

JAN. 9 - THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Readings: Is 42:1-4, 6-7/Acts 10:34-38/Lk 3:15-16, 21-22

In today's readings for the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, we are reminded of Advent. Prepare the way of the Lord. We await his coming again in glory. Who is this Jesus for whom we wait? In our Gospel, we have two witnesses telling us who Jesus is. John the Baptist reminds us that Jesus is mightier than he and that John is not worthy to untie the thongs of his sandal (the job of a slave). The second witness is God the Father himself. As Jesus is praying and being baptized by John, the Holy Spirit descends on him. The Father from Heaven speaks of him as the beloved Son in whom he is well pleased. Jesus, the sinless Son of God, did not need baptism. But he allowed it and showed us that he is always among us, walking with us on our pilgrimage to heaven. We, too, have been baptized, not just with water, but with fire and the Holy Spirit. As we journey back to God, do we walk alongside others who may need our assistance and encouragement in faith? Can we hold out our hand to someone who may need a little help on their journey of faith?

I want to thank Kathy Mastellon for taking care of the publication of our Church bulletin these past six months after the retirement of Judy Geng. We are now in a position to have the **bulletin coordinated out of the parish office beginning with the January 16th Sunday bulletin.** I am most grateful for Kathy's commitment and flexibility while handling the bulletin from home along with help from her husband, Deacon Kevin. The two of them have been so generous with their time and assistance since our three Churches came together in July 2020.

The children in our First Communion Program celebrated the **Sacrament of Reconciliation** this weekend as part of their preparation to join us at the altar and receive Holy Communion. The children and their parents are looking forward to the first weekend of May when First Communion will be celebrated in our Churches.

As we begin a new calendar year, we not only ask for God's blessings for the year ahead but also recognize the month of January as the "**Month of the Holy Name.**"

Throughout the month of January, we give special honor to the name of Jesus. St. Paul wrote to the people in Philippians: "At the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (2:10-11). We hold the name of Jesus in special reverence. The very name of Jesus is a prayer.

After celebrating the birth of our Lord in "Christmas Time," we now enter **Ordinary Time**, giving us an opportunity to reflect on the life of Jesus and on our vocation as Christians. We use this time to grow in our understanding of the mystery of Christ. Our readings invite us to deepen our relationship with the One whose birth we just celebrated. The readings open our minds and hearts to the miraculous dimensions of Jesus' ministry. The directive of our Blessed Mother in John's gospel - "do whatever he tells you" (2:5) - is solid advice for all disciples of our Lord. The weeks leading to Lent will cover the life and ministry of Jesus and our ultimate call to "drop our nets" and "follow him" (Lk 5:4,10).

The liturgical term "ordinary" refers to the ordering or counting of Sundays. Let us recall the psalmist prayer that learning to number, or count, our days can lead us to wisdom (see Psalm 90).

Many of us speak about "divine providence" in our ministry with others. I'd like to share the following article on the subject for your reflection written by Fr. Peter Cameron, O.P., founder and editor of the publication "Magnificat."

Divine Providence

God has loved us into existence, and that love governs every instant and action of our life. This constant, all encompassing care is what we call divine providence. The Catechism of the Catholic Church refers to it as the dispositions which God guides us, his creatures, with wisdom and love to our ultimate end. In the opening lines of the Liturgy of the Hours - known as the invitatory psalm - the Church professes of God, "he holds in his hands the depths of the earth." Which means God holds in his hands the depths of my life: all my worries, my troubles, my nagging concerns big and small, my challenges, my struggles, my phobias.

Nothing is beyond the reach of his tender, infallible protectorship. God's loving providence shepherds the minutest details of our daily life. As Jesuit Father Jean Pierre de Caussade writes in one of the greatest spiritual masterpieces of all time, <u>Abandonment to Divine Providence</u>, "Everything is part of that completeness which is Jesus Christ."

If we believe this, the only logical response is to surrender ourselves to it. The Father says through Saint Catherine of Sienna, "Whatever I do to provide for the body is done for the good of the soul, to make her grow in the light of faith, to make her trust in me and give up trusting exclusively in one's self. Fall in love with my providence!"




