


Profile of the Saints St. Aloysius Gonzaga

History:

Well-known and revered, St. Aloysius Gonzaga was born in 1568 in northern Italy. His parents were members of royal courts in Italy and Spain, and Aloysius was the oldest son of this wealthy family. Despite his family's desire for a decorated military career, Aloysius began to dedicate himself to prayer at a young age of 7. He would have regular and close contact with other notable saints (St. Charles Borromeo and St. Robert Bellarmine, his spiritual director). Because of his family's stature, his exposure to the royalty and wealthy people revealed lifestyles of lust, greed, and deceit. Aloysius felt compelled to find a life of virtue and reject the lifestyle around him. While ill, Aloysius read a book about Jesuit missionaries and committed to joining the Jesuits. His father wanted him to maintain the role attributable to their stature and attempted to immerse Aloysius in the ruling class. He went to great lengths to encourage Aloysius to remain within the court. Once clear Aloysius would not change his mind, his father acquiesced and allowed Aloysius to join the novitiate in Rome. Aloysius struggled to find balance because he so frequently retreated to prayer. Knowing he had a privileged life, and believing he would die young, Aloysius committed his time to service and prayer. In 1591, Aloysius helped patients hospitalized from a plague. While he recovered from the brink of death, Aloysius remained weak for months. It was later revealed to him that he would die on the feast of Corpus Christi, which he did at the age of 23.

Reflection:

St. Aloysius Gonzaga leads the example of conviction. He knew his life was intended for a greater purpose - a calling of service. In reflection of St. Aloysius' work, we quickly focus on his commitment to young people, his early death, and his dedication to serving the sick. But his early life, his holy defiance to the "norm" may provide us the most relevant guidance in today's chaotic modern world. We face so many outside pressures telling us what to do next: "here is the program; get on board." And sometimes that works. Looking at St. Aloysius, however, we should find motivation to look within - how can we hear God calling us to buck the norm? Where is God pushing us to go next, even if off the beaten path. How can we reject the comforts of our life in ways that bring us closer to God? We pray, St. Aloysius Gonzaga, help us to follow God's plan for us, even if we envisioned something different for ourselves. Amen.



Saint Vincent de Paul

Blessed Frederic Ozanam, Who, motivated by a student's challenge regarding the role of Christianity in helping the poor, founded the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, in 1832. Through the society, volunteers serve millions of disadvantaged people around the globe. SVdP provides essential services like food, housing assistance, and

care for the poor. Frederic recognized and responded to the needs around him, promoting acts of

generosity and service that fit each person's individual circumstances, while going on home visits and inviting prayer for guidance in sharing blessings with others.

Every month, we distribute between \$9,000 and \$11,000, and with more resources, our impact could grow even further. Each week is different in the number of individuals and families we serve.

In the last week in May we touch the lives of around 82 individuals and families. Just this past week, we had the privilege of helping a dedicated mom with four children restore their water supply, showing that together, we can make a difference.

Anointing of the Sick

Contrary to belief, an anointing is not just for those who are actively dying. One can receive an anointing if they are severely ill, are about to have surgery, are actively dying or any other emergency circumstances. Although we know that it is not always possible to give ample notice for an anointing, if possible we ask to not wait until the last minute so we can ensure priests are able to make it in time. If you are in need of an anointing please call Cathy at 253–564–5185 ext. 3011. If you are in need of an anointing for someone who is actively dying (outside office hours), please call the emergency line at 253–564–5185 and press 3.

Attending Saturday or Sunday Mass and need an anointing? No problem. Fr. Michael and Fr. Marc welcome you to be anointed after any Mass! Just stand/sit by the Baptismal font and they will meet you after Mass.
