The Church Teaches...

The way the modern media works, we could easily find thousands, maybe millions, of books, movies, plays, videos, children's coloring books, and a great number of other publications with all kinds of "information" about Jesus.



Knowing Him, however, by hearsay is a long way from knowing Him personally. That is the issue raised in this week's Gospel (John 10, 14-30).

These verses in John 10 come in reply to a question which a not-so-friendly crowd puts to Jesus. They ask about whether or not He is the Messiah. Refusing to fall into the trap of allowing Himself to be defined by *their* notions of the Messiah, He replies that they could not understand Him because they are not among His sheep, and then He goes on to describe those who *are* His sheep, who are His own.

Notice that John 10 is all about a relationship, a relationship that is (and must be) real, immediate, and ongoing. St. John (who never says anything accidentally or anything that is inconsequential!) is pointing out that it is not enough to know *what Jesus did* in the past. We have to know and experience what He is doing now in His Church, in our parish, in our families, and in our lives day by day. Jesus' personal relationship with us is just like every other relationship: it takes time, and it takes work. It takes a whole lot of listening, a lot of attention, and a lot of presence. This is how we get to know someone, isn't it? Why would it be any different in our relationship with the Lord?

Some of those people in today's Gospel were stuck on *what* Jesus was – without any concern about *who* He was. They wanted to argue about *a* Messiah, He wanted to be their Shepherd. Worth pondering this week: *who* is He, not *what* is He? That comes later. When we get to the point of being truly interested in *who* Jesus is, we will then know *what* He is. The fact is, the people in John 10 didn't want to put in the time and the effort to really know *who* Jesus was. Do we?

- **Finally**, now more than ever, if you are sick in any way or even feeling a little "under the weather," please stay home! Our overriding concern is for *your* good health and the good health of others in the pews.

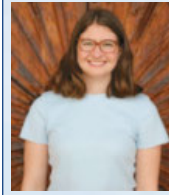
School News—We are excited to share that Holy Cross has hired **new teachers** for the 1st grade and 4th grade positions next year.

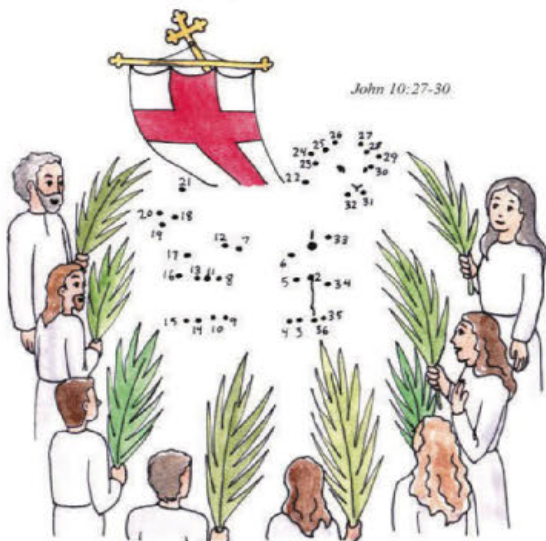

Stewardship: Sheep are funny creatures. They need to be sheared. They need to be fed. They need their hooves trimmed. They don't like to exercise, but they love to eat. They certainly don't like to be alone. Some are friendly, others are timid and standoffish. Most of all, sheep need a shepherd! The shearing, feeding, trimming, and careful watching that sheep need all falls to the shepherd.

Pope Francis, in one of his more famous expressions, has suggested that shepherds need to “smell” like their sheep. Jesus, in today's Gospel, says “My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me.”

There are some good shepherds, and (sadly) some bad shepherds. There is only one *Good Shepherd*. We praise and thank Him for watching over us and caring for us unlike any other shepherd.

There are so many voices we hear in our day-to-day living—are any of them the Lord's voice? Do we ever get so caught up in our own concerns that we forget about our fellow sheep? Do we take seriously our call follow the example of our Good Shepherd and care for one another as He cares for us?

DÍA DE LAS MADRES



Hoy celebramos el Día de las Madres, pero ¡debemos dar gracias a Dios por nuestras madres todos los días! Debemos dar gracias por todos sus sacrificios y amor.

Recordamos hoy que, para los católicos, la maternidad es una vocación, un llamado especial de Jesucristo. Las madres son nuestras primeras maestras sobre la oración, la caridad, y las prácticas de nuestra fe.

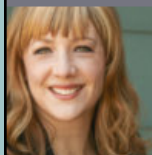

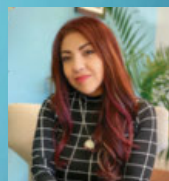
