

DIOCESE OF ROCHESTER PERMANENT DIACONATE

The deacon is a man of faith, who is called from the community that already recognizes his dedication to service. He makes a lifetime commitment to serving the People of God by proclaiming the Word, assisting and presiding at liturgies, and ministering in the areas of charity and social justice. A deacon gives witness to his availability to the community by addressing present and emerging needs of the Church. The Diocese is inviting interested men of strong and active faith, who can demonstrate a record of service in the communities in which they live, work and worship, who may wish to explore a possible call to ordained ministry as a permanent deacon, to first speak with their pastor for an initial conversation. They may also contact Deacon Edward Giblin, Director of the Office of the Permanent Diaconate, at edward.giblin@dor.org, for additional information. A potential candidate must be at least 35 years of age and no older than 62 years of age at the time of ordination after a five (5) year period of formation. He must be in good health, emotionally mature, have stable relationships and must have the wholehearted support of his wife (if married) and family to enter the phase of inquiry. Because the parish is the primary experience of Church for most inquirers, the parish community is asked as well to invite from among its members men who exhibit strong faith and a spirit of service and encourage them to consider a possible vocation to the permanent diaconate.

A Word From Father John...

Merry Christmas to one and all! I hope that the first days of the Christmas season are going well, and offering you a chance to rest, relax and enjoy the company of family and friends, whether in-person or virtually. As happens with the print schedule for our bulletins around this time of year, I am writing this on Wednesday, December 15, which in some ways makes it hard to enter into the spirit of the Christmas season. Yet, I remain hopeful that our celebrations of the Nativity of the Lord, along with the Holy Family, the Epiphany, and the Baptism of our Lord will be opportunities for us to focus on the light, life and love with which Jesus Christ comes to us and then shares with us. May the gift of Christ's presence in our Lord and one another bring peace and joy to the messiness of our lives. For we all are challenged to be peaceful and joyous as we come to terms with the messiness of our lives.

To help us with finding peace and joy amid the messiness of the world and our lives, we are sharing with you free copies of Matthew Kelly's latest book, Life Is Messy. We are grateful to the generosity of a parishioner, who made this possible. As Matthew has explained, he was motivated to write this book, as the events of the last two years have shown us the cracks in our lives and in our society, and challenged us to make sense of it, when for many, our lives just don't seem to make sense anymore. Discussing the promise and benefits of reading and reflecting on this book, Matthew offers that it is intended to help us make peace with the mess. While we can fix many things and lessen their negative effects, we can't fix everything. After doing so, life still will be messy. He desires to lead us away from our culture's obsession and addiction with certainty. As he points out, even if we are doing everything right, life remains messy.

At the same time, Matthew desires to liberate us from the shame and self-loathing that can be so destructive to ourselves and our relationships. We need to recognize that while we don't have it all together, no one does. How many of us have not discovered that the curated images fashioned on social media belie the reality of the mess with which our friends and family are dealing. As we post images of friends and family gathered together smiling, we can't forget all the difficulties and strife that were passed through to make that image possible. Shame and self-loathing is fueled by comparing that leads to despairing. We need to move away from a self-referential context, in which we lose awareness of who is in front of us and with what they are dealing. On this feast of the Holy Family, we need to recognize that our family isn't the only one that puts fun in dysfunction. Even the holy family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph had its share of tension and strife. Life is messy for all of us, including Jesus who became one of us and was a part of an extended human family that did not magically escape the messiness of the human condition.

For those of you who are familiar with any of Matthew's many other books, Life is Messy is different in terms of format and context. He offers us a very personal angle on his three years of excruciating suffering as he draws on his own private journals to serve as the source material for this book. In this way, he bears his soul to offer a unique insight into life and struggles. Also, the book has a less finished feel in order to evoke that sense of messiness that is a reality for all of us. As he grapples with questions about the messiness of his life, himself, the world and other people, he gives us permission and invites us to do the same for ourselves. In terms of how much to share, Matthew attempted to strike a balance offering specifics enough to get us into the ballpark, but keeping it vague enough to allow us to see ourselves in the book.

As the reality of the pandemic has dragged on, it is easy for us to feel, "I'm not enough. I'm inadequate." It is all too easy for us to catalogue all the ways that we don't measure up to expectations. Our disposable culture readily resorts to throwing out whatever doesn't measure up and getting a new one. But what about broken people, broken relationships, broken institutions, broken families, and our very own broken selves? Drawing on the Japanese artform of Kintsugi, Matthew challenges us to ask, 'Whether someone, who has been devastatingly broken and wounded, as a result of the actions of others or their own bad choices, can be healed, made more beautiful, move lovable than ever before?' I invite you to pick up and read this book to discover and reflect on how that is possible and our role in putting people and the world back together, making them more beautiful and loveable than ever before.

Free copies of the book will be available for anyone to pick up in each of our churches and from the parish office over the course of the next few weeks, while supplies last. Those of you who are fans of Dynamic Catholic's BestLentEver program especially may want to pick up a copy and read Life Is Messy, since this coming year's program will be based on the book.

So, in the midst of the messiness that is our human reality, on behalf of my fellow priests and the members of our parish staff, I wish you and your loved ones a very blessed and Merry Christmas and renewed hope for the coming New Year! Peace and blessings to all, as we ask God to help us to revel in the joy and wonder that Christ's coming affords us, especially amid the messiness of our lives and the world!


