

from the pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

It is hard to believe that our annual parish festival has come and gone! It was an incredible weekend as we gathered as a parish community and beyond to celebrate St. Pius. There was such a positive energy and I was so edified by the observation by many that “there was no drama or negativity.” This reflects how our parish community has evolved. We are a faith community of selfless individuals who put others before themselves and are willing to make sacrifices and work as a team. This is the perfect antidote to disharmony, disunity and narcissism. Joy and optimism were palpable, and I believe this sentiment is a “Thank you!” to all who make St. Pius such a wonderful place to call home. Many thanks to all of those who served on the festival steering committee, chaired booths, prepared incredible food and beverages, performed outstanding music, staffed the bank, volunteered in any way to the success of this amazing parish gathering.

We also celebrated the Solemnity of Corpus Christi last Sunday. Special thanks to the Men’s Club who held the canopy, the one hundred plus parishioners who joined the procession, the volunteers who guided traffic, served as acolytes and who took videos and photos. On Monday, many hands were on deck to put away the festival and clean up. Special thanks to the Men’s Club and our parish staff who worked steadily and very hard to get the campus “back to normal.” As we celebrated our community in a very special way during the festival days, the Eucharist as the central part of why we are here, was also celebrated. I would like to share some reflections from the text I prepared to celebrate this Solemnity.

We gather, in unity, as a community of faith, to celebrate the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, Soul and Divinity, *Corpus Christi*. We believe, by faith, that the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, the apex from which flows every other action and activity of the Church. Unity is an intrinsic part of the action of the Eucharist, and we give thanks and praise to God, through His grace and the Holy Spirit, that we seamlessly come together as the family of St. Pius X. The Second Vatican Council document *Lumen Gentium* expresses this unity so succinctly: “Their work, prayers and apostolic endeavors, their ordinary married and family life, their daily labor, their mental and physical relaxation, all of these become spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. During the celebration of the Eucharist these sacrifices are most lovingly offered to the Father along with the Lord’s body. Thus, as worshippers whose every deed is holy, the lay faithful consecrate the world itself to God.”

Recall at the first Eucharist, Jesus had summoned ordinary men to leave everything behind to come, to see, to follow. The disciples, in their ordinary human condition, came together to celebrate the Feast of Passover with Jesus. This meal of sacrifice, of Jesus lifting the bread and wine - the staples of daily fare in the ancient world - exhorting them to memorialize this sacred meal into the future. Jesus told them that whenever they would gather for a meal, to do it in memory of him.

Queridos hermanos y hermanas,

Había una energía tan positiva y me edificó tanto observar de tantas personas que “no hubo drama ni negatividad”. Este es un reflejo de cómo ha evolucionado nuestra comunidad parroquial. Somos una comunidad de fe de personas desinteresadas que anteponen a los demás a sí mismas y están dispuestas a hacer sacrificios y trabajar en equipo. Este es el antídoto perfecto para la falta de armonía, la desunión y el narcisismo. La alegría y el optimismo eran palpables y creo que este sentimiento es un “Gracias!” a todos los que hacen de San Pío un lugar tan maravilloso al que llamar hogar. Muchas gracias a todos aquellos que sirvieron en el comité directivo del festival, presidieron los stands, prepararon comidas y bebidas increíbles, la música excepcional, trabajaron en el banco y se ofrecieron como voluntarios de cualquier manera para el éxito de esta increíble reunión parroquial.

También celebramos el domingo pasado la Solemnidad del Corpus Christi. Un agradecimiento especial al Club de Hombres que sostuvo el dosel, a los más de cien feligreses que se unieron a la procesión, a los voluntarios que guaron el tráfico, sirvieron como acólitos y tomaron videos y fotografías. El lunes, muchas manos estuvieron en cubierta para guardar y limpiar. Un agradecimiento especial al Club de Hombres y al personal de nuestra parroquia que trabajaron constante y muy duro para que el campus “volviera a la normalidad”. Como celebramos a nuestra comunidad de una manera muy especial los días festivos, también se celebró la Eucaristía como parte central del por qué estamos aquí. Me gustaría compartir algunas reflexiones del texto que preparé para celebrar esta Solemnidad.

