Message from Fr. Francis

Dear Parish Family,

In today's Solemnity of the Ascension we celebrate the moment when Jesus ascended into heaven—not as a farewell, but as a commissioning. As He blesses His disciples and returns to the Father, He entrusts them (and us) with a mission: "Go into all the world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature."

The Ascension is not about Jesus leaving us behind. It's about His continued presence in a new way—through the Holy Spirit, through the Church, and through each one of us. He now calls us to be His witnesses in the world: in our homes, schools, workplaces, and neighborhoods.

Though the disciples may have felt uncertain watching Jesus go, they were not abandoned. We aren't either. We live in the "in-between": Christ has ascended, and we await His return. But in the meantime, we have work to do—bringing His message of love, mercy, and hope to a world in need.


Prayer Request


CHRISTIAN MEDITATION

"One of the first effects of [Christian meditation] is the release of the energies of the unconscious. This process gives rise to two different psychological states: the experience of personal development in the form of spiritual consolation and the experience of human weakness through humiliating selfknowledge. Self-knowledge is the traditional term for the coming to consciousness of the dark side of one's personality. The release of these two kinds of unconscious energies needs to be safeguarded by well-established habits of dedication to God and concern for others. Otherwise, if one enjoys some form of spiritual consolation, one may inflate with pride; or if one feels crushed by the realization of one's spiritual impoverishment, one may collapse into discouragement or even despair. The cultivation of habits of dedication to God and of service to others is the indispensable means of stabilizing the mind in the face of emotionally charged thoughts. whether of self-exaltation or of self -depreciation." Fr. Thomas Keating. OCSO. Open Mind, Open Heart.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained

LECTIO DIVINA

QUESTION:

What is Lectio Divina, and how is it associated with the Benedictine Monastic tradition, whose founder, St. Benedict, we honor on July 11?


ANSWER:

Benedict desired his monks to live in community, praying the Liturgy of the Hours together, contemplating sacred texts, and doing manual labor. The monks developed a technique to facilitate a spiritual and devotional reading of the Bible known as Lectio Divina, the holy reading of a text. This method encourages the reader to hear the biblical text with an open heart and focus on whatever God wants to highlight and then apply it to daily life.

There are variations on Lectio Divina, but essentially, the technique consists of a three-step process of reflection. When the reflection is done with a group, the responses are shared by all the participants. Once the text is selected, it is read meditatively, and the following are then explored: a word or phrase that attracts you; how and where the content of this reading touches your life today; what you believe that God wants you to do during this coming week (month, year, lifetime).

Thanks to Benedict, the Christian community has been gifted with this special way of entering into the biblical text. This week, use the Lectio Divina process on one of the readings for the coming Sunday and make a note of the life connections you are making. How is this reflection on the biblical text drawing you closer to God and others? ©LPi

PRAYER AFTER MEAL

Just as praying before a meal, praying after a meal is meant to inspire in Christians an attitude of thanksgiving and an acknowledgment of our dependence on God.

Though it is a less common practice in the modern world, early Church fathers like Tertullian and St. Jerome extolled the importance of praying after a meal, and the Christian poet Prudentius composed hymns for before and after meals ("ante cibum" and "post cibum").

There are no "official" prayers for after a meal, but the most common one said by Catholics is this: "We give thee thanks, almighty God, for all your

benefits, who lives and reigns forever and ever. And may the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God rest in peace." It is a benediction which recalls our perpetual fellowship with the entire Body of Christ, including those who have passed from this life. ©LPi




