Book Study Learning to Pray It's not too late to join ***Learning to Pray***. This is James Martin's newest book. By now, you could be thinking that you learned to pray a long time ago; or that you have a prayer life that meets your needs; that prayer is something you do when time permits; or if you have a problem. James Martin takes us on a different journey. He guides us to look at prayer throughout Christian history and learn how different forms of prayer can meet us at different points during our life journey. While there is no right way to pray, there are different ways to pray. Each way of praying can deepen our relationship with God. Our task will be to look at the prayer practices in this book and share our ideas about prayer with one another. It will be interesting to learn about our different prayer practices and how they feed our souls as we draw closer to God. St. Pius X Pastor's Pastoral Page (Facebook) *Monday, September 13, 2021*

Good Morning World. It is September 13th, Monday of the 24th week in ordinary time. September 13th is the memorial of Saint John Chrysostom. The readings for today's mass (including an audio version) may be found at uscgb.org. The first reading is from 1 Timothy 2:1-8

SAINT JOHN CHRYSOSTOM'S STORY (c. 349 - September 14, 407) The ambiguity and intrigue surrounding John, the great preacher (his name means "golden-mouthed") from Antioch, are characteristic of the life of any great man in a capital city. Brought to Constantinople after a dozen years of priestly service in Syria, John found himself the reluctant victim of an imperial ruse to make him bishop in the greatest city of the empire. Ascetic, unimposing but dignified, and troubled by stomach ailments from his desert days as a monk, John became a bishop under the cloud of imperial politics.

If his body was weak, his tongue was powerful. The content of his sermons, his exegesis of Scripture, were never without a point. Sometimes the point stung the high and mighty. Some sermons lasted up to two hours.

His lifestyle at the imperial court was not appreciated by many courtiers. He offered a modest table to episcopal sycophants hanging around for imperial and ecclesiastical favors. John deplored the court protocol that accorded him precedence before the highest state officials. He would not be a kept man.

His zeal led him to decisive action. Bishops who bribed their way into office were deposed. Many of his sermons called for concrete steps to share wealth with the poor. The rich did not appreciate hearing from John that private property existed because of Adam's fall from grace any more than married men liked to hear that they were bound to marital fidelity just as much as their wives were. When it came to justice and charity, John acknowledged no double standards.

Aloof, energetic, outspoken, especially when he became excited in the pulpit, John was a sure target for criticism and personal trouble. He was accused of gorging himself secretly on rich wines and fine foods. His faithfulness as spiritual director to the rich widow, Olympia, provoked much gossip attempting to prove him a hypocrite where wealth and chastity were concerned. His actions taken against unworthy bishops in Asia Minor were viewed by other ecclesiastics as a greedy, uncanonical extension of his authority. Theophilus, archbishop of Alexandria, and Empress Eudoxia were determined to discredit John. Theophilus feared the growth in importance of the Bishop of Constantinople and took occasion to charge John with fostering heresy. Theophilus and other angered bishops were supported by Eudoxia. The empress resented his sermons contrasting gospel values with the excesses of imperial court life. Whether intended or not, sermons mentioning the lurid Jezebel and impious Herodias were associated with the empress, who finally did manage to have John exiled. He died in exile in 407.

REFLECTION: John Chrysostom's preaching, by word and example, exemplifies the role of the prophet to comfort the afflicted and to afflict the comfortable. For his honesty and courage, he paid the price of a turbulent ministry as bishop, personal vilification, and exile. Saint John Chrysostom is the Patron Saint of: Orators, Preachers, Speakers

I don't know if you happened to catch what Paul said. It seemed to be an innocuous, passing statement: "I am speaking the truth, I am not lying..."

Paul paid the price for speaking the truth, for proclaiming Christ. For that is what the truth is or, should I say, Who the truth is - Jesus, who said He is the way, the truth and the life.

Proclaiming Christ is proclaiming the truth.

John Chrysostom paid the price for speaking the truth.

There are people who do not want to hear the truth. They do not want to hear any voice other than their own.

There are people who only want to hear their truth, the message that supports their thought, their opinion, their way.

There are people who want to hear the truth only when it's convenient. If the truth is going to inconvenience them, they'd rather not hear it.

There are people who long to hear the truth, who long to hear of Jesus and His way, His truth and His life. They have a deep spiritual hunger for what will bring healing, peace and love to their hearts.

(And did you note that some times John Chrysostom preached for two hours? You may want to remember that the next time your priest, deacon, pastor preaches for twenty minutes.)

For hearts that are open, the truth is a healing salve, a sumptuous feast, a light in the darkness.

For hearts that are closed, the truth is an uncomfortable thorn, an annoyance that perturbs the mind and unsettles the spirit.

An open heart is a grace from God.

But we can seek this grace. We can ask for this grace.

World, may Saint Paul and Saint John Chrysostom pray for us to have hearts open to the Truth, who is Jesus.

As we begin this new school year, we are so grateful to all of our incredible families who have placed their trust in us to educate the wonderful young scholars in our school. Thank you for your patience as we continue to work out some minor kinks in another year with “newness.”