Scripture & Meditation

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

For cradle Catholics, baptism may be the most important step on the Christian journey that none of us actually remembers. Which is too bad! After all, the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* instructs us that baptism is "the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit." (#1213) Yes, baptism cleanses us of original sin, but it's much more than that! We need only look to Jesus to see that. Though without sin, Jesus' baptism is a turning point in his life all the same. The Holy Spirit descends upon him and a voice from heaven cries out, "You are my beloved Son." So begins the public ministry, in which Jesus would carry out his Father's saving mission. Through our baptism, at any age, we, too, become God's beloved sons and daughters. Through word and sacrament, Jesus invites us to share in his mission by turning our lives over to our Father as we embrace our Christian journey.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Baptism is often referred to as "the doorway to the Church" because through this sacrament, our sins are forgiven and we are united to Christ and his Church. It is the door which gives access to all the other sacraments. (Cf., CCC 1213) At the conclusion, the celebrant asks God to continue to pour out his blessing upon those being baptized, and send his peace to all who are gathered. As baptized Christians, we are now adopted children of God; we are disciples who are empowered, through the wisdom and strength of the Holy Spirit, to share the Good News and help build the kingdom of God on earth. Sound intimidating? It shouldn't. Each day that we "put on Christ" and do his work, God is re-creating us and making us into something far better than we could ever be on our own. Embrace this faith you have been given and go out and share your gifts and talents with others, confident in the Spirit that guides you.

SERVE Think of something you have been told you are very good at by friends or coworkers – something for which you have been "anointed," in a sense. In what way can you do something specific to lead others with care in this area, or perhaps do a very particular good yourself?

Gospel Reading: Luke 3:15-16,21-22 Jesus is baptized by John.


Family Connection

Every family has a unique identity that is defined by the behaviors, attitudes, and expectations that govern a family's daily life. This identity is influenced by the family history of the parents, but each family's expression of this history is unique. In today's Gospel, we learn that Jesus' behavior, attitudes, and expectations were governed by his identity as God's beloved Son. In our Baptism, we were made children of this same heavenly Father. This identity as members of the family of God, and as brothers and sisters of Jesus, also shapes our family's daily life.

As you gather as a family, identify some of the expectations and behaviors that govern your family life by answering the question, "What are some of the things that make our family life unique?"

Celebrate these things about your family life. Read today's Gospel, Luke 3:15-16,21-22.

Observe that Jesus' identity as the Beloved Son of the Father governed his behaviors, attitudes, and expectations. Recall that at our Baptism we were made children of this same heavenly



Father. How does this identity as a member of the family of God govern and shape our family life? Conclude in prayer together that we will remain faithful to our baptismal identity as children of God and as brothers or sisters of Jesus. Conclude by praying together the Lord's Prayer.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Thoughts to Remember: Nature

Song, music and poetry were so deeply a part of the nature of St. Francis that in times of sorrow and sickness, as well as in times of joy, he spontaneously gave voice in song to his feelings, his inspirations and his prayers. (Francis & Clare: The <u>Complete Works</u>). His canticle, "All Creatures of Our God and King" helps us to contemplate God's beauty in creation and to take good care of all animals and living things as our brothers and sisters.

This year I treasure the thought of making more time to enjoy nature.

"Let all creation help you to praise God. Give yourself the rest you need. When you are walking alone, listen to the sermon preached to you by the flowers, the trees, the shrubs, the sky, the sun and the whole world. Notice how they preach to you a sermon full of love, of praise of God, and how they invite you to proclaim the greatness of the one who has given them being."

ON OUR KNEES PRAYER CAMPAIGN: United in prayer for the Dobbs Supreme Court Case

October 22 - June 22 all are asked to pray for the protection of life in our nation.

Background: January 22, 1973: Roe v Wade Supreme Court decision began the era of abortion on demand in the USA.

• 2018: Mississippi passed a law protecting unborn children after 15 weeks of gestation, when the baby has a heartbeat, eyes that open, ears that hear, and can move and kick. The law was challenged and the case, known as Dobbs v Jackson Women's Health Organization, is being heard by the Supreme Court.

• Dobbs v Jackson is a landmark case that could potentially overturn the decision of Roe v Wade. The possibility for future laws protecting the unborn hangs in the balance.

• December 1, 2021 oral arguments for the case were heard.

A decision is expected in June 2022.

Have you ever struggled with prayer? Lack of time, focus, or understanding of what to do can all be a challenge. As Augustine Institute professor and author Dr. Michael Patrick Barber explains, prayer is critical to our relationship with God, just as good communication is critical to our relationships with our loved ones. Citing deep biblical insights and humorous personal stories, Dr. Barber offers encouragement and practical suggestions for how we can better approach the practice of prayer, and teaches the surprising importance of theological study. "The more you love someone, the more you want to know about them; and the more you know them, the more you love them."


