

DEC. 25 - THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD (Christmas)

Readings: Day: Is 52:7-10/Heb 1:1-6/Jn 1:1-18 or 1:1-5, 9-14

What do we think of when we think of Christmas? Many of us will picture the manger scene, the star, the angels, the shepherds, the animals in the stall, and baby Jesus in the manger with Mary and Joseph looking on. The readings of the Midnight Mass focus on the Christ Child and the familiar Christmas story. But the reading for the Mass for Christmas Day reminds us that this baby from the beginning, from before Creation, is the almighty Son of God. In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. And yet this God made his dwelling among us. This God, whom the universe cannot contain, comes to us and dwells among us so we can see his glory. We can see him! We can be in relationship with him! He is the light that shines in the darkness, letting us know that we are not alone. Through the Son, we have access to the Father. All the ends of the Earth have seen the salvation by our God. Let us praise him and adore him, allow ourselves to be loved by him and then go to share his light and love with all whom we meet.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

At our Christmas Vigil Mass, we will hear St. Luke tell us that God was born in a manger because there was no room for Him in the inn. As we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Savior this year, it is fitting that we ask ourselves: Is there room for God in my heart?

We yearn to make room in our hearts and in our lives for the hurting. Their human dignity demands it. Our Christian dignity impels us.

We pray that the beautiful acts of generosity that characterize the Christmas Season, will be transformed from seasonal gestures of charity to lifelong acts of justice and mercy. Such personal transformation will give tangible evidence that we are *Christ-led*, *Christ-fed*, and Hope-filled. We can do great things in Christ Jesus, the Savior whose birth we celebrate with such joy and gratitude. Our God's unconditional love and boundless mercy became flesh and bones in the Person of Jesus Christ so that we might extend God's compassion and love.

May the Christ Child bring you and your loved ones the Gift of Love, the Blessing of Hope and the Promise of Peace. A blessed Christmas and joy-filled New Year!

Days of Christmas

I have always been fascinated by the Twelve Days of Christmas and how they help us keep the "spirit of Christmas." The background for the 12 day carol is familiar for some but still amazing.

From 1558-1829, Roman Catholics in England were not allowed to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote the carol, "The Twelve Days of Christmas," as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their Church. Each element in the carol has code words for a religious reality which the children could remember.



SCRIPTURE & MEDITATION

(Magnificat - December 2021)

"The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him" (Luke 2:33)

The Son of God became the obedient son of a foster father and a mother who, together, accepted him and walked obediently in God's mysterious ways like the faith-filled family extolled in Psalm 128. But their Child's children, destined for the heavenly Jerusalem, fill the whole world!



December 26, 2021

Feast of the Holy Family

Sir 3:2-6, 12-14 | Col 3:12-21 or 3:12-17 | Lk 2:41-52



Some of my fondest childhood memories are of my dad leading my three sisters and me in song as we made the hour-long drive to visit my grand-parents every other weekend. Granted, our silly car songs don't qualify as "singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs," as Paul advised the Colossians, but I do think they reveal that my dad took to heart Paul's advice about family and faith. Paul writes that in putting on holiness, kindness, gentleness, and forgiving one another, we "put on love, that is, the bond of perfection." Whatever we do, in word or deed, we ought to do in the name of the Lord Jesus. Fathers, mothers, and children are to love one another, seeking and choosing the good for one another, and helping each other along life's journey – on long car trips as well as in a lifetime of situations. On this feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we honor their perfect holiness and love, and pray that God may continue to perfect us in holiness and love within our own families, that we may bear good fruit for the Kingdom.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Three Days? Mary and Joseph couldn't find Jesus for three days! Any parent who has had a child missing for a few seconds understands the anxiety Mary and Joseph experienced in three long days of searching for Jesus. In the end, though, all is well – they find him, and the peace of Christ casts out their fears. It is a remarkable scene: Jesus' parents are astonished to see him teaching in the temple, and Jesus is curious as to why they were looking for him – did they not know where he would be? This event marks a sort of milestone in their lives together, as Jesus has hinted at his future public ministry, and his parents have experienced that first bit of soul-piercing that Mary will later fully undergo. For each of them, love is what directed their actions. Joseph and Mary put aside everything to search for their son; Jesus put aside everything to serve his Father; and they joined together in humble obedience to God's will for them. The Holy Family models a way of living for us to imitate, and to witness to others in that imitation.

SERVE/STUDY Perhaps you have some down time in this coming week between Christmas and New Year's. As a family, choose an activity that allows you to think outside yourselves and serve others. Or make a plan to read the Scripture for each day of the upcoming week; everyone can choose a favorite verse to memorize each day. You may be surprised how often these verses enter your mind throughout the week.



The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph Sunday, December 26, 2021

Gospel Reading: Luke 2:41-52 The boy Jesus is found in the Temple.

Family Connection

Today's Gospel describes a time of anxiety in the life of Jesus' family. We can imagine their panic and worry as they discovered that Jesus was not with the caravan returning to Nazareth. The Holy Family journeyed with family members and friends because traveling alone was dangerous. When they found Jesus at the Temple, Jesus spoke like a typical adolescent, unsympathetic to his parents' concern. Yet his words teach an important lesson about reducing anxiety in our family life. In essence, Jesus says, "If you had remembered who I am, you would have known where to find me." In their panic, Mary and Joseph had forgotten what had been told to them before Jesus' birth, that their son was the Son of God. Knowing a person well helps reduce our anxieties for them because we can better predict how they will behave, and we know their capacity to handle the challenges life might present to them.

