Richard Dawkins, the author of *The God delusion, writes "I am against religion because it teaches us to be satisfied with not understanding the world." We live in an age when many people think that choosing to have faith in Christ is a choice to be ignorant and naive. An important encyclical that seeks to bridge the gap between scientific knowledge and religious belief is Fides et Ratio (Faith and Reason). The following is an excerpt from this very important encyclical written by Pope St. John Paul II.* 

1. In both East and West, we may trace a journey which has led humanity down the centuries to meet and engage truth more and more deeply. It is a journey which has unfolded—as it must—within the horizon of personal self-consciousness: the more human beings know reality and the world, the more they know themselves in their uniqueness, with the question of the meaning of things and of their very existence becoming ever more pressing. This is why all that is the object of our knowledge becomes a part of our life. The admonition "know yourself" was carved on the temple portal at Delphi, as testimony to a basic truth to be adopted as a minimal norm by those who seek to set themselves apart from the rest of creation as "human beings", that is as those who "know themselves".

Moreover, a cursory glance at ancient history shows clearly how in different parts of the world, with their different cultures, there arise at the same time the fundamental questions which pervade human life: Who am I? Where have I come from and where am I going? Why is there evil? What is there after this life? These are the questions which we find in the sacred writings of Israel, as also in the Veda and the Avesta; we find them in the writings of Confucius and Lao-Tze, and in the preaching of Tirthankara and Buddha; they appear in the poetry of Homer and in the tragedies of Euripides and Sophocles, as they do in the philosophical writings of Plato and Aristotle. They are questions which have their common source in the quest for meaning which has always compelled the human heart. In fact, the answer given to these questions decides the direction which people seek to give to their lives.

2. The Church is no stranger to this journey of discovery, nor could she ever be. From the moment when, through the Paschal Mystery, she received the gift of the ultimate truth about human life, the Church has made her pilgrim way along the paths of the world to proclaim that Jesus Christ is "the way, and the truth, and the life" (Jn 14:6). It is her duty to serve humanity in different ways, but one way in particular imposes a responsibility of a quite special kind: the diakonia of the truth. This mission on the one hand makes the believing community a partner in humanity's shared struggle to arrive at truth; and on the other hand it obliges the believing community to proclaim the certitudes arrived at, albeit with a sense that every truth attained is but a step towards that fullness of truth which will appear with the final Revelation of God: "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall understand fully" (1 Cor 13:12).

# Pastor's Column - Third Sunday In Ordinary Time

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends in Christ,

In the first reading this weekend, we hear of how **Ezra read plainly from the book of the law of God, interpreting it so that all could understand what was read**. This takes place after the Babylonian exile in 605 B.C. which began when Judah, and its capital city Jerusalem, were conquered by the Babylonians and many of the inhabitants were taken captive and exiled to Babylon. The invading force also sought to destroy all religious texts including copies of the Book of the Law. It is when the exiles return to Jerusalem and a copy of the book was discovered among the ruins of the destroyed temple that Nehemiah and Ezra read the Book of the Law to the people:

Then Nehemiah, that is, His Excellency, and Ezra the priest-scribe and the Levites who were instructing the people said to all the people: "Today is holy to the LORD your God. Do not be sad, and do not weep"— for all the people were weeping as they heard the words of the law.

The people weep when hearing the teachings of the law of the Lord because it is clear to them that the reason Jerusalem had fallen was due to their failure to keep the commandments of the Lord. Even so, *Ezra said further: "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our LORD. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the LORD must be your strength!"* The fact that the people were able to return to Jerusalem and then be convicted of their sins by the reading of the law, meant that they were forgiven of past sins and were now invited to rejoice in the mercy of the Lord.

In the Gospel we hear of how Jesus reads the words of the prophet Isaiah:

He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord. Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him. He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

Like the Israelites of old, we too can rejoice in the Lord. Jesus has come to free us from our captivity to sin and give us the new vision of faith. Jesus has come to take away the poverty of our sin and renew us with the riches of His mercy! Each mass is an opportunity for us to rejoice in the mercy of the Lord and have our rejoicing be the source of renewed strength in our fight against sin *for rejoicing in the LORD must be your strength!"*
