MULL-ING THINGS OVER

I am writing this article on Christmas Eve morning. Because of printing schedules these bulletins need to be submitted quite early. I was awakened at 3:00 a.m. and asked to come to the Emergency Room today. As I drove over to the hospital, I was greeted by all sorts of outside Christmas decorations that adorned each home. As I drove down Main Street, bright lights, various figures, and curious ornaments greeted me. It certainly put me into the spirit of the season. When I arrived, however, I was immediately jilted into reality. The gentleman was struggling to live and very close to death. I greeted the family only slightly as the nurse grabbed me and moved me quickly to a room.

I had to put on a gown to protect me, gloves on the hands and change the mask on my face. I quickly anointed the gentleman and spoke with his wife and son. He then died. The room was marked with stilled silence. The now-widow was grasping his hand. I offered the final blessing of the Church. There were tears and words of sympathy from the Emergency Room staff. It all happened so quickly but I was told later that the EMT's had worked on him in the ambulance ride from the patient's house. We returned to the family in the waiting room. I had to change and wash up, so I arrived slightly later.

When I walked into the waiting room, it was a familiar scene, everyone hugging one another whispering words of love and support and an occasional little story being told. As no one was allowed back in the patient's room, the initial shock filled the waiting room. I felt bad for this family as it was Christmas Eve and they had lost a loved one. Because of COVID precautions, they were not able to say their good-byes in person to their father, grandfather, uncle, friend. By 5:00 a.m., all were gone.

As I drove away, I kept thinking about all that had transpired. The death, the health care workers who immediately began life-saving efforts. The family hoping against hope that their loved one would survive! Then, the terrible news that he was gone. The feeling of helplessness, the sadness of letting go, and the slightest hint of hope – after all we are Christians, and this was exactly what Jesus was born into the world to do.

In a few hours, I would be celebrating Christmas Mass. We would hear the ancient Christmas Story and re-live the stable, the angels, the shepherds, the infant in a manger and a very tired mother and father. We would tell the story of a loving God sharing His Son with our world. We would hear familiar music which we couldn't sing but was our own as we hummed along. We would receive Holy Communion and realize once again that Jesus was born with a mission. He needed to unlock the gates of heaven. He needed to restore God's sons and daughters to their dignity of being God's children, and He was to offer the gift of eternal life to His brothers and sisters. Isn't that what was happening earlier this morning. Without realizing it, we were living the continuation of the Christmas story as we offered back to God a loyal son, loving husband, and a faithful Christian. As I prayed and offered him the final sacraments of our Church, I was wrapping him in that very same love God gave the world through His Son. As we lifted him up in death to his Creator God, we were professing our faith in resurrection and new life – and, not only that, but our belief that God had gifted that to this newly deceased gentleman.

One of the reasons we find Christmas beautiful is its innocence. We see the newborn Babe in the manger, we see the warmth of love in a mother and father and we recall the angels' songs and feel the protection of the shepherds and somehow sense all is right with the world. There is something peaceful, warm and real about Christmas. Incidents like the one described above, however, force us to move out of our comfort zone and see the reality of Christmas. Jesus had to be born, he had to be cared for by loving parents. He had to witness violence even in the early years of his life. Jesus had to be baptized (which we celebrate today) and in that, receive his assignment from God – to be the Savior of the world. What was that mission? It was to save the world and open the gates of heaven which Jesus accomplished by His death on the Cross and His resurrection from the dead. This full mission was inherent with His birth. It was in that inherence that we take strength and hope.



Did you know?

St. Francis-St. Stephen School partners with St. Pauly Textile Inc. to collect used clothing and textiles. The school receives payment for these items, which are then distributed both here in the U.S. and worldwide to people who need them. St. Pauly collects over 120,000 pounds of clothing every day and estimates that this clothing ends up in 44 different countries yearly. In 2017 the company was able to help keep over 20 million articles of clothing out of landfills. The company was founded 22 years ago in Rochester and is an A+ rated member of the Better Business Bureau. Accepted items include clothing, shoes, sneakers, belts, purses, blankets, sheets, drapes, linens, pillowcases and stuffed animals. Donors are asked to donate items in a plastic bag to protect against dirt and the elements. Receipts are available in a small box located on the shed which is located in the school parking lot. Please keep us in mind when you are cleaning out your closets. Your donation helps the school and the environment!