As you gather as a family, have fun playing the game "How well do you know me?" Take turns trying to stump one another by asking family members questions about yourself, such as "What is my favorite memory of a family vacation?" "Given a choice, what dinner menu would I pick?" "If I could travel anywhere in the world, where would I go?" One member of the family might prepare and read the questions aloud as each person writes down the answers. Family members then take turns guessing the answers, playing this game as a quiz show. Observe that one thing about families is that we learn to know each other well.



DID YOU KNOW...

Christmas Beatitudes

Christmas has arrived! It is, indeed, a season filled with blessings. Christ is our special gift from God. Jay Marshall, author of The Beatitudes of Christmas, tells us that through experience some of the greatest blessings come through the



most difficult challenges. Some of the hardest moments in life, in retrospect, prove to be the most beneficial. The love and goodwill at Christmas lift our spirits and restore our hope that God can direct our future, that He can find a way to touch our hearts each year.

We also know that there are some who may not experience joy and peace at Christmas. May we be the ones to change this so that Christmas may be more beautiful for everyone. Mr. Marshal suggests that this may come by reading, reflecting on and following as well as we can, these Christmas Beatitudes. Then, "perhaps, with the grace of God, the gift of Christ and the spirit of the Beatitudes, [this] Christmas can be the most meaningful and transformational yet."

- May God allow us to become poor in spirit until we are prepared for the kingdom to be ours.
- May our hearts be filled with mourning so that our complete joy may come through God's comfort.
- May we become meek, so that we can appreciate and properly enjoy our inheritance.
- May our hunger and thirst for God reach almost unbearable levels before we are filled.
- May God help us give the gift of mercy this year, so that we too may receive it in our time of need.
- May our hearts be pure, cleansed of the unnecessary Christmas clutter so that we can catch a glimpse of our Lord.
- May peacemaking become more than a cliché as we become children of God.
- May we all be persecuted, at least in small increments, so that our faith proves worthy of the kingdom we have been promised.

"Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us" (Lk 2:15)

"In the 2019 apostolic letter *Admirabile Signum*, the Holy Father (Pope Francis) explores the meaning and importance of the Nativity scene, examining each element and its significance. It offers a contemplative experience of a Christian icon that has become so familiar — helping to restore the wonder and awe that can come from contemplating it anew."

Here in our Watertown churches, on the Third Sunday of Advent, parishioners were invited to bring the Baby Jesus from their family crèche to Mass for the annual blessing of the Bambinelli. If you didn't remember to bring yours, the bulletin from that Sunday included a Blessing to be used at home as a family, perhaps as part of the Advent Wreath lighting at dinner. Get a copy on our parish website.

"Why does the Christmas crèche arouse such wonder and move us so deeply?" Pope Francis asks. "First, because it shows God's tender love: the Creator of the universe lowered himself to take up our littleness. The gift of life, in all its mystery, becomes all the more wondrous as we realize that the Son of Mary is the source and sustenance of all life. In Jesus, the Father has given us a brother who comes to seek us out whenever we are confused or lost, a loyal friend ever at our side. He gave us his Son who forgives us and frees us from our sins."

Mrs. Crowe adds "As we enter into the joyful season of Christmas, we would do well to gaze more at our Nativity scenes, wondering at the vision that was involved in our loving Father's design and execution. We would do well to look at them through the eyes of a child, imagining the lives of those characters so remarkable and yet still so human. And rightly so. The story they tell is of Jesus Christ entering the world so that we might live forever with him. It is the story of our salvation. What could be better to wonder at than that?"

We couldn't agree more. The DIY kits handed out to young families on the Second Sunday of Advent were meant to introduce these little ones to the story of the Nativity, God's love for us and ultimately to the story of our salvation.

This Christmas Weekend on Sunday we also celebrate the patronal Feast of the Holy Family. A simple google search tells us that "The Holy Family is the name given to the family unit of Jesus: The Divine Son of God Jesus, his mother the Virgin Mary, and his foster-father Joseph."


"The Feast of the Holy Family is not just about the Holy Family, but about our own families too. The main purpose of the Feast is to present the Holy Family as the model for all Christian families, and for domestic life in general. Our family life becomes sanctified when we live the life of the Church within our homes. This is called the "domestic church" or the "church in miniature." St. John Chrysostom urged all Christians to make each home a "family church," and in doing so, this sanctifies the family unit. Just how does one live out the Church in the family? The best way is by making Christ the center of family and individual life. Ways to do this include: reading scripture regularly, praying daily, attending Mass at least on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation, imitating the actions of the Holy Family, going to confession frequently, and so forth, all done together as a family unit."

"The Holy Family feast is a good time to remember the family unit and pray for our human and spiritual families. We also may take this feast to reflect on the value and sanctity of the family unit, and to evaluate our own family life. What ways may it be improved? What would Jesus, Mary, and Joseph do? Finally, we can use this feast to ask ourselves what are we doing to promote the family within our own cultures, neighborhoods, and communities."

We will observe 'the chalking of the doors' on the Epiphany of the Lord. At Mass, Fr. Mickey and Fr. Matt will chalk the church entryway doors-- and you're invited to take the prayers and a piece of blessed chalk home to mark the same inscription on the lintel above your front door:

20+C+M+B+22

The letters have two meanings: They represent the initials of the Magi—Caspar, Malchior, and Balthasar who came to visit Jesus in His first home--and they abbreviate the Latin phrase Christus Mansionem Benedicat-- May Christ bless this house.

The '+' signs represent the cross, the '20' at the beginning and the '22' at the end mark the year. Together, they are a reminder to keep Christ as the center of our lives and our relationships and are a request for Christ to bless your home—and all who live, work and visit there.


