gifts and talents with others, confident in the Spirit that guides you.

SERVE Think of something you have been told you are very good at by friends or coworkers – something for which you have been "anointed," in a sense. In what way can you do something specific to lead others with care in this area, or perhaps do a very particular good yourself?






Cardinal DiNardo calls Catholics back to Mass in the New Year

We have entered the season of Christmas, the time of the Church year when we focus our meditations and prayers on the great gift of the Incarnation, God taking on human flesh for our redemption. This is a season of hope, a season when we hold fast to the reality that God is faithful.

For nearly two years now, we have lived through the difficulties of the coronavirus pandemic. At the outset of the pandemic, I enacted several protocols for the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy in order to mitigate against the spread of COVID-19 at our parish churches. Over time, I have adjusted some protocols or given discretion for local pastors to use their best judgment.

In the spring of 2020, I decreed a general dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation. I did so in order to instill peace of mind among all the faithful, especially those who would sincerely desire to fulfill their Mass obligations while also harboring serious concerns for contracting the coronavirus.

Just as I have made changes to other protocols, I now announce a change for the dispensation from the Sunday and Holy Day Mass obligation. Effective Jan. 2, 2022, the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, this dispensation is removed for all Catholics within the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston. The faithful should fulfill their Sunday and Holy Day obligations joyfully and conscientiously.

At the same time, I remind everyone that, from the Church's law itself, the obligation to attend Mass on Sunday or a Holy Day of Obligation is not morally binding for those who find it impossible to attend Mass, e.g., due to illness, advanced age, caring for a sick person, or being at high-risk for contracting COVID-19 (cf. Canon, 1248). These persons should fulfill their obligations at home through some act of prayer or meditation upon the sacred scriptures for the Mass of the day.

When there was great uncertainty about the manner of transmitting COVID-19, I suspended the use of holy water in our churches. I have recently directed pastors to resume the use of holy water beginning on Sunday, Jan. 2, 2022.*

May the peace that comes from the Lord Jesus Christ fill your hearts now and always.

Hemos entrado en la temporada de Navidad, el tiempo del año de la Iglesia cuando enfocamos nuestras meditaciones y oraciones en el gran don de la Encarnación, Dios en carne humana para nuestra redención. Esta es una temporada de esperanza, una temporada en la que nos aferramos a la realidad de que Dios es fiel.

Desde hace casi dos años, hemos vivido las dificultades de la pandemia del coronavirus. Al comienzo de la pandemia, promulgé varios protocolos para la celebración de la Sagrada Liturgia con el fin de mitigar la propagación de COVID- 9 en nuestras iglesias parroquiales. Con el tiempo, he ajustado algunos protocolos o he dado discreción para que los pastores locales usen su mejor juicio.

En la primavera de 2020, decreté una dispensación general de la obligación de asistir a la Misa los domingos y días santos de obligación. Lo hice para inculcar la paz mental entre todos los fieles, especialmente aquellos que desearían sinceramente cumplir sus obligaciones de Misa, al tiempo que albergaban serias preocupaciones por contraer el coronavirus.

Así como he hecho cambios a otros protocolos, ahora anuncio un cambio para la dispensación de la obligación de la Misa del Domingo y del Día Santo. A partir del 2 de enero de 2022, la solemnidad de a Epifanía del Señor, esta dispensación es removida para todos los católicos dentro de la Arquidiócesis de Galveston-Houston. Los fieles deben cumplir sus obligaciones del domingo y del día santo con alegría y conciencia.

Al mismo tiempo, recuerdo a todos que, de la propia ley de la Iglesia, la obligación de asistir a la Misa del domingo o a un día santo de obligación no es moralmente vinculante para quienes encuentran imposible asistir a la Misa, por ejemplo, debido a enfermedad, edad avanzada, cuidado de un enfermo, O estar en alto riesgo de contraer COVID-19 (cf Canon, 1248). Estas personas deben cumplir con sus obligaciones en el hogar a través de algún acto de oración o meditación sobre las sagradas escrituras para la Misa del día.

Cuando había gran incertidumbre acerca de la manera de transmitir COVID19, suspendimos el uso del agu a santa en nuestras iglesias. Recientemente he ordenado a los pastores que reanuden el uso del agua santa a partir del domingo 2 de enero de 2022.*

Que la paz que viene del Señor Jesucristo llene sus co razones ahora y siempre.




