Please call a parish office concerning the needs of the sick, hospitalized or shut-ins. Those unable to attend Mass may have Communion brought to them.





Living in the Spirit

The received judgment of anthropologists was that the first humans to reach our continent arrived as early as 16,000 years ago, using the land bridge which once existed between Asia and North America. A few researchers, studying various Paleo-Indian sites, have suggested even earlier arrival dates based on the discovery of animal bones and stones, which seem to have been reworked by human hands into primitive tools. These findings have usually been contradicted by the majority of those in this field of study because such artifacts are ambiguous and cannot conclusively point to human agency.

Recently, however, scientists working at White Sands National Park in New Mexico have discovered fossilized human footprints which show conclusively that humans were in fact living in North America up to 23,000 years ago. This U.S. National Park is unique because it includes a 275 square mile area of white sand dunes composed of gypsum crystals 30 to 60 feet deep. It is beneath these dunes that Cornell University archaeologists discovered bedrock which contains hundreds of fossilized human footprints, some of which, by means of radiocarbon dating of aquatic plant seeds found below and above these footprints, show that they were laid down between 23,000 and 21,000 years ago. The footprints were left primarily by teenagers and smaller children who, over several thousand years, travelled through the muddy shore of a now extinct lake.

These archaeological findings are not meant to be just incidental bits of knowledge but stand as a reminder that humankind, for better or worse, has left its mark on our planet for untold millennia. At first our impact was minimal, but as our numbers grew, we became responsible even for the extinction of species. In our own day, our impact on the planet has grown to such an extent as to threaten our very survival as a species. For this reason, and for more than 40 years, the Popes have been urging us to take remedial action before it is too late.

Pope St. John Paul II pointed out that in the modern era, "the conquest and exploitation of resources has become predominant and invasive, and today it has even reached the point of threatening the environment's hospitable aspect." (Address 3/24/97) Pope Benedict XVI called the fight against climate change a "moral obligation." While expressing concern about wars, terrorism and the violation of human rights, "no less troubling are the threats arising from neglect--if not downright misuse--of the earth and the natural good that God has given us. For this reason, "it is imperative that mankind renew and strengthen that covenant between human beings and the environment, which should mirror the creative love of God, from whom we come and towards whom we are journeying."

(Address 1/1/2010) Putting into action his tough words, he had an array of 2,400 solar panels added to Vatican City rooftops producing 300 MWh of solar energy for the tiny country each year.

Like his predecessors, Pope Francis has been most outspoken about our care for the environment. In a 2015 address he emphasized that "human-induced climate change is a scientific reality, and its decisive mitigation is a moral and religious imperative *continued on page 3*


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for humanity." Both churchmen and scientists are urging us not to leave our footprints for later archaeologists to discover but to reduce our carbon footprint today so that there is still a viable planet in the future to discover.

To reduce our carbon footprint, we are urged to buy only food that we need, consuming less meat and more fish, and more locally produced fruits and vegetables. We are urged to recycle more, avoiding wherever possible excessive use of plastic and so to minimize waste. We are asked to avoid clothing fashion trends which involve cheap items that go out of style quickly only to end up in landfills. We are asked to turn lights out when not in use and to switch from incandescent light bulbs to energy efficient LEDs. We are challenged to drive less, take public transportation and to walk more.

The Popes are clear: care for the environment is a moral imperative. Pope Francis has pleaded "We must not be indifferent or resigned to the loss of biodiversity and the destruction of ecosystems, often caused by our irresponsible and selfish behavior. Because of us, thousands of species will no longer give glory to God by their very existence. We have no right." Peace to all,
