Praised be Jesus Christ!

This week we start our 2024-2025 Religious Education Year here at the Cathedral. I'm so grateful to our coordinator Darlene Piersall and her volunteers for their commitment to this very important element of our parish life.

Each year I basically re-post in the bulletin this same message (see below) which outlines my "vision" for what parish religious education needs to be. So, my apologies if this is your fourth year reading this (!) but I think it is important enough to warrant being repeated.

In listing the duties of the parish pastor, the Code of Canon Law draws particular attention to the importance of religious education. It states that the pastor "is to take care that the lay members of the Christian faithful are instructed in the truths of the faith, especially by giving a homily on Sundays and holy days of obligation and by offering catechetical instruction" (Can. 528 §1). But just a few sentences later it adds: "*He is to have particular care for the Catholic education of children and youth*" (Ibid).

I make a conscious effort to fulfill this duty by being involved as much as I can during the Sunday religious education classes.

But there is only so much that classroom instruction can hope to accomplish, and in this culture, *it will almost certainly fail to achieve its goal if that is all that we do*. The other key pieces of the puzzle are, among other things:

<u>1. Family support</u> – The Church has always reiterated that the parents are the first and primary catechists of their children. The home itself should become what is sometimes referred to as the "domestic church." Is the home truly a place of family prayer? Do you have a crucifix on the wall in every bedroom? Are there images of Our Lord or the Blessed Mother in a place of prominence? Do you keep a bottle of Holy Water accessible and use it frequently to bless yourself, your children and your house?

Most importantly, however, is the role of the family in making sure that Mass attendance on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is the unwavering family expectation, even during times of vacation and travel. I can try to awaken people to the seriousness of this obligation by stressing its importance; or I can speak more positively about the benefits of Mass attendance and the graces that the Mass gives us. But as it relates to catechesis, it is my experience that religious education classes will be almost totally ineffective in nurturing the Catholic faith unless the family is also attending Mass every Sunday and Holy Day.

<u>2. The Liturgy</u> – The Liturgy itself should have a strong pedagogical role in the Catholic education of our young people. By that I mean that the truths of the faith that we teach in the classroom in words should also be "taught" and "experienced" in the liturgy through sights, gestures, postures, sounds, smells, and even reverential silence. For example, I can teach until I am blue in the face the fact that the Mass really is, as Vatican II puts it, the "sacrifice of [Our Savior's] body and blood" which "perpetuate[s] the sacrifice of the Cross throughout the centuries." But unless this reality is seen and tangibly experienced in the way that we worship, our teaching is just words on page with real effect. The same is true about all of the other truths of the faith.

Another way of saying this is that the classroom should is to inspire a sense of wonder and curiosity in the students regarding the immense beauty of our Faith. But then going forth from the classroom, this sense of wonder is sustained and cultivated by their experience of the sacred liturgy.

3. The whole parish – Pope St. Paul VI famously noted in the 1970s that "Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers, and if he does listen to teachers, it is because they are witnesses." Every individual member of our parish witnesses to their faith by the way that they conduct themselves in the church, and by the way that they live out their spiritual lives on a daily basis. This witness is amplified ten-fold when it becomes a collective parish culture. Silent prayer before and after by parishioners before and after Mass can "speak" louder than classroom lectures. Long confession lines "speak" of the reality of sin but also the greatness of Christ's mercy. Even things like the beauty of vestments, music, and decorations "speak" to the fact that our worship is something holy and heavenly.

So basically, thank you so much for all of the implicit ways that everyone of us can contribute to the Catholic education of our children and youth!
