

## From Fr. Jose's desk

### *My Soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord*

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

This Sunday, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is a teaching of the Church that at the end of her earthly life, the Virgin Mary was assumed into heaven in body and spirit. On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII proclaimed this as a dogma of our faith: *'For which reason, after we have poured forth prayers of supplication again and again to God, and have invoked the light of the Spirit of Truth, for the glory of Almighty God who has lavished his special affection upon the Virgin Mary, for the honor of her Son, the immortal King of the Ages and the Victor over sin and death, for the increase of the glory of that same august Mother, and for the joy and exultation of the entire Church; by the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and by our own authority, we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory.* (Munificentissimus Deus/ Most Benevolent God 44).

In order to comprehend this truth, we need to look at the beginning of Mary's life. The Church teaches that, from the moment of her conception, Mary was free from original sin. *The Holy Spirit prepared Mary by his grace. It was fitting that the mother of him in whom "the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" (Col 2:9) should herself be "full of grace." She was, by sheer grace, conceived without sin as the most humble of creatures, the most capable of welcoming the inexpressible gift of the Almighty'* (CCC 722). Years later, the angel Gabriel announces that Mary would be the Mother of the Son of God. Her obedient "Yes" would allow God's Plan of Salvation for humanity to come to fruition.

In today's Gospel we hear that Mary goes to visit her relative Elizabeth. This is the beginning of God's Plan of Salvation. Elizabeth recognizes God's gift in Mary: *Blessed are you, who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled.*" With Elizabeth we believe that God has chosen Mary to be the mother of His Son, our Savior. Mary is also our spiritual mother; we love and honor because she is the mother of Jesus and our mother.

Mary is also a model for us in the Christian life. She is the first disciple and the first evangelizer. We, the baptized, are sons and daughters of God, and disciples of Jesus. Mary gives us the example of how-to bring Jesus to the world through the way she brought him to her relative Elizabeth. This is our mission in this world. At the end of our earthly lives, we too will participate in the Resurrection and Glory of Christ our Lord. We sincerely rejoice today because Mary truly is in heaven, not only in spirit, but in her glorified body, in the same definitive manner we will be, when the axiom in our creed is fulfilled: I believe in the resurrection

### *Mi alma proclama la grandeza del Señor*

Estimadas hermanas y hermanos en Cristo:

Este domingo celebramos la Solemnidad de la Asunción de la Santísima Virgen María. La Iglesia enseña que, al término de su vida terrena, la Virgen María subió al cielo en cuerpo y alma. El 1 de noviembre de 1950, El Papa Pio XII proclamó esta verdad como dogma de fe: *'Después de elevar a Dios muchas y reiteradas preces y de invocar la luz del Espíritu de la Verdad, para gloria de Dios omnipotente, que otorgó a la Virgen María su peculiar benevolencia; para honor de su Hijo, Rey inmortal de los siglos y vencedor del pecado y de la muerte; para aumentar la gloria de la misma augusta Madre y gozo y alegría de toda la Iglesia, con la autoridad de nuestro Señor Jesucristo, de los bienaventurados Apóstoles Pedro y Pablo y con la nuestra, pronunciamos, declaramos y definimos ser dogma divinamente revelado, que la Inmaculada Madre de Dios, siempre Virgen María, terminado el curso de su vida terrena fue asunta en cuerpo y alma a la gloria celestial'* (Munificentissimus Deus/ Benevolísimo Dios 44).

Para entender esta verdad hay que ver el comienzo de la vida de la Virgen María. La Iglesia enseña que, desde el momento de su concepción, María fue libre del pecado original. *'El Espíritu Santo preparó a María con su gracia. Convenía que fuese "llena de gracia" la Madre de Aquel en quien "reside toda la plenitud de la divinidad corporalmente" (Col 2, 9). Ella fue concebida sin pecado, por pura gracia, como la más humilde de todas las criaturas, la más capaz de acoger el don inefable del Omnipotente'* (CIC 722). Años más tarde el ángel Gabriel anuncia que María será la Madre del Hijo de Dios. Su 'Sí' obediente hará posible que se realice el Plan de Salvación de Dios para toda la humanidad.

