The Church Teaches...



THREE IN ONE

There is always a risk when we think about and try to find suitable language for God, and so the Feast of the Holy Trinity is a good annual occasion to address that risk and draw us back to the truth that: God is One. Even though our experience of God

has three dimensions, so to speak, we profess at the beginning of every Creed that there is only One God. We begin our prayer reflecting the same: “In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.” **Today**, the Church brings together in a single and solemn Feast the creative, redeeming, and sanctifying work that we celebrate all year round. Trinity Sunday reminds us that the God whom we adore is “one God in the Trinity and the Trinity in unity.” Even more, this truth about God invites us to consider how all of our relationships are reflections of that unique and dynamic relationship that exists within God – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. And the great gift for us is that we are constantly being invited to be part of that relationship, to live in the love of God.

Reflecting on this, the spiritual writer Fr. Henri Nouwen wrote that he was convinced that “most human suffering comes from broken relationships. Anger, jealousy, resentment, and feelings of rejection all find their source in conflict between people who yearn for unity, community, and a deep sense of belonging.”

By rooting our faith in the Holy Trinity we turn all our human relationships into an experience of the Divine. This is why “people of love” are holy, people in love (as in marriage) are sacramental signs of God’s presence and action among us. True loving relationships are creative, redeeming, and sanctifying.

In the end, our celebration of the Most Holy Trinity is an invitation for us to continue to move beyond our selves. The Feast reminds us of the powerful ways that God remains at work in the world: in the ongoing act of creation, in the ongoing gifts of healing and redemption, and the life-giving Spirit that inspires faith, hope, and love. This is something extraordinary to remember and celebrate. In a sense, this is another Feast that never ends!



***Masks are now recommended in the church! We encourage you to keep your masks on while in the church.**

Saturday, June 25th, 2—5pm and Sunday, June 26th, 10am—Noon

The Holy Cross Grounds Committee will be offering “a piece of Holy Cross” to take home for your own garden!

Look for the plant sale tables located on the south side of the church in front of the rose garden. (*There will be signs posted.*) No plant will cost more than \$5.

The following shade & sun perennials will be offered: the *famous* Wissbaum lilies, crocosmia, dahlias, hostas, Japanese anemones, lily of the valley, Solomon’s seal, pulmonaria, and some ground covers.

There will also be some annuals: bachelor buttons, calendulas, cosmos, and zinnias.

The proceeds of this first plant sale will be used to buy a stone bench to place in front of the St. Joseph statue.





The Blessed Trinity

Today we celebrate the feast day of the Blessed Trinity. The word Trinity is a title for God that tells us that He is three Persons in one God.

Before Jesus came, the people didn't know that God was a Trinity. The Israelites knew that there was only one God, but they didn't know very much about Him. Jesus showed the people that there were three Persons in God when He taught them about Himself and the Father and the Holy Spirit.

The three Persons in the Blessed Trinity are all equal but different. We cannot understand this, but we believe it because Jesus taught it. It is one of the Mysteries of our Faith.

What does the Holy Trinity do for us? We know that God the Father made everything and we are intended to go back to Him. The Holy Spirit guides us towards Him, and Jesus is the way.

Every time you make the Sign of the Cross or say the "Glory Be" you are praying to the Blessed Trinity.

Next Week's Readings – June 19th

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi)—

1st Reading: Genesis 14, 18-20 **Psalm:** 110

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 11, 23-26

Gospel: Luke 9, 11b-17



In anticipation of next weekend's Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, ponder this: we rejoice in celebrating the Real Presence of Christ in "the Bread come down from heaven," Holy Communion.

Other food, not the Eucharist, when eaten, becomes a part of our body and that's all. We eat a pear and it becomes part of us. That's all. We do not become a pear. When we consume the Body and Blood of Christ, however, something more happens!

Admittedly, in our usual way of thinking "it's always about us." We like to believe that Christ enters into our flesh and blood and into our being – which is all very true. But that is only half of the Mystery. Around the Table of the Lord, we remember His dying and rising, we celebrate His life, and we enter fully into the Mystery of God's love. Those who eat His flesh and drink His blood are "assimilated" into Jesus and become a part of Him.

