Pro-life is still a winning strategy at the state level: As evident in the recently-released "Life List 2021" report from Americans United for Life, pro-life laws at the state level are still very much alive and thriving. AUL named Arkansas the most pro-life state, because it passed 10 pro-life laws in 2019, which were then allowed to go into effect following the 2020 *June Medical Services* Supreme Court ruling. There are many other examples of this state-level strategy, including Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis signing in the summer of 2020 a pro-life bill into law that requires minors receive parental consent before having an abortion. Pro-lifers expect this state-level trend will continue into 2021.

Have You Considered Commissioned Lay Ministry? You could become a Commissioned Lay Minister in your parish. A new Formation for Ministry class will be starting in the Fall. Pray and ask God if this would be right for you! Then speak to Fr. LaBaff.

Volunteers Needed: The Foster Grandparent Program's purpose is to provide opportunities for persons aged 55 and older, to provide person-to-person services in health, education, and the welfare of children ages 21 and below. Foster Grandparents are placed in a classroom setting with a child or children who are in need of emotional support, development of basic learning skills, to provide friendship, companionship, encouragement, individual attention, and unhurried help. The Foster Grandparent also receives a small non-taxable stipend bi-weekly that cannot be held against any current benefits you may already have and you also get paid mileage for your travel. February...A Month of Love

February, the month of Love and Valentine's Day, is a time for remembering love and emphasizing its importance in our lives. As one author said, "this one little word has an enormous impact on our lives...the power to lift our spirits or send us into the depths of despair."

Love is a strong force, a great good in every way. Alone it can make our burdens light, and alone can make things equally pleasing and unpleasing.

Though Love is a basic human emotion, it is difficult to define. The Greeks actually use three forms of the word Love to describe it: Eros, Phileo and Agapao. Eros is the word for sexual attraction; Phileo for the love one feels for a relative or close friend ("brotherly love"). And Agapao is used in classical Greek literature to describe what we call "true love", reflecting the actions associated with the urgency and passion of Eros as well as the caring of Phileo. It is God's Love.

Love is heavily rooted in the character of God. We can love others because He first loved us...and He loves us unconditionally regardless of our behavior...what we have done or said. Love is mentioned anywhere from 300 to 551 times in the Bible, depending on the version, and occurs both in the Old and New Testaments in all the versions.

Love is a basic necessity in everyone's life. Everyone needs to be loved to live a proper and healthy life. Even tiny babies need love to grow. Babies left in hospitals or orphanages without the warmth of a tender embrace or loving touch do not thrive.

St. Augustine describes Love this way: Love...What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like.

The columns of the next 3 weeks of February will focus on various aspects relating to love: Valentine's Day, Saints who were committed to Love and the greatest Love of all, the Love of God.
