

Good Morning World. It is January 10th, Monday of the first week in ordinary time. The readings for today's mass (including an audio version) may be found at usccb.org.

The gospel is from Mark 1:14-20

The Christmas season has ended. The Church returns to what is referred to as Ordinary Time.

#### ORDINARY TIME

What do the words Ordinary Time mean? Dorothy Day said, "The words 'Ordinary Time' in our prayer books put me in a state of confusion and irritation. To me, no time is ordinary." She was right. The Ordinary in Ordinary Time refers to ordinal—counted—time, not to a lack of something to celebrate. The Roman document, General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar, says: "Apart from those seasons having their own distinctive character [Advent, Christmas-time, Lent, Triduum and Eastertime], 33 or 34 weeks remain in the yearly cycle that do not celebrate a specific aspect of the mystery of Christ. Rather, especially on the Sundays, they are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects." (#43)

How do we celebrate "the mystery of Christ in all its aspects"? We gather every Sunday. Sunday is our original feast day. Christians have gathered every Sunday—the day of Christ's resurrection, the first day of the week—ever since there were Christians.

Each year there are two blocks of Ordinary Time, one in the winter between Christmastime and Lent, and the other in summer and fall, from Pentecost through Christ the King. When we gather on Sundays in Ordinary Time, as always, we hear the scriptures proclaimed. We systematically read through the gospels. The first readings from the first testament of the Bible were chosen for their relationship to the gospel

passages. The second readings come from the various letters of the second testament of the Bible. The mystery of Christ "in all its aspects" unfolds.

What is the heart of our Sunday celebration? We do our eucharist; that is, we do our thanksgiving. We praise and thank God for all creation; we pray for the whole world, as we remember Christ's life, death and resurrection. We share the bread and wine, the body and blood. We are sent forth to be the body and blood of Christ in our homes, our workplaces, our neighborhoods, our towns, our cities, our country, our world.

"What happens in our churches every Sunday is the fruit of our week. What happens as the fruit of the week past is the beginning of the week to come. Sunday is simultaneously a point of arrival and departure for Christians on their way to the fullness of the kingdom. This is not ordinary at all. This is the fabric of Christian living." (Saint Andrew Bible Missal [Brooklyn: William J. Hirten Co., 1982.])

The gospel today is taken from the "ordinary" time in the lives of Simon Peter, Andrew, James and John. It was just another day of being fishermen. And it was in the "ordinary" events of life that Jesus came to them and changed their lives forever.

And even though the liturgical sense of ordinary does not mean "usual" or "average" folks can often treat Ordinary Time that way. Advent and Christmas, Lent and Easter have such focus that the time apart from these holy seasons can appear usual or average, causing us to lose focus on our faith life and our faith journey as we go about the "ordinary" days of our lives.

But we can use that to our advantage. Because the other holy times of the year direction our attention in specific ways, we may not be looking for Jesus in the usual events of daily living.

Now, without these intentional focal points, we can look for Jesus in our rising and our going to bed. We can look for Jesus in our meals and in our hungers. We can look for Jesus in our busyness and in our loneliness. We can look for Jesus among our family and friends, and we can look for Jesus among strangers in our midst.

World, as you go about your "ordinary" day today, give the Holy Spirit permission to open your eyes and your ears, to open your mind and your heart to recognize Jesus in the usual happenings of your life.

### **Remembering Warmer Days**

Hello, Saint Pius X Community! The 1st Grade class is still chugging along, and we are all very excited about getting to see (and play in) the snow. Unfortunately, however, with snow comes some pretty frigid cold which can make for some uncomfortable days. Thankfully, we're coming up with some creative ideas to keep ourselves warm!

First, we have definitely created a warm atmosphere with our camping themed classroom! We do our best to make it feel like Summer is just around the corner, so we can get back out in the sun. Second, we make sure to do plenty of active brain breaks throughout the week. The kids love to do all different kinds of freeze dances and other movement based activities.





I am very happy to say that the cold has not slowed our learning progress.





#### INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Relationships are hard to clarify. Determining whether people in our lives are simply acquaintances and associates or a deeper level of friend is a journey that takes time. Identifying and celebrating those people who really care about us is a lifelong adventure that involves both moments of intense elation and heartache. Some relationships are more easily definable than others. Two people who are in love must decide whether the love they share has the freedom and depth necessary for lifelong commitments. Other relationships may look like friendship but may harbor grave dysfunction and toxicity. Discernment is needed on all fronts. Our relationship with God also needs definition and discernment. God has taken creation as His spouse and human beings as His children. God delights in us and all that He has made. The wedding feast at Cana demonstrates God's investment in all of this, especially our happiness. Life is a time for celebration and great rejoicing!

#### A MOMENT WITH TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

God delights in you. How do you feel when you hear that? Delight usually comes with an exuberant flow of joy that seemingly arises from one's toes with the expression of great glee. Reflecting upon the deep measure of joy God has in us can be a source of joy for ourselves. Delight is infectious. A very young brother and sister were playing on the beach when the all too familiar ice cream truck made its daily rounds. The boy shook with excitement and delight as he took his sister's hand and exclaimed, "The ice cream man is here, isn't it great!" As they ran off toward the truck, one could hear the girl reply, "Yeah, I can't wait!" The experience of a child's delight in something so simple as ice cream, lifts our spirits from our burdens and transports us to the lighter, more innocent side of life.

Life is not meant to be a burden. Believe it or not, God actually wants us to be happy! In fact, the wedding feast at Cana shows us that God even puts His blessing on our happiness. It is okay to celebrate the wonder of ourselves and others. Life is good. It is always interesting to note that Jesus saves the good wine until last. You would think it would be the other way around. The superb quality of Jesus' wine points to the superior quality of life we find in Christ. It is not a life of burdens but a life of wonder and delight! In Christ, we are lifted from the superficial and mundane to a life of purpose, hope, and love.

God is with us through the long haul, through the challenges and sorrows as well as the successes and accomplishments. In spite of the fact that we often wander from the path, God's celebratory delight in us remains. As spouses are asked to remain faithful to each other through whatever life brings, God remains faithful too. This promise remains through this life and into the next. All we have to do is take the advice of Jesus' mother to heart when she says, "Listen to him." This wisdom saves us from foolishly giving in to the illusion that we can make better wine than Jesus.

(NOTE: If you are making a recurring schedule, all of the funds that are chosen on that page will be recurring according to the same schedule. For donations on different schedules, you will have to complete separate schedules.)
- Enter your bank account (savings or checking) or credit card information (Visa, MC, Disc).

## **EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP**It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom.

Think about the wedding at Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her words apply to all.

Today, are we called to be the servers — do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may seem to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.


