FROM THE DESK OF FR. RANDY GUARINO

Dearly Beloved Parishioners of St. Joseph (Sequim), Queen of Angels (Port Angeles), St. Anne (Forks) and St. Thomas (Clallam Bay),

Greetings of Love and Peace!

As we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, I would like to begin this Christmas message by asking a question, "Is there anything good in this Pandemic? Faced with the social and economic challenges posed by COVID-19, we take a moment of silence to reflect on the meaning of our situation - a crisis, which I believe is a necessary moment in the history of individuals and society."

I remember my professor in one of our classes in Biblical Studies when he talked about crisis. And this could either be socio-economic, socio-political, psycho-spiritual or health-crisis. Crisis is from the Greek word "*krino*" which means to pick out, choose or decide. In our situation, we are in a crucial stage or turning point in our lives where we have to make a decision or choose something or offer a solution to correct our way of life regardless of the crisis we're going through.

Those of us who fail to view a crisis in the light of the Gospel simply perform an autopsy on a cadaver as the Holy Father said. If we can recover the courage and humility to admit that a time of crisis is a time of the Spirit, whenever we are faced with the experience of darkness, weakness, vulnerability, contradiction and loss, we will no longer feel over-whelmed. He added that when a crisis arises, the fresh perspective it brings is never opposed to what came before, but it is a newness "that springs from the old and makes it continually fruitful."

Behold, I am making all things new. But are we able to recognize that? We are, if we only listen and see the signs of hope that He is bringing. And we have to understand that newness, for it cannot be like the old normal. It cannot be as it was in the beginning. God is certainly recreating something new and just as the people who are alive when Jesus was born, they had just expected what scriptures were telling them. And the scriptures were talking about the coming of the Messiah but when the time came not everyone recognized Him that He was the fulfilment of what had been promised because the way He chose to reveal Himself did not match their expectation; it was very different from what they had hoped.

So, the same thing with us. We have our own expectations on how we want God to come, how we want Him to set us free, but God is already doing something new. Our job is to recognize it. But we won't recognize it if we listen with already our own agenda at the back of our minds. We will miss the point and so we need that openness of heart like Mary. She did not expect what happened to her but because she had no other agenda except God's will, her faith enabled her to say "*let it be done unto me according to your word.*" So, the idea of in the minds of the seeming chaos, of seeming disorder, God is already doing something. Can we see it? Can you recognize that something new? And it will always be to further promote the Kingdom, what God understands by the kingdom, how God wants to invite us to this Kingdom. Just as a seed dies in order to grow, in a crisis we see an end, while at the same time, in that end a new beginning is taking shape.

In this sense, our unwillingness to enter into crisis and to let ourselves be led by the Spirit in times of trial condemns us to remaining miserable and fruitless. "In the witness of our faith, we should not fear nor should we deny everything in ourselves and in our communities that is evidently tainted by sin and death and calls for conversion."

Everything evil, wrong, weak and unhealthy that comes to light in this time of crisis serves as a forceful reminder of our need to die to our false selves as way of living, thinking and acting that does not reflect the Gospel for it is only by dying "to a certain mentality" that we as a Church will be able to "make room for that newness that the Spirit constantly awakens in the heart of the Church."

Let no one willfully hinder the work that the Lord is accomplishing at this moment for He is bringing us goodness and light and let us ask for the gift to serve Him in humility, so we can say out loud with John the Baptist "that He may increase, and I may decrease."

So, from me, to you and your entire family, may you have a prayerful holy day celebration. Merry Christmas and a Blessed Happy New Year!

SUNDAY DEVOTIONS | A MEDITATION ON NEXT WEEK'S MASS READINGS

Jan. 9, 2021 | Baptism of the Lord

First Reading— The opening of Second Isaiah was written during the Babylonian Exile, when the morale of the Judeans was shattered by the loss of the Jerusalem Temple, the deportation of the people, and the termination of their king. They had suffered greatly for their failure to keep covenant with God, even thinking that God had abandoned them entirely. Here God is telling the heavenly assembly to convince Israel that God has not abandoned Israel, that God recognizes the enormity of their sorrow for their unfaithfulness, and that they are now purified of their sin. *[Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11]*

Responsorial Psalm—"O bless the Lord, my soul." [Psalm 104]

Second Reading— This reading is a teaching on right behavior within the family and the family's interactions with other parts of society. Thus, the Christian believer's rationale for right behavior should be Jesus Himself, who redeemed us, that is, bought us back, from lawlessness and purified us as His own. The letter goes on to describe Jesus as God's kindness and love, which comes to us through baptism and the Holy Spirit . [Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-7]

Gospel—Prior to the opening of this reading, John is preaching repentance for the forgiveness of sins. We are told that crowds are coming to John in the wilderness seeking this forgiveness, and he gives them advice about how to demonstrate repentance: share what you have and be ethical in business and law.

John's message made many in the crowds excited, and **all** were thinking that he might be the messiah or the "anointed" of God. Therefore, John addresses all. "**All**" is such a small word, but it is so important here. It indicates that the message of repentance for the forgiveness of sin is intended for Jews and Gentiles tax collectors and soldiers, for everyone!

Luke continues, "After **all** the people had been baptized." Luke presents Jesus as submitting to this baptism, very likely as a way of affirming the continuity between John's ministry and Jesus' ministry to follow. More important is the mention of Jesus at prayer. This is a common theme in Luke's Gospel. Everything Jesus does or says in His ministry is marked by prayer. Here, Jesus' prayer opens the way for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and elicits a heaven-sent affirmation that God takes great pleasure in His beloved Son. [Luke 3:15-16, 21-22]
