Saint Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) writes about ordered and disordered attachments. Disordered attachments are sometimes referred to as unhealthy attachments.



What Is an Unhealthy Attachment? By Vinita Hampton Wright

People who are familiar with St. Ignatius, the Spiritual Exercises, or Jesuit spirituality in general will sometimes use the term unhealthy attachment. What is that exactly? Let's explore this by asking a few questions.

Is there any physical habit I have that gets in the way of my being available to God? Do I turn to food, drink, sex, exercise, or sleep to avoid facing myself or my conversation with the Divine?

What are my emotional habits? What is my first response to stress, fear, worry, or pain? Is it anger? Fear? Hyperactivity by which I hope to fix everything? Where am I most comfortable emotionally? It's possible to be comfortable with emotions that aren't necessarily positive but they are familiar, so we go to them quickly. Some people live comfortably with anger and irritability. Others want only positive feelings, which can motivate them to avoid struggle or anything perceived as negative.

What is my median attitude? This is similar to an emotional habit, but it adds outlook to emotion. Must I always look on the bright side, even when I need to deal with something that's not so positive? Do I go immediately to the worst-case scenario? Do I keep myself set apart from others so that I can observe and judge rather than engage and risk? Or do I feel that everyone depends on me, all the time?

Physical habits, emotional habits, and attitudes/outlooks can be addictive. We learn patterns that can keep us safe from deep listening, honest reflection, and taking action. Listening to God, reflecting on our life in view of God's love, and putting that love into action—these aspects of our spiritual life can be thwarted when we scramble back to our habits. There are other kinds of habits, too, such as habits of thought or habits of relationship with things. Any habit that helps us avoid authentic engagement with God is a form of unhealthy attachment. We usually think of unhealthy attachments in terms of relationships with people or relationships with possessions, money, or power. But it's easy to overlook the subtler relationships we have within the self—with our feelings, our body, and our view of life.

* For one week, take note of your emotional habits. Do you go through regular cycles? Are there emotions that, when you nurture them, make you feel more powerful or in charge? Or do you cling to emotions that make you feel needy or incompetent?

* For another week, take note of your habits of attitude and outlook. Try to identify the things you say that indicate that you are: grateful/ungrateful; hopeful/not hopeful; generous/selfish, and so on.

* And, on any particular day, notice what your body is used to, and if these patterns of food, sleep, activity, and rest are doing you good or harm. (ignatianspirituality.com)

"Do you REALLY need that?"

How many times have children heard that question from a parent or a grandparent? And the response would often be, "Pleeeeeeze...I really, really, really need it!!!"

It could be a toy, a game, an article of clothing or some such thing. And quite often the child really believes that they absolutely need it and cannot live without it.

If there was a technical analysis of the situation, most of the time the result would prove that the child did not really need it and will survive without it.

But it doesn't seem that way to the child. Deprivation, ego, jealousy, greed - many different motivations, but the same result - a disordered or unhealthy attachment to a material good.

Unfortunately, disordered attachments continue into adulthood. And the attachments can grow beyond material things: we can develop disordered attachments to emotional states, activities, relationships and similar things.

And we can be in denial about our "needs" as adults just as we were as children: "I really, really, really need it and I absolutely cannot live without it."

Ms. Hampton Wright offers some tools to analyze and assess our attachments.

And prayer is the essential tool in seeking the grace to be free from disordered attachments.

The Suscipe of Saint Ignatius of Loyola is a beautiful prayer to put attachments - ordered and disordered - into perspective. "Take, O Lord, and receive my entire liberty, my memory, my understanding and my whole will. All that I am and all that I possess, Thou hast given me: I surrender it all to Thee to be disposed of according to Thy will. Give me only Thy love and Thy grace; with these I will be rich enough and will desire nothing more. Amen."

World, it can be a most difficult, yet profound, question. But you deserve to ask it. And you deserve the honest answer. What do you really need?

Bike Safety

A great way to enjoy nature and get some exercise at the same time is to go out and ride a bike. Enjoying a bike ride with family, or with friends, is a great way to spend some quality time together, too.

It's important to be cautious though and follow a few recommended safety tips. Take it from someone who knows, accidents can happen anytime and anywhere, and the better prepared you are, the better your chances are in avoiding any unfortunate mishaps, or minimizing possible injuries.

First and foremost, you should always inspect your bike to make sure it is ready to ride. Tires should be properly inflated, and do a quick check to make sure the brakes are working.

