See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. And so we are. (1 Jn 3:1)





Saint of the Week

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. A man filled with grace and power, he worked great wonders among the people. Some Jews debated with St. Stephen but could not match his wisdom and spirit. Eventually, a charge of blasphemy was brought up against him, and the local population demanded that he be tried and sentenced. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

Despite the danger he faced, in front of the Sanhedrin and his accusers, St. Stephen gave a long speech about the history of Israel and the blessings that God had given upon His chosen people. He talked about how Israel had become disobedient despite God's abundant mercy. This enraged his accusers, and eventually the crowd dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.

Even in his final moments, St. Stephen displayed great forgiveness and even asked God not to hold the sins of his attackers against them. Hundreds of years after his death, he is still a role model for us to follow.

The Journey of Faith with THE Holy Family

amily is important. Family is that place where the love of God can and should become real for us as we encounter and become God's presence to one another, as we delight in His goodness and many blessings, and as we share in the life and communion of the Trinity. Family is the place where we as individuals become holier; where we choose each day to love God first and others before ourselves. This doesn't just happen on its own, though. Love is a choice-and in families, it is something that must be chosen over and over and over again. Jesus laments the division that will exist within families because of Him-father set against sons and so forth, as some choose to authentically follow Him, and others don't. The Holy Family was only such because each sought the Lord, and together they sought the Lord. And our families can be holy as well-living more and more in the love of God.

Family Prayer

We should always have our individual prayer life. Couples should pray together, placing Christ at the center of their relationship as they ask Him to teach them the way of love. Families should also pray together, truly turning the Lord together and acclaiming Him as King. Families do all sorts of things together. Should not prayer be first and foremost if they want to be in Heaven together?

Family Worship

A few weeks ago, I was talking with my brother about the number of basketball games and practices they have to get kids to each week. It was a crazy number between three nephews and a niece. But they make it work. We make things work that are important to us. If it is true for work, school, leisure, and recreation, how much more so should it be true of our worship?

Heaven is unity with one another in and through unity with God in His presence. Sunday Mass is a foretaste. If a family wants to be together in Heaven, they should begin here and now-in God's presence, to praise and thank Him with the community, and be fed on the Eucharist.

Family Meals

So many find themselves going in so many directions, and they don't spend enough time authentically together. Sitting down together. Literally facing one another. No distractions– no tv, no cell phones. Just each other, and yes, food.

And maybe company. I always enjoy visiting people, joining them for dinner, blessing the house, playing a game, etc.



Invite me over sometime. Meal time can be crazy with littler ones. That is true with my family, too. Its okay. It is beautiful in its own way. Togetherness in real and tangible ways is important.

Family Mission

These things are a part of an identity and vision. Its good to be mindful of that, to name it. Maybe even adopt St. Paul's words today as your own plan for family life:

Put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do. And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection. Colossians 3:12-14

As we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, St. Paul gives us a path of how to live a holy life ourself–a life as the beloved of God. What a beautiful vision of life! How might you as an individual, and as a family, more fully embrace life in Christ?

LITURGY SCHEDULE



A rchbishop Etienne has reinstated the general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of as of December 8, 2021, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary. If you've been away from Mass during the pandemic, we invite you to come back to receive the Eucharist, rebuild community life and renew your commitment to Sunday Mass. If are unable to join us at Mass, there are exceptions to this such as:

• Having underlying conditions, pregnancy, or considered to be in a high-risk category.

• Exhibiting flu-like symptoms.

• Possibly being asymptomatic of a contagious illness (being in close contact with someone who tested positive for a contagious illness such as COVID or influenza, for example).

• Caring for the sick, homebound or infirmed.

• Being 65 years of age or older (per the Centers for Disease Control's recommendation for high-risk individuals).

• Being unable to attend Mass through no fault of your own (i.e. no Mass is offered; you are infirm; or, while wanting to go, you are prevented for some reason you cannot control, such as your ride did not show up).

• Receiving a dispensation from the pastor directly.



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OUR PARISH COMMUNITY

Before Covid, we traditionally had exposition of the Blessed Sacrament on First Fridays. We hope to restore this monthly sacred



tradition on the first Fridays of the month throughout 2022 and beyond. Because the exposed Blessed Sacrament in the monstrance on the altar must never be left alone, it is essential that we have committed persons to cover the hours after Mass (9:30 am -4:30 pm) until Benediction at 4 pm.

A minimum of two persons per hour are necessary for safety reasons and to ensure

coverage. Hopefully, more than two persons per hour will come to spend time with the Lord Jesus Who longs to bless us with His love, mercy and grace.

Ideally, it would be helpful if individual persons volunteered to participate at the same time on each first Friday of the months throughout the year. For example, a person would commit to 10:30 am until 11:30 am each first Friday for the entire year.

The practice of Eucharistic Adoration is a source of many blessings and graces, not only for the persons who spend time with the Lord, but for the parish, the neighborhood, the Church and the world.

I have volunteered to be in charge of scheduling so that the Blessed Sacrament is never left alone while exposed on the altar. If you have any questions or wish to reserve a certain hour for your personal prayer time either for January 7th or for certain months or for all of the 12 months of 2022, please contact me by email or phone, or in person if you see me at church or around the neighborhood.
