November 5, 2023 Thirty-First Sunday In Ordinary Time

Praised be Jesus Christ!

While the month of November has for Catholics an association with the "holy souls" on account of All Souls Day, for Americans the month of November also has a cultural association with recognition of veterans due to the Veteran's Day national holiday.

There is actually an interesting tie between these two commemorations—one Catholic, one American—that dates back to World War I. It is well known that Veteran's day had its genesis in the armistice of November 11, 1918, which effectively brought the combat of World War I to an end, even before the official treaty which legally ended the war the following year.

But World War I also had an impact on the celebration of All Soul's Day in the life of the Church. The feast itself had existed on the Church's calendar for hundreds of years but it wasn't until 1915 that permission was given by the Pope for priests throughout the church to celebrate *three Masses* on that day—a unique privilege which normally only exists for Sundays and Holy Day of Obligation (and this, only with permission from the Bishop). One of the stated reasons for the change was precisely because *so many young men in Europe were dying in the war that having additional Masses on All Souls Day seemed an appropriate spiritual response.*

I'd also like to suggest a similar sort of All Souls-Veterans day connection through the life and heroism of Fr. Emil Kapaun (1916-1951). Fr. Kapaun grew up in rural Kansas and was ordained a priest in 1940. He began service as a chaplain in the US Army toward the end of World War II, and then again several years later during the Korean War. It was during his time in the Korean war that the heroism of Fr. Kapaun became well known as he fearlessly tended (spiritually and physically) to the wounded in the midst of ongoing battles, apparently often having to be reminded to keep his head down while running through oncoming bullets.

Of course as a priest he administered the sacraments amongst the troops: baptizing, hearing confessions, giving Last Rites and so on. One of famous photos of him from this time shows him saying Holy Mass on a makeshift altar constructed on the hood of an army Jeep. But as a fellow soldier he also won the respect and admiration of the men for complete selflessness in all circumstances. When captured and sent to one of the Communist POW camps, Fr. Kapaun worked constantly to relieve the sufferings of his fellow captured soldiers—scavenging for additional food, giving up his own clothes, securing medical supplies and medicines for the sick, and especially doing everything in his power to keep up the morale of the men through prayer and encouragement. This was especially important as their Communist captors would frequently try to use the horrendous sufferings of the prison camp as evidence that God must not exist, since He was not sparing them from such sufferings. Fr. Kapaun instead would remind the men of the suffering that Christ Himself endured for our redemption.

Certainly the are dozens of noteworthy accounts of the deeds of Fr. Kapaun that are worth sharing, but I bring up his life here because of the events which took place on November 2, 1950 (*All Souls Day!*) which led to him being awarded the Medal of Honor posthumously in 2013. One source describes it as such:

While protecting the town of Unsan, Chaplain Kapaun's outfit was attacked from all sides by the combined Communist forces. A fierce battle ensued, and Father Kapaun went about anointing the dying and dragging the wounded to safety. Captured once, Father Kapaun escaped when his captors were shot by U.S. soldiers. Offered a last chance to retreat to safety, Father Kapaun and an Army Medic, Doctor Clarence Anderson, decided to remain and look after the wounded. Deep in the day on November 2, the group was captured by the Communists. Seeing a wounded soldier about to be shot by a North Korean, Father Kapaun rushed over, pushed the gun aside, and picked up the wounded GI, Sergeant Herbert Miller. In disbelief at the chaplain's bravery, the North Korean let the two live. After a few days, Father Kapaun and the other prisoners of war marched between 60-100 miles to a prison camp at Pyoktong. Many had difficulty walking because of frostbitten feet and battle wounds. Those who tarried were often left for dead or shot, but Father Kapaun went along the line encouraging the soldiers to help carry those who couldn't walk on their own, all the while doing his own part to carry the wounded. Because of his example, many soldiers lived who would have otherwise died.

Such a great Catholic-American hero! Not only is he a Medal of Honor recipient, but he is also officially recognized as a "Servant of God" whose cause for canonization is open and ongoing.

Thank you to all of the veterans from our parish, living and deceased.
