Dear Parish Family,


Today we celebrate the profound mystery of Corpus Christi-the Body and Blood of Christ. At the heart of our Catholic faith is the belief that in the Eucharist, Jesus is truly present: Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. Not symbolically, not metaphorically, but really and substantially.

The Eucharist is not just something we receive, it's Someone we receive. And in receiving Him, we are drawn into an intimate communion with God and with one another. As St. Augustine once said, "Behold what you are; become what you receive." We are the Body of Christ, called to live in unity, sacrifice, and love.

This solemnity reminds us that the Eucharist is both gift and mission. In every Mass, Christ gives Himself completely to us, and then sends us out to be His presence in the world. May we never take this gift for granted. May our reverence at the altar be matched by our love in the streets. And may the Body of Christ strengthen us to become the Church our world so desperately needs today.

Ways to Grow in Devotion to the Most Sacred heart of Jesus

1.Morning Offering: At the beginning of each day, offer your whole day to the Sacred Heart of Jesus in prayer.

2.First Friday Devotion: Attend Mass and receive the Eucharist on the first Friday of every month.

3.Pray the Litany of the Sacred Heart: The Litany contains 33 invocations, one for each year of Jesus' life on Earth.

CHRISTIAN MEDITATION

Here is a common question about Christian meditation that Fr. Thomas Keating provides an answer to:

Question: "I find this practice gets me nowhere. Is it good to try to make the faculties a blank?"

Answer: "Please don't try to make your faculties a blank. That is not healthy or even possible. There should always be a gentle activity present, expressed either by thinking the sacred word or by the simple awareness that you are present to God. The experience of interior silence is the presence of your intention in a very subtle way. You cannot maintain the experience of inner resting in God unless your intention is at work. It may seem like no work because it is so simple. At the same time, this method of prayer takes time to learn and you need not worry about experiencing what you may interpret as a blank once in a while. If you notice that you have a blank, that's a thought; merely return to the sacred word." -Fr. Thomas Keating.

Please join Fr. Francis this Wednesday via Zoom as we listen to a series of talks given by former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams. The series is titled 'The Spirit in the Desert," and it explores the ancient belief that "only in the relations we have with one another can the love and mercy of God appear and become effective." If you're not familiar with Rowan Williams, I find him to be one of the greatest Christian thinkers of our modern time.

SIGN BEFORE THE GOSPEL

QUESTION:

I have been going to Mass for years and have always wondered: why do we make the three signs of the cross before the Gospel?


ANSWER:

Certainly, many people go to Mass or other devotions, doing and saying things out of habit or reverence and not really understanding the reasons behind some of these things. But everything we do has a meaning or purpose that helps us to worship better, proclaim our beliefs, or focus the attention of the people on something that has a greater importance or significance. A review of the meaning of various gestures and practices can help us have a deeper appreciation for what we do.

There is a little prayer that goes with the three crosses before the Gospel: "May the words of the Holy Gospel be on my mind, on my lips and in my heart." In standing to hear the Gospel, we acknowledge that Jesus is present, and the words of the Gospel are addressed to us. All of the gestures and special postures we adopt before the Gospel are intended to help us prepare for hearing the Word as well as act on it. The incense, the Alleluia, the deacon or priest, and the special dialogue and announcement that introduces the Gospel help us focus our attention on the Good News we are about to hear. The three signs of the cross show our desire and good intention to hear and live the Gospel.

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GOSPEL MEDITATION - Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture



A Catholic friend of mine occasionally says, "The Eucharist is not a noun. It's a verb." In so saying, he is making the point that the Eucharist isn't simply Jesus' bodily presence given to us in holy Communion. It also manifests the dynamic pattern by which Christ actively loves and saves us. He teaches us to cooperate with that pattern. This Eucharist actually embodies four verbs: Jesus takes, blesses, breaks, and gives. Let's consider each one.

He **takes**: Do we acknowledge that we are totally in God's hands? Do we receive everything in our lives as a gift, and act responsibly with it?

He **blesses**: Do we actively reflect that Jesus makes us holy in our baptism? Do we embrace our bodies and souls as temples of God, worthy of love, peace, and joy?

He **breaks**: Do we run from failure and disappointment, from getting old or being ignored? Are we too worried about getting hurt or sick? Do we embrace our sufferings with confidence?

He **gives**: Are we willing to make our lives a gift for others? Are we confident that we will always have enough love to give to others, that God will always provide enough for us? Do we rejoice in giving away what we have to others, expecting nothing in return? This is the dynamic life the Eucharist empowers us to live.

Mission for the Week


If God has blessed your family with plenty of food to eat, make sure you also give food to people who are hungry.
