




CATHOLIC CONVERSATIONS: DEATH WITH TRUE DIGNITY



A Word From Father John...

Today, we come to the end of the Christmas season with the celebration of the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Following his baptism by John, Jesus was driven by the Holy Spirit into the desert wilderness, where he overcame the devil and all his temptations. This prepared him to enter what is called his public ministry, when Jesus went about healing, preaching and teaching. As we return to our celebration of Ordinary Time starting tomorrow, the readings and liturgies fittingly shift to focus on Jesus' words and actions during his public ministry. As I am sure that we all appreciate, there is nothing ordinary about this time and the extraordinary things revealed by Jesus Christ. Instead, this is "ordinary" in the sense that the Sundays and weeks are counted and ordered as 'First,' 'Second,' 'Third,' and so forth.

While I imagine most of us were baptized as infants, we too received that same gift of the Holy Spirit. And no doubt, through the course of our lives, while we may not have been driven out into the desert wilderness by the Holy Spirit, we have had to face the devil and his temptations. Yet, hopefully, in the course of our ordinary lives, we have drawn on the extraordinary gift of grace and the indwelling of the Holy Spirit to overcome those temptations and do the good work that God is calling us to do. For much like Jesus following his baptism and temptation, we too make our way in the world with its share of challenges and opportunities to call on the Lord and make Christ more present and alive through our words and actions for those we encounter along the way.

And following the pattern that Jesus set before us, we do not do that alone. For the Holy Spirit dwells within us, inspiring and empowering our thoughts, words and actions to faith, hope and love. And like those original disciples, we gather together with others recalling all that Christ taught us and sharing in the Eucharist. And then we are sent forth with others to spread the good news of Jesus Christ through our words and actions. As we live our life in Christ, giving evidence of our faith, hope and love, others are inspired to follow our Lord and seek baptism into the community that gathers to offer thanksgiving, praise and worship of God and that is sent out to preach the good news of Jesus Christ to a world hungry for grace.

As our Christmas feasting and celebrations conclude and we pack up all the decorations that mark out the season as something 'extraordinary,' when compared to the 'normal' course of our lives (if such a thing exists in the midst of a pandemic), we do not forget that the effects of the extraordinary events recalled and celebrated in the Christmas season, from the birth of Christ to his baptism by John, make Ordinary Time just as extraordinary and open to experiencing the gifts of peace, love and joy that Christ's coming brings to us and the world.

If our current lives seem far removed from such positive experiences, then hopefully, we have had an opportunity to pick up a copy of Matthew Kelly's latest book, *Life Is Messy*, and begin reading it. At first, it may bring comfort knowing that others, even including a successful and inspirational speaker and author, like Matthew Kelly, have had their share of difficult and challenging times. But, with the help of God's grace, as we move through the book, we may discover that someone, who has been devastatingly broken or wounded, can be healed, made more beautiful, and more loveable than ever before. Please feel free to share copies of the book with family members and friends, who are going through difficult times and might benefit from reading and reflecting on Matthew's experience and insights.

Peace and blessings that we may continue to experience God's extraordinary gifts as we move into Ordinary Time.


