

When the Cardinals met in General Congregation before the Conclave which elected Pope Francis, one after another said that he wanted the next pope to reform the Curia, take steps to assure financial transparency at the Vatican, tackle the problem of divorced and remarried Catholics and the ordination of mature married men to the priesthood, all the while bringing about a new boldness in the preaching of the Gospel. Scarcely a month after he was elected, Pope Francis appointed an advisory council of Cardinals to help him tackle these daunting tasks.

Recently Pope Francis issued a new document, Praedicate *Evangelium* (To Preach the Gospel), in the latest attempt to reform the Roman Curia, the Vatican offices which oversee the Church in the Pope's name. Through the years some cynics have expressed the opinion that the Curia is irreformable. After the Second Vatican Council, Pope Paul VI attempted a major reform of the Curia and the Diplomatic Corps, most significantly attempting to internationalize its personnel which then were almost all Italian. Shortly thereafter, the archbishop in charge of the training academy for papal diplomats asked the superior of the American graduate house in Rome to nominate several outstanding American priests for entrance to the Academy. The superior complied immediately but heard nothing in Many months later he telephoned the archbishop who reply. apologized profusely for the delay and thanked the superior for his two nominations. While they might be exemplary candidates, he said, he was really looking for two Italian American priests. In this way, the Pope's plan to truly internationalize the Diplomatic Corps and the Curia could be honored on the surface but could be "business as usual" underneath.

The Italian stranglehold on the Curia can be significant, creating an impenetrable "old boys" club opposed to any change of operation or mission or reduction of power. When Cardinal Ratzinger answered Pope John Paul II's call to give up his diocese in Bavaria in 1981 to head-up the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith in Rome, the Cardinal found himself practically ignored by the Italian Curia members, finding a true friend only with the arrival of Cardinal Arinze in 1985.

In this current attempt at reform (which has been on-going Sanctuary Lamp Intentions this week are in Memory of: slowly for the nine years of his pontificate,) Pope Francis has combined quite a few offices and given the Curia an evangelization thrust. This new document insists that "the Roman Curia does not stand between the pope and the bishops, but rather places itself at the service of both in ways that are proper to the nature of each." According to his critics, the Pope's combination of departments would not lead to greater efficiency and did not help trim the Vatican's huge budget gap through layoffs. The Pope, who cares deeply about people, does not have the heart to fire people despite the financial consequences.

> The most unusual innovation in the Pope's recent document is the radical change it makes in allowing any baptized lay Catholic, including women, to lead any of the various Vatican curial departments. Up until now only male clergy, usually Cardinals, have headed these offices because current church law restricts continued on page 3

"jurisdiction" to clerics alone. Because of this, the Vatican has been criticized over the years for being myopic, seeing things only from the single perspective of male clerics who often know nothing of the faith life challenges and the everyday struggles of marriage and family life. While several women religious have recently been appointed to high curial posts, there are no lay women in these positions yet. In fact, some commentators suspect that it will be difficult to recruit non-Italian laywomen to fill these positions because the pay is relatively low for someone with experience and necessary managerial talent.

While for the past nine years the Pope has been slowly checking-off the College of Cardinals' to-do-list," there are plenty of critics who feel that he spent too much capital early on making minor changes in the way Church handles Holy Communion for the divorced and remarried. They also point out his slowness to grasp the gravity of the world-wide sex abuse crisis. Finally, while he has made significant attempts of late to increase Vatican financial transparency, he relied too heavily at the beginning on curial advisors who led him to make decisions which undercut real attempts at transparency. But the Pope is still pushing ahead, despite his 85 years and some health concerns, doing his best to correct early mistakes, keeping his energy focused on the Church's mission and day-by-day by word and example attempting to revitalize the preaching of the Gospel.