Wear something that reflects light, such as neon clothing, reflective tape or markings, or have a flashing light on your bike to make yourself more visible to drivers.

Remember the five senses? Well, put your eyes and ears to work and watch for possible road hazards such as gravel, puddles, potholes, and broken glass to avoid a crash.

A properly fitted bicycle helmet should be worn while enjoying a bike ride. Children 14 years and younger are required to wear one in New York State. Make sure the helmet sits flat on the head, not tilted back or forward. The front of the helmet should sit about two finger widths above the eyebrows in order to protect the forehead.



Not just any bicycle will do either. A properly sized bike is essential for control. Your child should be able to stand over the top bar with an inch or so of clearance and both feet flat on the ground. The brake levers should be easily within reach so he/she can stop when needed.

The best way to teach your child bike safety is to ride with them and model responsible biking behavior.

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Many people give their allegiance to something until it asks them to do something challenging or radical. Then, they find themselves rethinking whether they want to be associated with it. The same holds for God. Either we serve God, or we don't. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God's kingdom, love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, and trust that the Eucharist is in fact Jesus' very Body and Blood. For some, buying into these things may prove too difficult and a return to a life without them is preferred. But truth is truth and it can only be found in God. If we find it hard to accept it from the mouth of Christ, where else can we go to find it? The task before us is to commit to the truth even when it may be easier to pursue something else. Truth is always worth obtaining even when it is difficult. Jesus offers us the truth of life, a life that is found in his own flesh and blood and a life of discipleship.

A MOMENT WITH TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

"Far be it from us to forsake the Lord for the service of other gods." We struggle with our gods. They appear in the forms of things like money, power, prestige, popularity, privilege, and self-fulfillment. We like these "gods" because they make us feel good and ask very little of us in return. When we worship them, we worship ourselves. How can you go wrong with that? We buy into the illusion that if something can give us a comfortable life, free of want and need, then it is worth setting other things aside to pursue it. In essence, we sell our souls. Our struggle with "who is God" and to whom do we belong is a real one and one that can easily find us empty and experiencing disillusionment.

The devil tempted Jesus in the desert and promised him more. We are promised "more." But in pursuing the more and the satisfying we lose track of the cost, and the cost is great. We sacrifice our very life in pursuit of something disguised as life. We sacrifice truth for something that only "feels" true. While the true and real God certainly promises us many things, many things are also required. It is not about the warm and secure feelings and self-absorption the world wants to provide, but of giving back. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God's kingdom (not our own), love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, that we must die to ourselves in order to find ourselves, and trust that Jesus truly gives us his flesh and blood to eat and drink. These are hard things to accept and even harder to put into practice. It is no wonder that many, who may be attracted to Jesus at first, walk away in pursuit of the more self-satisfying gods.

But truth is truth. If we cannot accept it from the lips of Jesus Christ, then where else will we find it? To whom can we go? There is only one source of truth and life, Jesus Christ. Jesus has the words of eternal life and if we do not go to him, then where else will we find this gift? But we must be faithful and buy into the whole package deal that requires sacrifice and fidelity. When we do, we find ourselves, through the Body and Blood of Christ, connected to the Source of all life and then intimately bound with our brothers and sisters. We all have to decide whether we want to



stay or go and if we can accept what Jesus has to say. It's a choice we all have to make.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

Submission as Stewardship.

We aren't comfortable with the idea of submission. Our society champions equality, and rightly so — but it's a mistake to think that submission is at odds with equality. To submit ourselves fully, we must first be free. We must first be our own masters. God has granted us that freedom with the salvation He offers. We are no longer the slaves of sin. Now He asks us to be subordinate to one another, in the name of Christ.

What a completely uncomfortable task! What He's asking is for us to be subordinate to the person who irritates us the most. The person we really can't stand. The person who doesn't respect us or appreciate what we have to offer. The person we think we're smarter than, more talented than. The person we envy.

That's the real challenge of stewardship, isn't it? Subordination. Inconveniencing myself by giving of time, of money, of relationship. Putting the needs or wants of another above my own when they haven't done anything special to earn it.

I invite you to consider the cross — the most radical expression of submission, and of stewardship, that ever existed. If there was ever someone who deserved superiority, isn't it the God who let Himself be nailed to a tree, who gave so freely of His life, His body, His blood, His everything?

To look at him in his agony is to truly understand the beauty of submission — of laying down what you have for the good of the other.


