Be Imitators of Christ!

The readings of the Mass invite us constantly to reflect on different ways we can imitate Christ in our day-to-day lives. This Sunday's first reading (Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46) and the Gospel (Mark 1:40-45), in common, discuss the disease of leprosy. Specifically, the first reading shows us how lepers were seen and treated in Jesus's time. The lepers were treated with rejection and isolation. Within the context of this isolation and rejection, the leper in the gospel had the courage to go and kneel before Jesus to ask with faith for healing, not minding how the people saw him. The courage of the leper and the compassion of Jesus are points of reflection. Even though the leper was isolated and rejected by his community, he didn't reject himself; rather, he had a steadfast trust in the healing power of God.

We can also face rejection and isolation in the discussion in different ways and levels, especially when we feel that people do not like us or do not appreciate what we do. Do we allow those things to influence us and make us look downcast and lose confidence in ourselves? On the other hand, do we belong to the group that isolates or rejects people because of how they are or understand things? If we want to imitate Christ as St. Paul invites us in the 2nd reading (1 Corinthians 10: 31-11:1), we must live above all kinds of rejection and isolation. We pray that God will always help us remember his love and compassion, especially in the face of isolation and rejection, and equally share the same love and compassion with others. Amen.

Sin and Loneliness

When I was in high school, we read "The Metamorphosis" by Franz Kafka. It's a depressing little novella about a man who (spoiler alert!) turns into a cockroach and dies of neglect, his family gradually ceasing to recognize the creature he has become.

"Never underestimate how badly human beings need touch," our teacher told us. "Without each other, we curl up and die."

Our need for communion with each other is written into our biology — breathing and heart rate of newborns regulates when they lie against the skin of their mothers, and we instinctively reach out to embrace someone who has been wounded. But it is also written into our souls. Consider the early days of the pandemic, and the emotional starvation we all experienced, prevented from gathering in groups to worship, to celebrate and to mourn. And when we did encounter other people, we kept a mutual distance. "I feel like a leper," we grumbled to our families when we returned home, because we finally understood it: the real tragedy of leprosy is not pain and disfigurement. The real tragedy of leprosy is loneliness.

"If you wish, you can make me clean," begged the leper as he knelt before Christ (Mark 1:40). He wasn't begging for deliverance from pain and disfigurement. He was begging for deliverance from isolation.

"If you wish, you can make me clean," we beg God in confession, not because we are physically withering and dying but because we are so desperate to once again be held in His embrace.

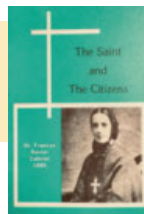

The Saint and The Citizens

From last week's installment of *The Saint and The Citizens*

Colorado - The sisters meanwhile collected large rocks for the purpose of building a three-story, fourteen-room house. Rocks were hauled away by a donkey who was coaxed to do so by an occasional lump of sugar. The house still stands as a monument to St. Frances Cabrini.

This Week


Denver also had its spring of clear water miracle. One day the sisters complained to Mother Cabrini that they were dying of thirst and there was no water to be had. She answered, "Lift that rock over there and dig." They obeyed. This spring is visited annually by thousands of persons who come from all over the United States to drink the water and take it home with them. A statue of Sacred Heart, 22 feet in height, has been erected on an 11 foot base on the spot where Mother Cabrini made the outline of the heart. At the foot of the mountain a large crucifix has been set up along with the Stations of the Cross and the 15 Mysteries of the Rosary, thus enabling the pilgrims to say the rosary and make the Way of the Cross before reaching the statue of the Sacred Heart on the mountain top.

California | From Colorado, Mother Cabrini went to California. Land of sunshine flowers and luxuriant vegetation. In 1905 she opened an orphanage in Los Angeles, but three years later it was transferred to Burbank in the San Fernando Valley. In nineteen thirty five the orphanage.... High school were opened in its place.

High on a hilltop overlooking the valley stands a tiny white chapel which was built in 1917 under the supervision of Mother Cabrini and was dedicated to Our Lady of help of Christians. Three times the Little Chapel has escaped the ravages of forest fires. Four day La Tuna fire raced toward the building, the flames came down the hill and smoke hid the surroundings. Everyone was sad because the flames had destroyed the home of Our Lady. Flames finally died out, and from the smoldering brush came the weary fireman to tell the sisters that the chapel was intact. Pilots flying to and from California used the chapel as a beacon. A group of nuns from the villa Cabrini Academy has been teaching at the Parish Elementary School of St. Frances Xavier on Scott Road at Burbank since 1956 the present enrollment is 560 boys and girls.
