National Image of Our Lady of Guadalupe Monday, December 27 at 11:30am in St. Mary's Church Mass at 12:05pm with Mary devotions to follow. All welcome.



Mary has appeared throughout the last 2000 years to different peoples all around the world. We have all heard the story of how Mary appeared to Juan Diego and told him to build a church on the hill in her honor. Upon returning to his town and informing the archbishop of what he had seen, the Archbishop instructed him to return to Tepeyac and ask for a sign that this was indeed the Virgin Mary. Mary instructed Juan Diego to fill his tilma with roses and carry them back to the archbishop. When Juan Diego laid the roses before the archbishop there on his tilma was an image of the Virgin Mary, the image that we know today as Our Lady of Guadalupe.

Pope Francis, in an audience shortly before her feast day in 2013, spoke of one of the most important aspects of Mary: "When the image of the Virgin appeared on the tilma of Juan Diego, it was the prophecy of an embrace: Mary's embrace of all the people of the vast expanses of America—the peoples who already lived there, and those who were yet to come. Mary's embrace showed what America

-North and South—is called to be: a land where different peoples come together; a land prepared to accept human life at every stage, from the mother's womb to old age; a land which welcomes immigrants, and the poor and the marginalized in every age; a land of generosity." Mary as our Mother, a Mother for all peoples.

Worldwide Marriage Encounter:



Catholic Relief Services (CRS)

has recently formed a chapter here in the Rochester Diocese that enables our parishioners to gain insight into how we can advocate as our Christian Faith calls us.

CRS believes that our work together in the United States is the outward expression of missionary discipleship. Together, we are called to encounter Christ in the members of our human family most in need, and to share the Good News with others, becoming prophetic advocates for justice and the common good. CRS' campaigns to lead the way on the global issues of hunger, forced displacement and migration which allow us to do just that. Your advocacy is an opportunity to stand with migrants, refugees and those experiencing hunger and malnutrition. Pope Francis reminds us, "This is not a time for indifference, because the whole world is suffering and needs to be united in facing the pandemic."

Linked to that, each year, Congress negotiates how to spend U.S. taxpayer dollars through a process called appropriations. Of the \$4 trillion U.S. federal budget, about 1% is appropriated, or allocated for spending by Congress, to foreign assistance. Half of that 1% is directed toward poverty-reducing humanitarian and development aid. Through the U.S. Department of State, the U.S. Agency for International Development and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, organizations such as CRS partner with the U.S. government to implement programming funded by the U.S. Congress. Foreign aid maintains strong bipartisan support.

Over the next few weeks look here in the bulletin for more information how you can advocate that this important component of the federal budget continue. -Faith Tarby—CRS team coordinator.

Nourish New York: Last year this was the issue on the Diocesan Public Policy Committee petition and <u>IT PASSED</u>. Now there is funding to purchase products like cheese, yogurt, milk, apples, etc from NY farms and makes it available to food pantries & soup kitchens. (including our Parish Food Pantry and Elmira Community Kitchen).

February 13-14 will be the annual *Diocesan Public Policy Advocacy Weekend*. This year the petition will focus on the NY State budget, specifically—a child tax credit for families with young children (age 0-4) and funding for community-based drug/alcohol addiction prevention/treatment and mental health.

Your support will again be needed, so please continue to educate yourselves on these important issues.



"CHRISTMAS TAKES A LEAP " by Fr. Walt Wainwright

Just yesterday we celebrated the birthday of our Savior Jesus Christ and today we are jumping ahead twelve years. Jesus is now a twelve-year-old and in the Jewish faith that is the age when all males begin to learn and observe the laws and traditions of the Jewish faith... So, Mary and Joseph take Jesus with them when they go to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover.

The gospel for today takes us through the events of their visit to Jerusalem: Jesus becoming lost, His parents searching for Him for three days, they're finally finding Him in the temple, their great relief and surprise when Jesus tells them that He had to be at home in His Father's house discussing the law and the prophets with the elders of the temple.

Afterwards Jesus returns to Nazareth with His parents and we are told that Jesus grew in age, wisdom, and grace.

Family life has always been treasured as the most important part of society. One thing we have all become conscious of is that a lot about family life has changed over the years. Very often we hear of someone saying that they wish we were back twenty or more years ago because life was much slower and quieter then. If that is true go back forty or fifty years when life, family life and most of society was not only quieter but closer to one another than it is today.

All too often we hear on the evening news or read in the paper of another teenager who is missing. So often he or she has 'taken off' because of some family difficulty, a tough family situation, abuse, or neglect. There are all kinds of reasons for these unhappy situations and far too many in comparison with years past.

Family life is going through a difficult time too. Perhaps one of the solutions might well be found in the Father's House (church). I mean both within the building of our churches but also in the realm of community life of which church certainly has an important role to play.

I would like to give a strong word of encouragement to our parents. Keep prayer in the family alive and strong. Don't presume that your kids get too old to want to say grace before meals and so on. And what about Sunday Mass? All too often I hear the comment from parents that goes, 'well my son/daughter doesn't want to go to church anymore and I'm not going to fight with them.' Don't accept that and remember that your own example is of greatest importance. All too often I've heard of youngsters saying, 'my parents don't go to church why should I?

You know, there is more power in prayer than we can ever imagine. So, please pray fervently for your own family, the families of your relatives and friends. Pray too for any families you know are in a difficult situation. Try to be supportive when you can.

May you all continue to enjoy this beautiful Christmas season.
