





In those days Hannah conceived, and at the end of her term bore a son whom she called Samuel, since she had asked the LORD for him. The next time her husband Elkanah was going up with the rest of his household to offer the customary sacrifice to the LORD and to fulfill his vows, Hannah did not go, explaining to her husband, "Once the child is weaned, I will take him to appear before the LORD and to remain there forever; I will offer him as a perpetual nazirite."

Once Samuel was weaned, Hannah brought him up with her, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour, and a skin of wine, and presented him at the temple of the LORD in Shiloh. After the boy's father had sacrificed the young bull, Hannah, his mother, approached Eli and said: "Pardon, my lord! As you live, my lord, I am the woman who stood near you here, praying to the LORD. I prayed for this child, and the LORD granted my request. Now I, in turn, give him to the LORD; as long as he lives, he shall be dedicated to the LORD." Hannah left Samuel there.



Second Reading

1 John 3:1-2, 21-24

Beloved: See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. And so we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we shall be has not yet been revealed. We do know that when it is revealed we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is.

Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence in God and receive from him whatever we ask, because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him. And his commandment is this: we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as he commanded us. Those who keep his commandments remain in him, and he in them, and the way we know that he remains in us is from the Spirit he gave us.

Each year Jesus' parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, and when he was twelve years old, they went up according to festival custom. Thinking that he was in the caravan, they journeyed for a day and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances, but not finding him, they returned to Jerusalem to look for him. 
I believe in one God, the Father almighty,





Telling Our Stories

A few years ago, a dear pastor friend gave me an icon of the Holy Family and said, "this is for your holy family." It was such a simple gift, but the words rang in my heart, "Yes, my family is a holy family." That was the purpose of our marriage, to love God, to love each other, but through our love we felt called to serve the community of God together. We hoped the "fruit" of our love would extend beyond us one day to our children, either biologically or through adoption, but we also felt called to be "sisters" or "aunties" to our chosen family and members of the church.

At our wedding, the second reading was from Romans 12, in which we were promising to make our marriage an offering of service to God and to the community. Our love was never just for ourselves, but to be shared with our chosen family, the church, the family of God.

"Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another." With these words, we aspired to be people of hope who extended hospitality to the community. As a gay couple, we knew that we'd experience resistance, both in our families and in the church, and yet we want to bless and pray for those who do so. We wanted to weep with those who weep, celebrate with those in joy, we wanted to be a couple who lives the beatitudes not just in our own marriage, but that our love would extend to the community around us.

As I contemplate the Holy Family, I think we tend to sentimentalize families and we make of them idyllic Hallmark movie style families, but that was not reality for the holy family and nor for our own. Mary was an unwed mother, and Joseph was a father who confronts this scandal and wants to send her away quietly; and later on, they became refugees. In the holy family there was real suf-



fering and struggles, yet they trusted in God, they were faithful to God, and they prayed together. Being a family is difficult there are disagreements, hurts, and struggles, but there is also love, mercy, forgiveness, and joy, which become real signs of God's love in the world. God desires to come to us, to be with us in the messiness of our family, we acknowledge that we are not perfect, but God is with us and is manifest in our love.

After I was presented with the icon of the holy family, I began to see Holy Families everywhere: in refugee and immigrant families seeking work to support their families, in unhoused families looking for a safe place to lay their heads at night, in our parishioners, and in our queer families who adopt children, especially in families where the child is "of the flesh" of one of the parents (as Jesus was), and the spouse, like Joseph, raises the child as their own.

Chosen Families

Not all LGBTQ folks are accepted by their birth families. Some have been told to get out and never come back. Some have been shunned not only by their parents, but also siblings and their entire extended family. Some parents have refused to acknowledge a beloved partner. Sometimes, family invitations continue, but the partner is specifically excluded. LGBTQ weddings can be ignored or seen as sinful. Funerals are especially painful when the deceased's family refuses to acknowledge a gay spouse or partner.


In the midst of judgment and rejection by families of origin, the desire for loving and welcoming families is very real and important. Hence, the concept of "chosen families." A friend told me "It's pretty simple. I choose to celebrate with people who love and accept me. People I like, who are like me. Gay people can pick who we want for family. I bet lots of people wish they could do that."

Chosen family does not mean substitute family. Chosen families are committed to each other, build their own traditions and ways of celebrating. Chosen families are all about love.

A friend I worked with told me about spending Thanksgivings with his chosen family in a house in the Alpine Lakes near Leavenworth. Together, they baked pies and rolls and cooked a turkey dinner with each one making his favorite side dish. They had leftovers to last through the weekend and hiked for hours. He told me about this the week after their 9th annual Thanksgiving in the mountains.

A group of friends I knew (a gay male couple, a lesbian couple and a straight couple) became each other's chosen local family. Each had loving family elsewhere but they celebrated holidays together at each other's homes. They explored the Northwest (Mt. St. Helens, the Olympic Coast, Port Townsend), cooking together, taking long walks, and always a big puzzle going on the dining table. They were part of each other's weddings - gay and straight - and saw each other through joy and sorrow, jobs and children, illness and death.

Holidays are about celebrating with family. All kinds of families- extended traditional families, nuclear families, blended families, chosen families, adopted families. All are part of God's family. All are children of God.