What is important to understand, accept, and believe, is the reverse of the example with the pear. There is a great difference between "taking" Communion and "becoming" Communion. We have been stuck far too long in the idea that Communion is something we get or take. It is way more than that, and failing to grasp that truth has left us profoundly impoverished when it comes to appreciating the great gift Jesus offers us – in and through His Body and Blood.

Stewardship—The Feast of the Holy Trinity reminds us that there is so much behind a name. Despite the old jingle, "sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me" – names matter and words matter. In fact, names are powerful and words are powerful. And God's Holy name is all-powerful!

These post-Easter Sundays invite us to reclaim the Lord's Name, for He is the Lord of life. We know full well, however, that the Lord's name is used more and more in our day and age as an expletive – "Oh, my G**! or J**** C****!" These should make our ears hurt and our souls cringe.

How can we reclaim reverence for the Lord's name? We can use it respectfully, lovingly, and joyfully – and exclaim, for example, "O Lord, our God, how wonderful your name in all the earth!" Perhaps we can also follow the lead of our fellow Catholics who regularly bow their heads at the name of Jesus (regardless of where they are or what they are doing). Give it a try! Adopting such a good habit might remind still others of the reverence we have for God's Holy name.

EL EVANGELIO: TRINIDAD



Según la Santa Palabra de Dios, antes que nada, Jesús invita a sus seguidores a vivir como hijos e hijas de un Dios cercano, bueno, y entrañable – al que todos podemos invocar como *Padre querido*.

Lo que caracteriza a este Padre es su bondad y su compasión infinita. Nadie está solo. Todos tenemos un Dios Padre que nos comprende, nos quiere, y nos perdona como nadie.

Jesús nos descubre que este Padre tiene “un proyecto” nacido de su corazón: construir con todos sus hijos e hijas un mundo más humano, más justo, y más solidario. Jesús lo llama “Reino de Dios” e invita a todos a entrar en ese proyecto del Padre buscando una vida más digna para todos – empezando por los más pobres, indefensos, y necesitados.

Al mismo tiempo, Jesús invita a sus seguidores a que confíen también en Él: “No se turbe su corazón. Crean en Dios, crean también en mí.” Él es el Hijo de Dios, imagen viva de su Padre. Sus palabras y sus gestos nos descubren cómo nos quiere el Padre de todos. Por eso, invita a todos a seguirlo. Él nos enseña (y nos enseñará) a vivir con confianza al servicio del proyecto del Padre.

“**Oh Dios**, ayúdanos a entregarnos y comprometernos a favor de los necesitados y a ser en medio de ellos tu señal de unidad, amor, y esperanza, para que verdaderamente vivamos en el nombre tuyo, Padre, y en el de Jesús, tu Hijo, y en el del Espíritu Santo, ahora y por los siglos de los siglos. Amén.”

Junio: Sagrado Corazón

La devoción al Corazón de Jesús ha existido desde los primeros tiempos de la Iglesia, desde que se meditaba en el costado y el Corazón abierto de Jesús, de donde salió sangre y agua. De ese Corazón nació la Iglesia y por ese Corazón se abrieron las puertas del Cielo.



Tradicionalmente, hemos dedicado todo el mes de junio pidiendo la gran misericordia de Jesús:

“**Amor del Corazón de Jesús**, abrásanos. Caridad del Corazón de Jesús, derrámate en nosotros. Fuerza del Corazón de Jesús, sostenenos. Misericordia del Corazón de Jesús, perdónanos. Paciencia del Corazón de Jesús, no te canses de nosotros. Amen.”

PARA REFLEJAR

Nuestra mente humana es demasiado pequeña para abarcar este gran misterio. Pero la Biblia, ya en el Antiguo Testamento, nos muestra que la sabiduría no es mero conocimiento, sino “el arte de la vida,” comprendiendo con el corazón al reflexionar sobre nuestra experiencia vital. EL TIEMPO ORDINARIO



Nombres son muy importantes. Hay mucho detrás de un nombre. A pesar del refrán que dice: “Los palos y las piedras pueden romper mis huesos, pero los nombres nunca me harán daño,” los nombres importan y las palabras importan. En efecto, los nombres son poderosos y las palabras son poderosas. Y ¿el Nombre de Dios? ¡Todopoderoso!

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
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
