Greetings in the Lord!

For two past two Sundays we have reflected on the meaning of discipleship. Briefly, discipleship means following Jesus and doing what he commands his followers to do. This is a long and arduous process that demands many and various acts, beginning with knowing fully who Jesus is, listening to his words, appreciating his deeds and doing his will. The act of knowing Jesus entails a constant openness of self to the continuous revelation of Jesus himself that commences in reading Scriptures, constant study of the teachings of Jesus as transmitted in the Catholic Church and being guided faithfully by the persons whom Jesus gave the authority to hand over his teachings and interpreting the purpose of his will in the world today. Besides knowing Jesus, a follower of Jesus is expected to embody the teachings of Jesus himself. And this is the more difficult part of the process because it demands radical conversion.

The messages of the past Sundays become more relevant in understanding radical conversion. Jesus mentioned that "anyone who would come after me must deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." Conversion begins with the realization that one is truly sinful and the battle begins here because it is so difficult to accept one's sinfulness. Acceptance of one's sinfulness is the second stage in which one who desires to change oneself, leaves behind everything of one's past life of sinfulness and prays for the grace of change. This was the message of the gospel reading last Sunday, when Jesus mentioned that "no one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God." The main reason for this is to emphasize the need to focus oneself on Jesus, his call and the mission that he would be sending his disciples to do.

The fact is that following Jesus is not complete in itself. We are called to follow Jesus, not only to know and do his will but also to be prepared to be sent on a mission. The sending to the mission is what the gospel today speaks about. After appointing the seventy two, he sent them in pairs to a mission, "to every town and place he intended to visit." The purpose of the mission for which the seventy two were sent was to proclaim that the "kingdom of God is at hand." Nevertheless, Jesus cautioned the seventy two that they were being sent like lambs among wolves." For this reason they really had to be dependent on God so that they would "carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals,..." Their dependence on God would also be extended to their expectation of being accepted by the people whom they would greet with peace. Jesus mentioned clearly that they should "stay in the same house and eat and drink what is offered to [them] because they laborer deserves his payment."

I believe that the messages of the past two Sundays are so connected with the message of today's gospel. Conversion from sin and focusing on the person of Jesus would make a disciple truly dependent on Jesus so that with pure intentions he can bring the message of salvation to the mission with nobility of intention and clarity of vision. Each one of us who would like to be disciples of Jesus would enter into a mission in the respective sphere of our lives. The mission today entails disciples who are convinced of their faith; living their faith with joy so that they would be able to bring the message of salvation in the field that is full of wolves, persons who no longer believe in God, follow traditional values and even violently reject God's message and his ministers. Let us pray that we would be ready for this mission now and forever.



Inspiration for the week

The celebration of our country's independence gives us cause to reflect on the gift of freedom. We treasure the liberties our country provides, but are they the real source of freedom? True freedom is a gift given to us by God, not by the world. In fact, the world robs us of freedom by tethering us to a need for money, power, possessions, and prestige as vehicles to success and measures of self-worth. Even though we possess certain liberties, we are held captive by a system that sees no value in the Cross of Christ. It is no wonder Jesus sent his seventy-two disciples into the world with only what they were wearing. The freedom given to us by God is a matter of the heart and requires detachment from the very things we think we cannot do without. A heart secure in God's peace is something no one can take away and something really worth dying for.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Elizabeth was born to Peter III of Aragon and his queen Constantia in 1271. Like most royal girls of the time, she was betrothed at an early age, and was married to King Diniz (or Dinis, English: Denis) at the age of 12. Although her husband's infidelities and life of sin caused much scandal, Elizabeth was a good and pius queen. She attended Mass daily and dedicated her life to helping the poor. She established orphanages and shelters for the homeless. She also founded a convent of Poor Clares at Coimbra, Portugal.

Often called Peacemaker, Elizabeth was from her birth a reconciler of conflict. Her birth brought her father and his estranged father James to peace. Later when her own son and husband came to war out of jealousy, she rode between armies and reconciled the two men.

After King Diniz died in 1325, she went to live as a lay member at the convent of Poor Clares that she had founded. But her fight for peace was not over, she undertook a long ride to keep the army of her son Afonso IV, from fighting that of Alfonso XI of Castile. Although she was successful, she died shortly after from a fever.

Saint Elizabeth was canonized on May 25th, 1625, by Pope Urban VIII. In the United States her memorial has been transferred to 5 July since 4 July is Independence Day, a national holiday.

The father of five children and grandfather to ten (at last count), Judge Conrad hopes that the lessons he learned from More and Fisher might resonate with his family and the readers of this work.

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


LEARN FORMED NOW! CATHOLIC SPIRITUALITY AND BASEBALL

The Inquiry Period for the 2022-2023 R.C.I.A. Year has opened.

If you are an adult looking to learn more about or to be initiated into the Catholic faith, need to prepare for a missed sacrament, or are a lifelong Catholic looking for a refresher course, then the R.C.I.A. can help.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (R.C.I.A.) is the process that welcomes you to join the Catholic faith community and introduces you to the beliefs and practices of the Church. If you are not baptized, the



process leads to the reception of the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. If you are Baptized in another Christian tradition, the process invites you to participate fully in the church through the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist.

During each R.C.I.A. session we spend time answering your questions about the Catholic faith, reviewing the Scripture readings from Mass, and discussing the current chapter in our book. The most important thing is getting your questions answered.
