*Betty Ann* will be happy to take you where you need to go!

- $\Rightarrow$  We travel to most towns surrounding Bolton for a minimal fee (\$1-\$5)
- $\Rightarrow$  Masks are worn by the rider and driver at all times.
- $\Rightarrow$  The van is thoroughly sanitized between each rider.



# **BOLTON HISTORY**

## Ice Houses

There was a time when Bolton's ponds were used not only for recreation, but also for a commercial purpose - the harvesting of ice. Farmers were the first to use ice to keep milk for market from spoiling, storing the ice in insulated ice houses on the north side of their barns. It wasn't long before every household was storing ice, either in the cellar or in ice boxes off the kitchen. Made of wood, these ice boxes had metal compartments for a block of ice and space for the storage of food. When ice was needed, a card was placed in the window to notify the ice man. Both West and Little ponds at one time or another had ice making operations. Just off Hudson Road on Little

Pond was Lamson's ice house; it did business for about 30 years. There was also a small ice house on rented land on West Pond (off Long Hill Road), where a neighborhood group stored their ice; it was later bought and expanded by a Mr. Savage of Harvard who delivered ice all over Bolton.

Ice harvesting was a good way for local farmers to make extra money during the winter months. Using specialized tools such as axes, saws, tongs, and picks, they painstakingly cut the ice into blocks and then loaded them onto a horse drawn conveyor belt up to the ice house. The ice blocks were stacked and packed tightly with sawdust or straw in the well-insulated ice houses until they were needed. By the 1930's artificial ice making, and then electric-powered refrigerators, brought the end of what had been a thriving business.
