

From Fr. Joe...

Something rather concerning was brought to my attention after the Masses last Sunday, and it involves the reception of Holy Communion. It seems that, particularly during the current mask mandate, several folks who have received Communion in the hand have unknowingly broken the host as they bring the Blessed Sacrament to their mouth while also manipulating their mask, so that they consume only part of the host and drop the other part on the floor. I am certain no irreverence is intended...yet this is something we really must remedy, giving proper and due respect to both our Eucharistic Lord and to the faithful whom he feeds with his most sacred Body. Please exercise the greatest care when receiving Holy Communion. Wearing a mask, of course, makes it extra difficult and awkward. A few things you might consider: (1) if receiving in the hand, pull down/remove your mask just *before* approaching the minister, so that your hands are occupied with nothing else as you receive the host; (2) as a general rule, if receiving in the hand, have nothing else in your hands (such as a rosary, gloves, handkerchief, keys, etc.) unless it is strictly necessary (such as carrying a cane); (3) choose to receive Communion on the tongue, which allows your hands to tend to your mask alone; (4) however you choose to receive, take your time and pay careful attention to make sure that the Blessed Sacrament is always handled with the utmost reverence and that no particle of it is lost—for this is, after all, the Body, Blood, soul and divinity of the Son of God that you're receiving.

May the Heart of Jesus, in the Most Blessed Sacrament, be praised, adored, and loved with grateful affection, at every moment, in all the tabernacles of the world, even until the end of time!
