

St. Pius X Pastor's Pastoral Page (Facebook) Sunday, June 6, 2021

Good Morning World. It is Sunday, June 6th. Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus, also referred to as Corpus Christi Sunday. The readings for today's mass (including an audio version) may be found at uscgb.org. The gospel is from Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

From Bishop Robert Barron:

Friends, today's Gospel focuses on the spiritual power of the Eucharist. A central claim of the Catholic Church is that Jesus is substantially present under the forms of bread and wine. His presence is not simply evocative and symbolic, but rather real, true, and substantial.

To verify this scripturally, look at the accounts of the Last Supper in Matthew, Mark, and Luke—and also in Paul. But look especially at the sixth chapter of John's Gospel. Jesus says, "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you." And when they object, Jesus does not soften his language; he intensifies it. This is the ground for the Church's defense of the Real Presence. How can we make sense of it? It has everything to do with who Jesus is. If he were simply an ordinary human being, his words would have, at best, a symbolic resonance. But Jesus is God, and what God says, is.

Thus, when Jesus' words over the bread and wine are spoken, they change into what the words signify. They become really, truly, and substantially the Body and Blood of the Lord. (Bishop Robert Barron, Daily Gospel Reflection)

When I work with children preparing for their First Holy Communion, I will ask them if anyone has ever broken a bone. Sometimes it's one of the children, usually it's one of the parents.

I ask them what was the first thing they did at the hospital. The response is they took an X-ray. And what did they do to prepare you before they took the X-ray? They put a lead apron over me. Why did they do that? X-rays are radiation and too much radiation in any organ can cause radiation sickness which can hurt you or even kill you.

After that dialogue, I ask them if anyone likes hot, fresh Italian bread. Most, if not all, the hands go up. So I told them that I am going to go get some hot, fresh Italian bread for them. And I will pick up some peanut butter and jams and jelly and butter to put on the bread. It is comical because some of the kids actually start making yummy sounds.

I then tell them that after I pick up the bread I am going to stop at the local hospital and see a friend of mine who is an x-ray technician. I am going to ask my friend to x-ray the bread 1000 times. Would they all still want to eat the bread? No, because it's filled with radiation. So I break the bread open. I put a piece to my ear, but I don't hear any radiation. I put a piece to my nose, but I do not smell any radiation. I rub a piece between my fingers but I do not feel any radiation. I take the tiniest piece and taste it, but I do not taste any radiation. I look at it very closely but I do not see any radiation.

I tell them that they are busting my chops. They tell me that the bread is filled with radiation, but I use all my senses and I do not hear, or smell, or feel, or taste or see any radiation. They are trying to fool me! And they reply that they know what's happened to the bread. It's been exposed to X-rays and so it's filled with radiation. If I eat it I can get sick.

I then pick up an unconsecrated host. I tell them that at mass, the priest is kind of like an x-ray technician. And the Holy Spirit is like super natural radiation. During the Eucharistic prayer, the priest prays for the Holy Spirit to come up on the bread and wine so that it will become for us the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. The priest then prays the words that Jesus said at his last supper. He holds the bread and says, "This is my body which will be given up for you." He then holds the chalice and says, "This is the cup of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant."


I then look at the host and say that according to what we believe the host at mass is now Jesus. I put the host to my ear and shake it and say that I do not hear Jesus. I put the host to my nose and say I do not smell Jesus. I rub the host between my fingers and say I do not feel Jesus. I take a tiniest piece and taste it and say that I do not taste Jesus. I break it open and I say that I do not see any little Jesus inside. They are busting my chops again. They are telling me that the host would now be Jesus, but I use all my senses and I cannot detect Jesus there at all. They tell me that they know what's happened to the host and it is now Jesus.

The last prayer at mass before receiving Holy Communion concludes, "But only say the word and my souls shall be healed." Unlike the radiation bread which can make you sick or even make you die, this supernatural radiation bread can heal you and give you eternal life.

One of the greatest teachers of the Catholic Church was Saint Thomas Aquinas. But he had a spiritual experience, after which he said all his learning was like straw. He had come to such a deep faith in the presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, that the Eucharist was his primary focus for the rest of his life.

He composed a hymn for Eucharist adoration, Tantum Ergo. One of the verses concludes, "What our senses fail to fathom, let us grasp through faith's consent." What we cannot understand through our senses, let us grasp through our faith.

World, the teaching of the Eucharist being the actual Body and Blood of Jesus can be most difficult for our minds to comprehend. But, as Jesus taught, let us be like little children as we approach the kingdom here on earth and listen to the words He spoke over the bread and wine: "This is My Body... This is My Blood."

Reading At Home Makes a Big Difference

Family time is so important! I've noticed as my own children get older and get more involved in different activities, how difficult it is to spend quality time together. When they were younger, reading a story to them at night was always my favorite time of day. Now, there are nights when we are all too tired and there just isn't enough time in the day. Studies have shown however, that reading at home is critical to reading success at school. With the school year coming to a close, reading over the summer becomes even more important to help prevent summer slide.

Here are a few suggestions from helping your child find the right book, to checking for understanding, and a few online resources to try!

Choose Books that are at an age appropriate reading level for your child. Choose a book that matches your child's interest. Once you have chosen, try the five finger rule. Open the book to any page and ask your child to read. Put a finger up every time your child does not know a word. If you have put all five fingers up before the end of the page, the book is probably too hard for your child.

How to read with a beginning reader. Generally with a new reader, 15-20 minutes is plenty of time. Encourage your child to use his/her finger to point to each word that they read. You can read a sentence and then have your child repeat the sentence. Once they are more comfortable you can take turns reading sentences. Don't be afraid to read the same book again! Repeated reading helps build fluency.

Check for understanding: Talk about the story as you read it. What do you think will happen next? What does this story remind you of? How do you think this character feels? Encourage your child to make connections. Comprehension will play a big role throughout their entire school career!

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

St. Anthony Can Find Anything — Even You
“Tony, Tony, come around! Something is lost and it must be found.”

Did you learn this one when you were a kid? In my experience there are even a lot of lapsed Catholics — or people who were never Catholic at all — who know that when you lose something, St. Anthony becomes your best friend. Missing keys? Pray to St. Anthony. Can't find your favorite sweater? St. Anthony. Forget where you parked your car in the mall lot? St. Anth— okay, you get the idea. Whatever it is, large or small, important or trivial, Tony has a reputation for finding the lost things.

It's a devotion that can seem a little like superstition — witchcraft, even? — if you don't really understand it. Mumble an incantation to a dead guy and you're guaranteed to find your sunglasses. But as with most traditions that are old, beloved and effective, looking a little closer reveals the truth of the matter.


When we lose something really important, what do we do? We make the whole household stop what they're doing to join the search. Having St. Anthony as a friend means you ask him to stop what he's doing to help, too. And how he helps is by taking the matter exactly where all matters need to go — straight to the feet of Christ.

Here's the real genius of St Anthony: he takes the most mundane, commonplace occurrence — misplacing socks — into an encounter with the divine and truly all things great and small are gifts from God. He grabs our hand and points to the cross. “That's what you're looking for,” he tells us.

In the end, Tony doesn't really find the lost things. He finds the lost people.


