St. Pius X Pastor's Pastoral Page (Facebook) *Sunday, October 31, 2021*

Good Morning World. It is October 31st, the Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings for today's mass (including an audio version) may be found at uscgb.org.

The gospel is from Mark 12:28b-34

"Self-indulgent."

I don't think I had heard that word in years, maybe a few decades.

But there it was. Popping into my own head.

I was thinking about today's readings. I was thinking about the shema from Deuteronomy that Jesus quotes in Mark's gospel: "Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength." It is the centerpiece of Jewish morning and evening prayer.

So when Jesus is asked what is the greatest commandment and He replies with the shema, it would have been hard to argue against His response. The people pray it twice a day. It would be difficult to argue against it.

Now, back to self-indulgent.

I had just finished my supper and was looking for just a little something that was sweet as the topper to my meal. I remembered that I had a bag of caramel flavored rice crisps. So I grabbed the bag, sat on the couch and turned on the Notre Dame football game. (They beat UNC 44-34)

I took the clip off the bag and reached in. I had a few crisps. They were tasty and sweet. So I had a few more. And then a few more. Soon there were only a few more left. So I finished them.

As I reflected back on it, the word self-indulgent popped into my head.

Self-indulgent: given to or marked by excessive gratification of one's desires. (merriam-webster.com)

Excessive gratification that I self-justified. "Oh it's only a few more chips." A few more chips that became the rest of the bag. "Oh, what's the harm of a few more chips?" The harm is not the primary point. Eating should never be based on, "Oh, what's the harm?"

"What's the good?" There's an excellent question to ask. "What's the good of doing this or that?" Because seeking the good of something will also bring God into it, because God will always desire good, and not evil, for us.

The only answer I could come up with to either question, harm or good, was that I indulged my excessive desire to be over-satisfied.

And, forgive me for judging the attitude of today's society, but I think this is also the mindset of the culture in which we live.

"Indulge yourself. Do it because it's what you want to do. Don't think about the harm it could do to others. Don't think about the harm it could do to future generations. You have a right to indulge yourself. You've earned it. Or, you deserve it because you've been denied it. You have a right to it. Do it!"

And in the background we hear the shema: "Hear, WORLD! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength."

Under the guise of "self-love" we self-indulge. And God is nowhere to be found.

I know some folks would say, "Oh for goodness sake! It was just a small bag of rice crisps. Get over it!"

But it conveyed a deeper reality for me. Self-indulgence is pushing God out of the picture. Self-indulgence is saying, "My will be done," rather than, "Thy will be done."

World, it may seem small and picayune, but the reality underneath is the time long struggle of who or what is the guiding force of our lives and of our world.

I'd offer you a rice crisp to munch on while you think about it, but I seem to be all out.

Dignity of the Human Person

The Hands of Christ Recognition for High School Seniors

The *Hands of Christ* is a recognition program, sponsored by the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis, in which the Most Reverend Bishop Salvatore R. Matano affirms high school seniors of our parishes who have been the "Hands of Christ" in their churches, homes, schools and communities. Seniors will be recognized at one of several diocesan recognition ceremonies in 2022. Ceremony details will be shared at a later date.



The Criteria to receive this very special recognition:

- Has consistently demonstrated a Christian attitude by word and example.
- Has been actively involved in the parish as well as their school or community.
- Has been a positive role model to their peers, younger children and adults.
- Is a practicing Roman Catholic in a parish in the Diocese of Rochester and attends Mass.
- Is currently a high school senior.

The Nomination Process

Parishioners, adults, teens, faith formation leaders, CYO Coaches, Ministry Group leaders are notified that the nomination period has opened and can begin to think about the **graduating high school seniors** they might want to nominate.

Those who want to nominate a young parishioner for the Hands of Christ Recognition email or call Barb Legere (barb.legere@dor.org) for the form and return it by **November 15th**.

The Parish Staff receives and reviews all nominations and puts forward those nominated to the Diocese. Those who are selected for this Recognition will receive a letter from the Pastor & Youth Ministry Director inviting them to participate in the Diocesan Hands of Christ Ceremonies and in our Parish Celebration whose date will be announced at that time.

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

It all really boils down to a matter of the heart, and actions do speak louder than words. We cannot hide from the truth. A problem with religion is that it is possible for someone to make everything appear to be right when actually it is not. We can say all of the right prayers, perform all of the proscribed rituals, claim that we adhere to orthodox doctrines and still lead a distorted, empty and sometimes pitiful life. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even the noblest looking actions can amount to nothing. It is no wonder, then, that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus. While it may not always appear to be the case, God has a special care and regard for those who depend upon him in times of trouble and want. Only the person who is truly poor is the only one who can see this. Because of a lack of trust, the one who has much is afraid to take a risk and sees only what they possess as their only security.

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A MOMENT WITH TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

On December 10, 1979, a very petite holy woman known as Mother Teresa of Calcutta spoke these words in her Nobel Peace Prize Acceptance Speech, "But I am sure in the families and many of our homes, maybe we are not hungry for a piece of bread, but maybe there is somebody there in the family who is unwanted, unloved, uncared, forgotten, there isn't love. Love begins at home. And love to be true has to hurt. I never forget a little child who taught me a very beautiful lesson. They heard in Calcutta, the children, that Mother Teresa had no sugar for her children, and this little one, Hindu boy four years old, he went home and he told his parents: I will not eat sugar for three days, I will give my sugar to Mother Teresa. How much a little child can give. After three days they brought into our house, and there was this little one who could scarcely pronounce my name, he loved with great love, he loved until it hurt. And this is what I bring before you, to love one another until it hurts, but don't forget that there are many children, many children, many men and women who haven't got what you have. And remember to love them until it hurts."

Living authentically and walking with holiness always involves sacrifice. It has to hurt. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even what is apparently a generous gesture can be nothing. It is no wonder that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus and the young child in our story above the interest of Mother Teresa. It is easy to make the houses of our lives look like they are in perfect order when in fact they are in shambles within. Religion can sometimes make this hypocritical masquerade easy to accomplish. We can find ourselves in all the right holy places, reciting all of the correct prayers, participating in community collections, and reciting the proper doctrines only to find ourselves empty, shallow, self-focused, and overly anxious about personal concerns.

The one who learns to discover their inner poverty, their spiritual poverty, is the only one who can truly place him or herself at the mercy of God. It is only when we allow ourselves to be empty that we realize Who we actually need to fill us. This is the real meaning of trust. Many of us are afraid to take the plunge. We allow ourselves to detach from only so much, always keeping a watchful eye on the protection of our securities. We understand the value of poverty, but we do not want to become too poor. As long as we are able to recognize this tension, our reluctance to let go and our struggle, we can continue our journey of humbly learning how to love so deeply that it hurts. God understands and waits.

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
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