As I said when I first joined this incredible community, I continue to be overwhelmed by the tremendous dedication and support of our entire team—and it does take a team!

With all of the activities that happen surrounding the welcoming our students for the new year, there is no doubt that there may be some anxieties on the home front. Here are a few things that can help to ease the stress for both parents and students:

- 1) Take the opportunity to get to know your child’s teacher and their preferred method of communication. Some teachers may be more active with technology (email or web sites), and others may prefer telephone or face to face conversations.
- 2) Make homework time a daily habit. Find a quiet and routine location at home where your child can complete his or her work. This also reinforces the concept of a strong work ethic. If your child finds completing homework challenging, schedule a time to meet with his or her teacher before the anxiety increases.
- 3) Establish a regularly scheduled reading time with your child. This promotes the importance of literacy and allows for sharing in the exploration of new worlds of adventure.
- 4) Explore the opportunities for participation and involvement with our Parent Advisory Committee (PAC). This is a great way to be

involved in the school. We are partners in the education of all of our students.

- 5) Talk openly about any anxieties that your child may be feeling. The top five stressors for students (no matter the age) are:

- Separation anxiety
- Adapting to a new environment and/or community
- Fears about peers
- Riding the bus
- Bullying (real or perceived)

We are always available to discuss any challenges that students may be experiencing. The earlier addressed, the more successful the year will be.

I look forward to a GREAT school year, and I hope that you do, as well!

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

What does it mean to be God's servant? In essence, it means being willing to call the world back to its childlike innocence, showing all that a joy-filled playfulness has a place in life. The servant of God serves to foster the Kingdom of God. God's kingdom is not a sterile, unhappy, strict, and rigid reality. It is quite the opposite. It is a kingdom devoid of jealousy and selfish ambition where peace, gentleness, mercy, and good works abound. To be a servant of this kingdom means that selfish ambition must be set aside so that others can be first, and justice pursued at all cost. The prayer of this kind of servant is not focused on self-advancement or need. Rather, the servant's prayer seeks to detach from self-concern in order to be used by God. In this way, we who are servants can be inspired, guided, empowered, and led by God. We can then be used to lay the cornerstones of the kingdom: faith, hope, and love. It is upon these that God's firm dwelling is built. Accepting this call may place us last in the world's eyes but first in God's. ©LPi

A MOMENT WITH TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

There is something about being first. Whether it be first in line, first to be picked for the team, or the first one to finish their work, great satisfaction is achieved. Our egos love being first. It somehow sets us apart from everyone else, gives us a sense of pride and positions us to feel better than others. When we are first, we can glory in our efforts, skills, and achievements. Isn't that what really matters? After all, we are taught from a very young age to be proficient, stay on top, be the best at what we do, and win the praise and esteem of others. This is the stuff that makes us successful and provides us with a comfortable, satisfying life.

Jesus wants none of it. All of the details we anguish over mean little to the kingdom of God. You want to be first? Then, be a servant and welcome a child. All of this is the opposite of our often vehement pursuits. If we are serious about following Jesus and living the Gospel, then we must put the needs of others before our own. If we continue to listen only to the noise of the world, we are going to continue to believe the illusions we inherit. Those illusions come in many forms, but all have things in common: me before you, being on top and not the bottom, us versus them, personal security over universal harmony and peace. When are we going to learn that always striving to be the best and first is an empty pursuit in our struggle for happiness? While satisfying our ego with this momentary boost of esteem may feel good for a moment, is it what we really desire?

If we can break from the world's noise and create a space of sacred silence in our lives, we can begin to listen and see that we are being called in another direction. What we really desire is not the bolstering of our egos but the innocence we lost somewhere along the way. When we can be playful, joyful, and even somewhat carefree, life is good. We want our relationships to work, a place to call home, and to live peaceful lives with our sisters and brothers. Only a servant can do this. The servant's prayer seeks to detach from self-concern in order to be used by God. Rather than worrying about being first and coming out on top, we can be inspired, guided, empowered, and led to do good works. Stop worrying about being first and put greater energy into feeling joy. ©LPi

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

The View from the Back of the Line

Have you known that person? The one who leaves every person they encounter feeling a little more blessed for having met them? They're the friend you can count on when nothing is going well. They're the one who's always "doing" for others. They're never gossiping or sniping or complaining.

We wonder how they do it, how they have it in them. We're a little envious, even if we don't let ourselves acknowledge it.

That, folks, is what the view is like from the front of the line, gazing at those suckers in the way back and wondering why they're smiling so much.

We've all been at the front of a line and felt no shame about it. We show up early, we put in the time and the legwork, and we "earn" whatever it is we came for — sports tickets, the latest Apple product, whatever. That's how it works here on Earth, where the fastest win the race, the fittest survive and the first shall be first, always.

It's exactly why stewardship is such a tall order. Stewardship calls us to play by the rules of another kingdom — one where the richest have the least amount in their bank accounts and the happiest don't seem to have anything to show for it, at least materially.

If you have a person in your life who always seems happy "doing" for others, it's because by a boatload of God's grace, they play by the rules of the other place.

Watch and take notes — and don't be afraid to join them at the back of the line.