“La Cultura del Cuidado como Camino de la Paz”—Mensaje del Papa para 2021

Cada año los papas han escrito mensajes para las jornadas mundiales de la paz. **Papa Francisco escribió su mensaje para esta 54ª Jornada de la Paz** con el título de arriba. En medio de la pandemia de Covid-19, practicar y educar para cuidar, escribe Papa Francisco, es la manera de “erradicar la cultura de la indiferencia, el descarte y la confrontación, que a menudo prevalece hoy en día.” La **cultura del cuidado**, como “**compromiso común, solidario y participativo para proteger y promover la dignidad y el bien de todos**”, y “disposición a interesarse, a la atención, a la compasión, a la reconciliación y a la curación, al respeto mutuo y a la acogida recíproca”, constituye un medio para construir la paz, a fin de “erradicar la cultura de la indiferencia, el descarte y el enfrentamiento, que a menudo prevalece hoy en día.”

El recuerda los muchos testimonios de caridad y solidaridad, pero a la vez existen formas de racismo, nacionalismo, xenofobia, guerras y conflictos. El vuelve a la doctrina social de la Iglesia diciendo que esa es el fundamento de la cultura del cuidado. **El cuidado debe promover la dignidad y derechos de la persona.** Que demos un no al individualismo, a la vez a firmando inclusión y no exclusión y la dignidad y no la explotación. Hay un **cuidado del bien común.** La vida social, política y económica se realiza cuando está al servicio del bien común. Cada miembro del grupo debe poder conseguir más plena y fácilmente su propia perfección. Con la pandemia nos damos cuenta “**que todos estamos en la misma barca, todos frágiles.**” Pero **tenemos que remar juntos; nadie se salva solo.**

El **cuidado mediante la solidaridad** expresa concretamente el amor por el otro. Hay que tener una **determinación firme de empeñarse por el bien común—por todos y cada uno.** Hay que ver las otras naciones, pueblos como nuestro prójimo, compañero de camino, llamado a participar como nosotros en el banquete de la vida.

El **cuidado y la protección de la creación:** hay una necesidad de escuchar el clamor de los necesitados y de la creación. De esta escucha atenta y constante puede surgir un **cuidado de nuestra casa común y de los pobres.** Hay que tener en el corazón ternura, compasión y preocupación por los seres humanos para poder tener un sentimiento de íntima unión.

El papa invita líderes de naciones y organizaciones usar estas ideas como una brújula para un rumbo común. Si no viven todo esto, no habrá paz, por eso **es necesario educar a la cultura del cuidado, empezando en la familia y las otras instituciones de educación** en colaboración con la familia. Los líderes religiosos deben ayudar **por transmitir los valores de la solidaridad, el respeto a las diferencias, la acogida y el cuidado de los hermanos y hermanas más frágiles.**

“**La cultura del cuidado**, como compromiso común, solidario y participativo para proteger y promover la dignidad y el bien de todos, como una disposición al cuidado, a la atención, la compasión, la reconciliación y la recuperación, al respeto y la aceptación mutuos **es la manera de construir la paz.**”

Tenemos que trabajar “**todos juntos para avanzar hacia un nuevo horizonte de amor y paz, de fraternidad y solidaridad, de apoyo mutuo y acogida.**”

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE:

Couples should contact a priest at least nine months in advance of their date. A year or more notice is advisable to secure the church and time desired. If one of the couple is divorced, a church annulment will be required. Circumstances of the prior marriage determine whether or not an annulment might be possible. Consult a priest at least a year in advance.