Nos reunimos, en unidad, como comunidad de fe, para celebrar la Solemnidad del Cuerpo y Sangre de Jesucristo, Alma y Divinidad, *Corpus Christi*. Creemos, por fe, que la Eucaristía es la fuente y cumbre de nuestra fe, la cúspide de la cual fluye cualquier otra acción y actividad de la Iglesia. La unidad es una parte intrínseca de la acción de la Eucaristía, y damos gracias y alabamos a Dios, a través de su gracia y del Espíritu Santo, porque nos unimos perfectamente como la familia de San Pío X. El documento del Concilio Vaticano II *Lumen Gentium*, expresa esta unidad de manera tan sucinta: “Su trabajo, oraciones y esfuerzos apostólicos, su vida matrimonial y familiar ordinaria, su trabajo diario, su relajación mental y física, todo esto se convierte en sacrificios espirituales aceptables a Dios a través de Jesucristo. Durante la celebración de la Eucaristía estos sacrificios se ofrecen con mucho amor al Padre junto con el cuerpo del Señor. Así, como adoradores cuyas acciones son santas, los fieles laicos consagran el mundo mismo a Dios”.

Recordemos que en la primera Eucaristía Jesús había convocado a los hombres comunes y corrientes a dejar todo atrás para venir, ver, seguir. Los discípulos, en su condición humana ordinaria, se reunieron para celebrar la fiesta de la Pascua con Jesús. En esta comida de sacrificio, Jesús levantó el pan y el vino, los alimentos básicos de la comida diaria en el mundo antiguo, y los exhortó a conmemorar esta comida sagrada en el futuro. Jesús les dijo que siempre que se reunieran para comer, lo hicieran en memoria de él.

Catholic Mass Rules of Etiquette (gentle reminders)

- ◊ Please be considerate - arrive in the church before the Mass begins.
- ◊ Chewing gum? Snacks? Drinks? Never appropriate in a church. This also violates the Eucharist fast.
- ◊ Please turn off or silence your phone prior to the Mass beginning.
- ◊ Dress appropriately for Mass. Kindly remove your hats & caps before the Lord.
- ◊ Be "prayerfully silent", converse after Mass - but join in the singing!
- ◊ The Holy Eucharist is reserved to Catholics who have received First Communion, are in a state of sanctifying grace and have abstained from food & drink for at least one hour. One may come forward and receive a blessing during Holy Communion - please cross your arms over your chest so that the priest will know not to administer Communion. It is also perfectly acceptable to remain in your pew at this time and pray.
- ◊ Wait to leave until the priest exits the church.

There are some essential elements of that first Eucharist which we celebrate today. Before dining with them, Jesus washed their feet. This was a supreme act of humility and service. He was rebuked for confounding the social norm; as the master and teacher, he should have had HIS feet washed. No, Jesus instructed them. A cornerstone of his ministry was to set an example for them (and us) to follow in perpetuity: the first shall be last and the greatest shall be the least. In humbling himself to share in their humanity, Jesus was united with his companions in an intimate way.

In our own surrender, we conform ourselves more closely to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In our desire for authentic discipleship, we practice what we preach and live what we receive in the precious Body of Christ. Thus, we give ever greater credibility to what it means to be a Christian in the world. We pray that in receiving the Body of Christ we inspire those around us in the home, the workplace and schoolhouse, in social gatherings, amidst strangers...that there is truly something redemptive and fundamentally true about our Catholic identity.

St. Oscar Romero, the late Archbishop of San Salvador who was martyred in 1980, offered this critical insight into what it means to be the Body of Christ in a deeply fractured and hurting world and how we can be a beacon of hope and light to those so burdened by the vagaries of life. He said, "Christ founded His Church so that he himself could go on being present in the history of humanity precisely through the group of Christians who make up His Church. The Church is the flesh in which Christ makes present down the ages his own life and personal mission. The Church is the flesh. It is testimony to God's incarnation - God taking on our humanity, coming into our history and sharing our destiny with us."

The Church can be Church only so long as it goes on being the Body of Christ. Its mission will be authentic only so long as it is the mission of Jesus in the new situations, the new circumstances, of history. The criterion that will guide the Church will be neither the approval of, nor the fear of, men and women, no matter how powerful or threatening they may be. It is the Church's duty in history to lend its voice to Christ so that he may speak, its feet so that he may walk in today's world, its hands to build the kingdom, and to offer all its members to take up all that has still to be undergone by Christ.