En el evangelio de hoy, escuchamos que la Virgen María visita a su prima Isabel. Este es el comienzo del Plan de Salvación de Dios. Isabel reconoce el don de Dios en la Virgen María, diciendo: *'¡Bendita tú entre las mujeres y bendito el fruto de tu vientre! Dichosa tú, que has creído, porque se cumplirá cuanto te fue anunciado de parte del Señor.'* Junto con Isabel creemos que Dios ha elegido a la Virgen María para ser la Madre de su Hijo, nuestro Salvador. María es también nuestra madre espiritual; la queremos y la veneramos por ser la Madre de Jesús y madre nuestra.

La Virgen María es también nuestro modelo de vida cristiana. Ella es la primera discípula y evangelizadora. Como bautizados, somos hijos e hijas de Dios y discípulos de Jesús. María nos da ejemplo de traer a Jesús al mundo como lo hizo con su prima Isabel. Esta es nuestra misión aquí en el mundo. Al término de nuestra vida terrena participaremos también de la Resurrección y la Gloria de Cristo nuestro Señor. Sentimos hoy la alegría profunda de que María realmente está en el cielo, no sólo con su espíritu, sino con su cuerpo glorificado ya en esta forma definitiva en que también nosotros vamos a ser glorificados, cuando se cumpla ese dogma en nuestro credo: creo en la resurrección de la carne, en la resurrección de los muertos y la vida del mundo futuro. #### 3. Contact Your Vocation Director

In whatever stage of discernment you might be, it is not too early to contact the vocation director of your diocese. Do not be afraid to take this step. You cannot make a diligent discernment without one! It is not possible to discern diocesan priesthood without the diocese, represented by the vocation director and your bishop. Go to the diocesan website and send him an e-mail to begin correspondence. If you want to keep your discussions confidential, tell him. He will respect your desire for confidentiality. He won't send you mail addressed to your home with the diocese's vocation office logo stamped on the corner.



## The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

August 15, 2021

### What is the Assumption?

The first name of this solemnity was the Feast of Mary, Mother of God. Later, its name in the East carried over, the Dormition (or Falling Asleep) of Mary. In the West, it became known as the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

This solemnity celebrates the fact that Mary's Assumption is "a pledge of the future participation of the members of the mystical Body of Christ in the paschal glory of the Risen Christ." It shows that the Lord "reserves a munificent reward for his humble Servant because of her faithful cooperation with the divine plan, which is a destiny of fullness, happiness, glorification of her immaculate soul, her virginal body, perfect configuration to her Risen Son" (Directory, no. 180). The Mass has a proper vigil, and the solemnity replaces the Mass of the day when it occurs on a Sunday in Ordinary Time, as is the case this year.

### What does this all mean?

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII declared the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which the Church celebrates every year on August 15. Simply put, the dogma of the Assumption states that at the end of her life, the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken, body and soul, into Heaven.

While this event isn't reflected in Sacred Scripture, it is clearly part of the Church's earliest observance. In the sixth century, St. John Damascene wrote in one of his sermons, "Your sacred and happy soul, as nature will have it, was separated in death from your most blessed and immaculate body, and although the body was duly interred, it did not remain in the state of death, neither was it dissolved by decay; your most pure and sinless body was not left on earth, but you were transferred to your heavenly throne."

Theologically speaking, death is often understood to be a consequence of original sin. Since Mary was conceived without Original Sin, some theologians have wondered if Mary died or if perhaps she was taken into Heaven without experiencing death. The Catechism of the Catholic Church doesn't answer this question but simply states, "The most blessed Virgin Mary, when the course of her earthly life was completed, was taken up body and soul into the glory of heaven" (no. 974)

The Solemnity of the Assumption reminds us of the unique role that Mary served in the process of our salvation. Although she was without sin, we have the possibility of receiving God's forgiveness for our sins through Christ. Her entry into Heaven prefigures our own hope of experiencing the same eternal life.

Ordinarily, the celebration of the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a holy day of obligation for Catholics, but when it falls on a Saturday or a Monday, that obligation to attend Mass is lifted.
