



LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration of the Week

It sometimes feels like God is silent, like he sets himself apart from us and our struggles on earth. But Jesus reminds us of the fig tree, who can feel the coming of spring deep within itself. In the same intuitive way, we know the voice of God. Listen.

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CHRISTIAN MEDITATION

"A step that each of us has to take as we follow a Christian way of prayer, the first step, is to find ourselves. As St Augustine puts it, 'We must first be restored to ourself and then making of ourself, as it were, a stepping stone, we rise thence to God.' That is, each of us is invited to discover our own inner reality, our own essential being. This is the first step. To many in our society this might seem to be the ultimate goal. But in the experience of prayer, once this first step is taken we are swept beyond ourselves into the infinite mystery that is God. If you consider it, it is hardly surprising. All that is required is that we be ourselves, that we be who we are, and for this what is required is honesty and integrity. And this is simply the essential prerequisite: for the journey beyond, the journey into the otherness of the Other. His absolute integrity can only be encountered by our own integrity. This is of supreme importance because religion can so easily keep honesty at bay. We can be so busy with our rituals, with our rites, that we never take that first step into honesty, integrity, openness. But how can we do this? How can we - weak, fallible creatures that we are - come to this absolute integrity? As we already know, the power, the energy necessary for this journey of discovery is given to us and is to be found within our own hearts. What the practice of Christian prayer teaches us is that we are summoned to the centre and we are summoned from the centre, by the centre." Fr. John Main, OSB.

ST. CECILIA

FEAST DAY

Saint Cecilia's story, like many of the earliest saints', is largely apocryphal and legendary in nature. According to tradition, Cecilia was born to a wealthy and prominent Roman family. Though she had consecrated her virginity to the



Lord, she was married to a man named Valerian. It is said that she was "singing in her heart to the Lord" at her wedding. She confessed her promise of virginity to her new husband revealing that an angel protected her. Valerian would honor her vow only if he too could see the angel. Cecilia told him he would see the angel if he was baptized, which he went to do immediately. When he returned to her, he saw the angel beside her. Cecilia also converted Valerian's brother, Tiburtius.

Unfortunately, it was a turbulent time in Rome for Christians. Valerian and Tiburtius were martyred for burying the bodies of Christians, which was illegal. Cecilia was also targeted for her faith. First authorities attempted to suffocate by locking her in the bath in her home and overheating the room. Some accounts say that she didn't break a sweat and even began to sing. They then sent in an executioner to behead her, but he faltered and was unable to complete his task, only succeeding in mortally wounding her. She remained alive for three days before she died.

The saint's body was exhumed twice, first by Pope Paschal I in 821, then by Cardinal Sfondrato in 1599. Both times her body was found incorrupt, the first saint to exhibit this extremity. St. Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians.

This teaching is grounded in our belief that, through Baptism, we are united with Christ and to one another with bonds that are stronger even than death.

We are called to share the blessings we receive. This is also part of our own journey of growing in holiness.

What are some practical ways we can interact with others that are traumainformed? We can be mindful of what we talk about and how, recognizing that certain topics can trigger a trauma memory. We can also take those topics seriously, refusing to participate in jokes or disrespectful comments. Another thing to consider is how we touch others, even casually or in a friendly manner – we can never know how a well-intentioned hug or pat could be taken by someone who has suffered abuse or trauma. 
