Pastoral Perspectives

Toyohiko Kagawa had been orphaned at a young age and left with relatives who mistreated him. He contracted tuberculosis and believed that he was dying (which he was). He underwent a dramatic, religious experience that one day came to him. He saw a blinding light in his room and immediately sensed that he was surrounded by God's healing presence. And he was healed by this experience: transformed, physically and spiritually. After all the hardship and suffering Kagawa had been going through one might have expected him to say, "This is God acting in my life. I'm going to treasure the experience within myself. Just God and me". Instead, he opened himself totally. He moved into an incredibly horrible slum where, for many years, he ministered unselfishly to the people: counseling them, feeding them, clothing them, finding shelter for them, listening to them, and identifying with their pain. Kagawa himself contracted an eye-infection which partially blinded him for the rest of his life. He gave of himself not only in a direct, personal way but also in organizing the distribution of medical supplies, food and clothing. Kagawa had received grace, he had received the faith, he had experienced healing, but always with the understanding that he would share it with others. "The person who lives by the truth comes out into the light," Jesus proclaims, "so that it may be plainly seen that what they do is done in God (Jn. 3:21).

Baptized into the waters of life we must decide how we will live that life. When God gives us light, unless it is shared, it fades, dissipates and darkness returns.

Scripture Study for Next Sunday



Next Sunday, March 21, 2021, is the Fifth Sunday of Lent. The readings will be Jeremiah 31:31-34; Hebrews 5:7-9; and John 12:20-33.

As the great feast of the Paschal Mystery (Jesus' death and resurrection) draws close, our readings help us review and understand what it is that we are about to celebrate. Through the Old Testament prophet, Jeremiah, God states his intention to form a new covenant with the chosen people. Unlike the covenant based on a law from above, which the Israelites had broken, the new covenant will be written upon their hearts, placed within them by a merciful God.

In the second reading from Hebrews, we feel the weight of Christ's passion. We are reminded that Jesus was, indeed, fully human – fearful and anguished about the suffering that lay ahead. This reading reflects on the fact that there is something that is accomplished through suffering, something that is made perfect; somehow, when one continues to follow God and to trust God's will as one lives through suffering, God's salvific love is revealed, the new covenant pointed to by Jeremiah is fulfilled.

The Gospel scene takes place shortly before Jesus' death and finds Jesus reflecting on these same themes. "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified," Jesus says. He is troubled, he considers asking God to spare him this terrible situation. But trusting totally in God, Jesus continues on his way and teaches that "unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." Setting aside one's own 'life' for the sake of following and serving God, even in the midst of suffering, is the call of every Christian. It is also the path to great love, eternal life, and God's glory.