This insight of St. Oscar Romero is expressed in today's Gospel passage from St. Mark. The Last Supper, in which Jesus instituted the celebration of the Eucharist, was the predicate to the sacrifice of his life for the redemption of our sins. This meal reflected the very essence of Jesus: service and surrender, sacrifice and humility. Jesus gave fully of himself so that the New Covenant could be realized. When we gather to celebrate the Eucharist, we do it in memory of the One who gave his life so we could have life in the Spirit.

St. Thomas Aquinas wrote that "The Eucharist is the sacrament of love: it signifies love, it produces love. The Eucharist is the consummation of the whole spiritual life." May we strive to achieve this reality each day!

Hay algunos elementos esenciales de esa primera Eucaristía que celebramos hoy. Antes de cenar con ellos, Jesús les lavó los pies. Este fue un acto supremo de humildad y servicio. Fue reprendido por confundir la norma social; como maestro y mentor, debería haberle lavado los pies. No, Jesús les ordenó. Una piedra angular de su ministerio fue darles un ejemplo a ellos (y a nosotros) a seguir a perpetuidad: los primeros serán los últimos y los más grandes serán los más pequeños. Al humillarse para compartir su humanidad, Jesús se unió íntimamente a sus compañeros.

En nuestra propia entrega, nos conformamos más estrechamente al Sagrado Corazón de Jesús. En nuestro deseo de un discipulado auténtico, practicamos lo que predicamos y vivimos lo que recibimos en el precioso Cuerpo de Cristo. Así, damos cada vez mayor credibilidad a lo que significa ser cristiano en el mundo. Oramos para que al recibir el Cuerpo de Cristo inspiremos a quienes nos rodean en el hogar, el lugar de trabajo y la escuela, en las reuniones sociales, en medio de extraños... que hay algo verdaderamente redentor y fundamentalmente cierto en nuestra identidad católica.

San Óscar Romero, el difunto arzobispo de San Salvador que fue martirizado en 1980, ofreció esta visión crítica sobre lo que significa ser el Cuerpo de Cristo en un mundo profundamente fracturado y herido y cómo podemos ser un faro de esperanza y luz para aquellos, tan agobiado por los caprichos de la vida. Dijo: "Cristo fundó su Iglesia para que él mismo pudiera seguir estando presente en la historia de la humanidad precisamente a través del grupo de cristianos que componen su Iglesia. La Iglesia es la carne en la que Cristo hace presente a lo largo de los siglos su propia vida y su misión personal. La Iglesia es la carne. Es testimonio de la encarnación de Dios - Dios asumiendo nuestra humanidad, entrando en nuestra historia y compartiendo con nosotros nuestro destino.

La Iglesia sólo puede ser Iglesia mientras siga siendo Cuerpo de Cristo. Su misión sólo será auténtica en la medida en que sea la misión de Jesús en las nuevas situaciones, las nuevas circunstancias de la historia. El criterio que guiará a la Iglesia no será ni la aprobación ni el temor de hombres y mujeres, por poderosos o amenazantes que sean. Es deber de la Iglesia en la historia prestar a Cristo su voz para que hable, sus pies para que camine en el mundo de hoy, sus manos para construir el Reino y ofrecer a todos sus miembros para completar todo lo que aún necesita ser sufrido por Cristo.

Esta intuición de San Óscar Romero se expresa en el pasaje evangélico de hoy de San Marcos. La Última Cena, en la que Jesús instituyó la celebración de la Eucaristía, fue el predicado del sacrificio de su vida por la redención de nuestros pecados. Esta comida reflejó la esencia misma de Jesús: servicio y entrega, sacrificio y humildad. Jesús se entregó plenamente para que la Nueva Alianza se pudiera realizar. Cuando nos reunimos para celebrar la Eucaristía, lo hacemos en memoria de Aquel que dio su vida para que pudiéramos tener vida en el Espíritu.

Santo Tomás de Aquino escribió que "La Eucaristía es el sacramento del amor: significa amor, produce amor. La Eucaristía es la consummación de toda la vida espiritual". ¡Que nos esforcemos cada día por lograr esta realidad!


