Any builder worth his or her salt knows the value and importance of a cornerstone. Properly laying and securing this primary unit determines how the rest of the project unfolds and its success. Cornerstones are necessary elements not only of buildings but of lives as well. Many human beings conduct the business of their lives paying little attention to a grounding reference or starting point. Hence, what unfolds is a tapestry of relativism, with few anchors or guideposts and many impulsive choices. Some consider love to be their cornerstone. While this may sound attractive and useful, the pursuit of love without a simultaneous pursuit of its source can be shallow and self-focused. Just because a person chooses to do no harm and love others does not mean that they are living in truth and properly anchored to the real cornerstone.

Jesus is the true and authentic cornerstone and shepherd. It is only in following the Risen One as the way, the truth, and the life that we can move from being well grounded ethical people to properly focused moral ones. Proper conduct, a true sense of justice, wisdom, virtue, moral principles, faith, hope, and love will be difficult to find unless we listen to the right Voice. It is when we learn to listen to the voice of God that we begin our journey on the road to salvation. It is only the Good Shepherd, the authentic and solid cornerstone, who can guide us through life's questions and challenges and bring us to the safe and proper pasture.

A person's life only has meaning when the cornerstone is properly selected and set. Understanding themselves only as random acts of creation, existing without intent or purpose, will color their choices and influence their decisions. The foundation of their lives will be simply a matter of preference and choice, leaving benchmarks of growth and higher ideals optional to pursue. Whereas people who believe that they are fashioned and loved into existence by a God who purposely made them, have this incredible unconditional relationship at their source which has tremendous significance. Their allegiance is not to themselves but to their Creator. Life, then, is an adventure in search of this Creator God and a journey of self-discovery that seeks to unite their will to His. There is a cost. We have to give up our life in order to gain our life. As ironic as that sounds, it is true. It is only when we finally figure this out that the true cornerstone of our lives will be properly laid and we can, with God's help, get about the business of properly constructing a temple that endures.

Raising Better Kids: A 2018 Harvard University study of over 5,000 adolescents, who were followed for more than eight years (and controlled for many other variables), showed that those adolescents who attended at least weekly religious services and who prayed regularly—compared with those who never attended religious services—demonstrated greater life satisfaction, a stronger sense of mission, practiced more forgiveness, and volunteered far more. They also had lower probabilities of drug use, early sexual initiation, STIs, and abnormal Pap test results, as well as fewer lifetime sexual partners. (Study published 9/13/2018 in the American Journal of Epidemiology)

Our Church — Our Future

The Diocesan plan for the future has designated that St. Mary's Church, Clayton and the Catholic Community of Alexandria will be sharing one priest. St. John's Church, LaFargeville will become an Oratory.

What is an Oratory? Our Diocese says "Oratory status designates a church that is no longer a parish or mission and which no longer has regularly scheduled services. An oratory is the responsibility of the local parish."

Care of the people, property, and records of St. John's Oratory will be done by St. Mary's Church. The people will be parishioners of St. Mary's. The records will be kept at St. Mary's. And the property, including St. John's Cemetery, will be the responsibility of St. Mary's. As parishioners of St. Mary's, it will be important for us to be present, to participate in the life of St. Mary's, and to have a voice in the decisions made concerning St. Mary's Parish and St. John's Oratory.

The new Oratory usually keeps that status for a term of 5 years. At that time the status can be reassessed.

What does this mean for the people of St. John's? With oratory status, there will not be regular Masses at St. John's. We will be parishioners of St. Mary's.

We will grieve. Certainly St. John's parishioners will feel the loss of our faith "home". For many it is the only church we have attended for many years where we, our parents, our grandparents, our children, and our grandchildren celebrated the sacraments. Certainly, it will take a bit to feel comfortable in a different parish and to make new "faith friends".

First and foremost, we must continue to celebrate the Eucharist for that is what is important! We are fortunate to have already had opportunities to celebrate Masses and socialize with the people of St. Mary's—the Lenten Mass and Soup Supper is an example. Our young people come together for First Communion and Confirmation prep, the sacrament of Confirmation, Youth activities, and the Mystery Players.

Earth Day

In 2016, Joe Paprocki, DMin, National Consultant for Faith Formation at Loyola Press, suggested ways to make the observance of Earth Day a truly Catholic experience. They are adapted for use here:

- * Give praise to our Creator. In the Nicene Creed, we say, “I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth.”
Pray the Creed.
- * Contemplate (rest in God’s presence) to come to a deeper appreciation of finding God in all of creation. Pope John Paul II said, “Faced with the glory of the Trinity in creation, we must contemplate, sing, and rediscover awe.”
- * Pray for those at risk from exposure to environmental hazards. Pray for future generations that they may benefit from a healthy environment.
- * Consider planting a vegetable garden to share with others. Create a “Mary Garden,” a tradition going back to medieval times that dedicates the garden to the Blessed Virgin Mary and grows plants that bear her name.
- * Read what Scripture and Tradition have to say about ecology and the environment. (Gn 2:15; Lv 25:1-7; Mt 6:25-34; Ps 24 1-2; Rom 1:20).
- * Read about the lives of St. Francis of Assisi and St. Kateri Tekakwitha. These two saints are the patron and patroness of ecology.
- * Learn ways to help your parish “go green.” Don Beaulieu’s article called “It’s Easy Being Green” in *Salt of the Earth* outlines six ways to “help the parish develop a green streak.”
- * Take the St. Francis Pledge to care for creation and the poor. The St. Francis Pledge, initiated by the Catholic Climate Covenant, is a solemn commitment made by Catholic individuals, groups, and institutions to honor God’s creation and to serve those who are poor.
- * Make a donation to Catholic Relief Services, the official international humanitarian agency of the U.S. Catholic community, promotes caring for the environment in the U.S. and abroad.
- * Read ‘Laudato Si’. Pope Francis’s encyclical on how we need to care for our common home and links it to our Catholic faith.
