MULL-ING THINGS OVER

Ash Wednesday is on February 17, 2021. It is about ten days away. Last year we had Ash Wednesday and about three weeks later, COVID struck and our Lenten Season was radically changed. We did not have to worry about Lenten penance – we have lived it every day since. People lost their jobs, activity after activity after activity was cancelled. Parties never happened. Churches were closed. Restaurants were shut down. Hot spots developed – the biggest being in New York City right in our state! We quickly learned to be resilient. We became more aware of our neighbor and health care workers became heroes – and then some! Words like “face mask,” “social-distancing,” “COVID-19,” became common day language that we understood. Holy week and Easter became live-stream events.

Perhaps the biggest surprise was the fact that here eleven months later, it is still present, and we are still following protocols to keep us and others safe. The face masks have become a part of dressing style. We begin our days putting on that face mask and end the day by taking it off. Businesses are only partially opened and new protocols are in place to protect us. We do have vaccines but cannot distribute them quickly enough. Ash Wednesday will arrive nonetheless, and Lent will begin. Have you thought about what you will do for Lent?

We will observe Ash Wednesday differently. We all are used to coming to Church, having an ashened cross marked on our foreheads and instructed in the words: “Turn away from sin and believe in the Gospel.” Not this year. For safety’s sake, we have been asked to revert to an even more ancient tradition. In the first three centuries of our Church, on Ash Wednesday, Christians, wearing sackcloth, would come forward, present themselves to the priest and bow their heads. The priest would then sprinkle a few ashes on the crown of each person’s head. Because of protocols, we are not to touch others, this ancient method allows us to give ashes without touching people. Because of the close proximity in which we will stand, we are not allowed to speak lest we spread the disease, no words will be spoken. In the silence of Ash Wednesday’s prayer, the ashes will be sufficient a sign to remind us that we are entering into a holy season. As we return to our seats, we are asked to recall the penance that will be our Lenten activity.

Perhaps rather than giving up something, since we are still giving up a lot, we might promise an attitudinal change. For instance, since we are spending much more time with family, we will promise to be a little more patient and try to be a little more understanding. After all, we are all facing the challenges of COVID and all trying to protect ourselves and others. Another option – share something good with others. If you know a healthcare worker, thank them personally and tell them you appreciate all that they are doing. If a family member or a friend have recovered from COVID, go out of your way to congratulate them and tell them they still have your prayers. Be happy for another person’s achievements. Instead of giving up a meal, plan a special family night once a week. Let everyone have a chance to choose what the night’s activity will be – since you must be together anyway – it would be good to do something everyone enjoys and good to plan the night out together.

Prayer is something we can do together. Or, perhaps the COVID situation can give everyone the opportunity for a little personal, quiet prayer. Perhaps all the COVID protocols have taken time and you need to refresh your relationship with God. Maybe you have become a little angry with God because all of this continues happening. There may be a need for peace between you and God and the Lenten Season is a time for a peace-talk, slowing down, worrying less, and being reminded that God is going through this with us! Private prayer is always a good time to be refreshed by the grace of God as we speak with God, pray for those we love, those who are suffering, and those who may be in the throes of suffering. It may also be good to tell folks you are praying for them. This can strengthen the bonds of friendship and help others realize that they don’t have to suffer alone. Bringing us closer to the heart of God helps refresh our strength and our grace.

Some may wish to get out and take a walk or bundle up and appreciate winter’s natural beauty. If you do this, plan to do it safely. If it is icy or snowy it is probably not a good time to go out – but enjoy the beauty you see outside your window and getting a nice deep breath of fresh air, standing on the porch. Admiring God’s beauty is one way of appreciating the good things God has given us and helps us remember that even in the bleakest of times, God is with us bringing light into darkness. Remember to take time to pray for your parish, your pastoral staff and those who have been praying for you throughout the pandemic. It will be a different Lent for us this year. We must, however, be creative in doing something to make this Season holy and grace filled. God bless you!

**DIOCESE OF ROCHESTER
 PERMANENT DIACONATE**

The deacon is a man of faith, who is called from the community that already has recognized his dedication to service. He makes a lifetime commitment to serving the People of God by proclaiming the Word, assisting and presiding at liturgies, and ministering in areas of charity and social justice. A deacon gives witness to his availability to the community by addressing present and emerging needs of the Church. The Diocese is inviting interested men of strong and active faith, who can demonstrate a record of service to the communities in which they live, work and worship, who may wish to explore a possible call to ordained ministry as a permanent deacon, to first speak with their pastor for an initial conversation. They may also contact Deacon Edward Giblin, Director of the Office of the Permanent Diaconate, atedward.giblin@dor.org, for additional information. A potential candidate must be at least 35 years of age and no older than 62 years of age at the time of ordination after a 5 (five) year period of formation. He must be in good health, emotionally mature, have stable relationships and must have the wholehearted support from his wife (if married) and family to enter the phase of inquiry. Because the parish is the primary experience of Church for most inquirers, the parish community is asked as well to invite from among its members men who exhibit a strong faith and a spirit of service and encourage them to consider vocation to the permanent diaconate.

