#### 2022 Diocesan Public Policy Weekend – February 12<sup>th</sup> & 13<sup>th</sup> Care for the Marginalized through an Equitable & Just NYS Budget

Do you know that nearly 1 in 5 children ages 0-4 in New York live in poverty? Do you know that children ages 0-4 are *not* covered in the Empire State Child Credit? Modest increases in income to low-income families can yield tremendous benefits for children and their families, including improved physical, emotional and behavioral health, and higher educational achievement. **The benefits are particularly significant** – **and most acutely needed** – **in families with young children**. Families with young children face poverty at greater rates than other families. In fact, the birth of a child is the leading trigger of "poverty spells" experienced by families. In addition, stress and hunger can impair brain development, which is most rapid when children are very young, and can lead to lifelong deficits. Strengthening family economic security improves the lives not only for the current generation of children, but the next, because poor children are much more likely to grow up to be poor adults. Our Diocesan Public Policy Committee is encouraging everyone to sign the petition calling for an Equitable and Just NYS Budget on February 12/13 – *Diocesan Public Policy Advocacy Weekend*. ### "LET US GLORY IN THE SAINTS"

Last fall when I retired for the second and final time, I received many beautiful cards and notes from parishioners. I was especially surprised by so many of the messages where people expressed the wish that I would continue to write my weekly column for the bulletin. Well as you can see, I have continued to do that. I was especially touched when so many said how much they enjoyed reading about the lives of the saints. Well, I want to let you know that I will continue to do that as well, beginning with this column today. Tomorrow is the feast of St. John Bosco and I think you will enjoy reading at least a little about his blessed life.

John was born in 1815 in the region around Turin, Italy. Sadly, his father died when John was still quite young, and his mother was left with the burden of raising John and two brothers. It was a difficult task as the family was not a wealthy family, but through a persistent struggle she managed to bring her boys to adulthood hale and healthy.

When John was only nine years old, he had a dream that planted the seed of his vocation which he pursued beginning with his dedication to helping young boys, especially 'street boys' who were rather rugged and in need of care. While John was still in his adolescent years, he did a lot to teach boys in the city of Turin, teaching them the basics of a trade so they could provide for themselves. In the dream he had when he was nine, a lady spoke to him and told him that if you want to lead these boys in the right way, take up a shepherds' staff and lead them. They will follow. And they did.

When John was ordained a priest, he spent a lot of his time in the streets of Turin talking to boys, inviting them to come to church, encouraging them to go to school and giving them the example of learning various trades for which he became very well known for doing and succeeding to a great extent. Eventually there was a need to build a trade school and Don Bosco, as he was called, found a building they could use and eventually purchase. Other young men who were working with Don Bosco studied for the priesthood and were ordained priests.

From this Don Bosco founded an order of priests and brothers call the Salesians. Don Bosco chose this name because of a great devotion he had to St. Francis deSales. The order grew and the primary mission was the care and teaching of young boys, especially the poor, of which there were so very many. The time came as well when they needed a larger church building and Don Bosco led the effort at fund raising to provide the money to build a church. And again, he succeeded in doing this.

The order of Salesians has grown in numbers and in the extent of their mission work. There are several thousands of Salesian fathers and brothers working in several countries today. It was not surprising that when Don Bosco died in the year 1888 that more than forty thousand people came to express their sympathy and to pay honor to this very holy and dedicated apostle to the young.

Don Bosco died in 1888 and was canonized a saint in the year 1934. His name is widely known but the story of his life is not so well known. I hope these few lines gives you some insight into his holy life.

I hope our new year is bringing you happiness and good health.