A Little Lenten Exercise

This will be a different Lent for us. Some of the regular practices which we perform as part of our Lenten experience will change. Fr. Tom has explained in his Mulling Things Over letter our Lenten practices will change this year. As for Social Ministry, we will have to make changes as well.

First, I would like you to sign a petition-either online if you are attending Mass via live stream or in Church if you are present at either Church. This is the yearly Public Policy petition which is usually done in the pews with the sheet on clip boards. This cannot be done this year, so please sign at the doors or online. The issue this year is NOURISH NEW YORK which has provided \$35 million in funding from May to December. To date 4,100 farms have provided over 17 million pounds of New York, high quality food to New Yorkers in need. The governor has agreed to this and more. We cannot let this initiative die. Please sign online the address is in the bulletin in the NOURISH NEW YORK article or sign in church.

Second: Rice Bowl folders will be at the doors as well, please take one and use it for your Lenten financial sacrifices. They, along with the Little Black Prayer Books, will only be there one week. Please take one and use it during Lent. Donations through Rice Bowl reach 159 million people; 75% of your donation supports Catholic Relief Services work around the world, 25% is returned to the parish to fight hunger and poverty in our own community. Did you know?

St. Francis-St. Stephen School partners with St. Pauly Textile Inc. to collect used clothing and textiles. The school receives payment for these items, which are then distributed both here in the U.S. and worldwide to people who need them. St. Pauly collects over 120,000 pounds of clothing every day and estimates that this clothing ends up in 44 different countries yearly. In 2017 the company was able to help keep over 20 million articles of clothing out of landfills. The company was founded 22 years ago in Rochester and is an A+ rated member of the Better Business Bureau. Accepted items include clothing, shoes, sneakers, belts, purses, blankets, sheets, drapes, linens, pillow-cases and stuffed animals. Donors are asked to donate items in a plastic bag to protect against dirt and the elements. Receipts are available in a small box located on the shed which is located in the school parking lot. Please keep us in mind when you are cleaning out your closets. Your donation helps the school and the environment!



¡Ay de Mí, Si No Anuncio el Evangelio!

“¡Ay de mí, si no anuncio el evangelio!” Así se expresa San Pablo en su primera carta a los corintios. Esa fe firme que Pablo tenía en Jesucristo al escribir a los corintios no siempre había tenido-- no hasta algunos años antes cuando la luz de Cristo lo tiró al suelo y la voz de Cristo le preguntó por qué él estaba persiguiéndolo. Una fe gratuita, una fe firme, una fe que le pidió acción y compartimiento, una fe que le dio vida, una fe que le dio un porqué por vivir.

Por años Pablo no había prestado atención a la verdad del evangelio de Jesucristo, pero una vez que vio la luz y fue bautizado, él era un discípulo firme, uno que creía firmemente en la verdad del evangelio y la salvación por medio de Jesucristo.

¿Y nosotros? ¿Nos sentimos tan retados por nuestra fe, nuestra creencia en Jesucristo y sus palabras de hacer de todos pueblos sus discípulos y de enseñar a otros su evangelio? ¿Nos sentimos tan convencidos que vamos a decir: “¿Ay de mí, si no anuncio el evangelio?” ¿Cómo puedes anunciarlo a tu familia—a tu esposo(a) y a tus hijos, a tus compañeros de trabajo, a tus vecinos, tus compañeros de clase? No es solo con palabras; los hechos, las acciones, y la manera por la cual estás con otra persona enseñan mucho. Vuelve al evangelio de este domingo. Jesús se levantó temprano para ir aparte para orar y ganar la fuerza para su día de acción. Su día estaba lleno de actividades: de prestar oído al sufrimiento y los dolores de la gente y al mal y las tentaciones que existían en todas partes. Escuchando, echando afuera el mal, consolando, curando, estando presente, sirviendo de muchas maneras y también predicando con palabras, pero más frecuentemente predicando con acción.

Piensa en tus días y las oportunidades que tienes para mostrar que tienes tiempo para la otra persona, para escuchar a pesar de tu cansancio, para aliviar el dolor del otro. Piensa cómo puedes servir al otro—lavar los platos después de la comida para la cocinera, preparar alguna comida favorita para su esposo o hijos. Puedes hacer algo que no le gusta hacer sin quejarse o dar al otro un regalito, aunque no es un día especial. Ah, hay tantas maneras de mostrar el amor, la bondad, el respeto, la empatía al otro. Así uno va predicando el amor del evangelio, y otros entonces pueden decir: “Miren cómo los cristianos se aman uno al otro.”

Que esto sea un desafío para todos nosotros.
