WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

Please don't dump in the hall dumpster! I realize it's awfully convenient, but we're having problems with the dumpster getting full and overflowing.

Going to Mass on or around Christmas. I hate giving this advice, and remember, this ONLY applies in these special circumstances....But we all know that church is getting crowded on weekends as it is, and Christmas? It will be a madhouse. There's no way to accommodate everyone who usually comes, while maintaining social distancing. And with the virus cases rising so high, and concern and anxiety rising higher, the need to maintain our precautions is greater than ever.

So – THIS year only, maybe consider whether it wouldn't make life easier for everyone to go to Mass, if not on Christmas, then on the days before and after. We will have Mass Wednesday, December 23 at 6:15 p.m.; Thursday, December 24 at 8:15 a.m. and midnight; all usual times on Christmas Day; and all usual times on Saturday and Sunday, December 26 and 27. The week after Christmas Day is the Octave of Christmas, a kind of liturgical eight-day "day." If we spread out, we can help everyone have a better Christmas. AND – we will be livestreaming Midnight Mass and the 9 a.m. Mass on Christmas.

Hospitals mean well, but getting in the way of the sacraments. The problem of hospital administrators throwing roadblocks to Catholic spiritual care has been brewing for years, but now, with Covid, it is severe. Recently I tried to visit an elderly parishioner with Covid, but was refused, despite the family requesting me to visit. On other occasions, I've been refused, only to push back and be told, "OK, just this once." But this isn't really new. Years ago Congress passed a law protecting patient privacy, and one result was hospitals no longer providing visiting priests with a list of all Catholic patients. The result is that people go to the hospital and wonder why no one brought them Holy Communion.

Many hospitals will prominently display a sign listing the rights of patients. I've read these carefully while waiting, and one thing I noticed: nowhere is spiritual care ever identified! Now, this is not the mindset of most doctors and nurses I deal with. I blame this literally God-less mindset on the hidden bureaucrats who write these statements. It was not the receptionist at the hospital who wanted to keep me from a patient in danger of death; it was someone in the office. What is the remedy? YOU MUST PUSH BACK! Only if patients and their families make noise will things change. When you enter a hospital, make a LOT of (polite) noise about you being a Catholic, and you want the sacraments and no nonsense. All hospitals know how to call a local priest in any city. MAKE THEM DO IT.

Do you need Holy Communion brought to you at home? If you or someone you know is homebound, and you want to receive Holy Communion, please let me know! Parish volunteers bring the Eucharist to those who request it every Friday, and I visit on the first Friday of the month.

Please stay home if you are sick! Of course this applies to Covid, but also to any colds, flu, or sniffles, because right now, even getting a cold is a double nuisance for a lot of us. If I get a cold, big deal, right? Well, first I have to go get tested, to make sure it's ONLY a cold – and I'm guessing that's the case for many, many other folks. Second, with anxiety about Covid being as it is, any sneezing, coughing, and nose-dripping just makes things worse.

Don't be afraid to ask for the Anointing of the Sick. Anyone who has reached the age of reason who has a serious illness or condition – and that includes everyone who is over a certain age – can receive the sacrament of the anointing. Receiving this sacrament doesn't mean you are dying; it means you want Christ's healing presence while you confront life-challenging health situations. You can receive this sacrament many times, not just once. If you have any sort of serious procedure approaching and would like to be anointed, I'd be grateful if you would give me a call or email ahead of time (the earlier the better), and I'll be glad to help you.



Hail Mary, full of grace...


And the Word was made Flesh

Life Information For Everyone



Check out the Movies in the LIFE Library!

Ready to curl up on the couch with a good movie that has a great message? **The Christmas Shoes** is one of those movies! After 10-year-old Nathan Andrews learns that this will be his mother's last Christmas, he decides to buy her a special gift. As Nathan sets out on his quest, fate puts him in the path of Robert Layton, an overworked attorney who has neglected to take time for his family. It's the boy's love for his mother that inspires Robert to reconnect with what's truly important in life. **The Christmas Shoes** reveals that small miracles happen every day—you just have to be willing to see them.

“The future of the world and the Church passes through the family.”

This quote by Pope St. John Paul II deserves our attention and reflection. 2020 has been a rough year for all of us. To many of us, it seems as if our society is crumbling. The media is focused on nothing but the presidential election, COVID-19, and societal turmoil. [But there is] a crisis of even greater importance—the crisis of the family.

If the family is the building block of society, then strengthening the family is the only way back to a strong Church and a stable society. Nothing can take the place of the family. We can't *wait* for the culture to change and support the values that our parents and grandparents held. That is not going to happen. We need to *work* directly with families—mothers, fathers, grandparents, and children. There is no more important work in the Church than supporting families.

Church leaders are realizing that catechetical efforts that do not include the family are fruitless. Catholic schools that educate without the support of parents fight an uphill battle. Evangelization efforts that do not address the very real struggles families face do not hit home. The family is the hinge to all the works of the Church.

We've all heard the saying, “The family that prays together stays together.” Many of us Catholic parents feel like we should be praying as a family, but often times we struggle to figure out how to incorporate daily prayer into what can be an overwhelming schedule. However, if we start small and simple, praying with our families can be surprisingly easy and can truly enhance our own prayer lives as we witness the faith of our children and practice sharing our faith with them. Here are a few ideas that may help:

Give the day to God. As the kids sit down for breakfast, pray the Morning Offering. For little ones, this can be as simple as, “God, I give this day to YOU!” This traditional prayer can be found on page 4 of this bulletin.

Don't skip your mealtime prayer. If might feel like going through the motions, but the mealtime prayer is a powerful habit. After saying the traditional “before meal prayer” together, many families have everyone go around the table and say something they are thankful for; others pray a short litany, having everyone name a favorite saint, and the family responding together, “Pray for us.” These are quick and easy ways to “go a little deeper” and to enable everyone to formulate their own prayers.

Set a prayer alarm. Set an alarm on your phone—and have your kids do it too! When the alarm goes off, stop what you're doing and say a few quick prayers for your family, our country, and any special intentions. Pausing at noon to pray the Angelus or at 3:00 to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet (even just one decade) is a great habit. A devout man who made the commitment to stop his busy life on the farm every day at 3:00 (during what he called “the hour of power”) to pray briefly with his adult sons was blessed to be in the company of his elderly mother at the hour of his death, just like Jesus—and he died during “the hour of power.” We never know what blessings will be given to us as a result of our prayers. The Chaplet of Divine Mercy and the Angelus can be found on page 4.

Reflect on the day during bedtime prayers. Right before you go to sleep, practice saying “I'm sorry” to each other and to God for things that went badly. Ask God for the grace to do better tomorrow. Mothers and fathers can use holy water to bless each child with a Sign of the Cross before going to bed. Blessings can be given to adult children who no longer live at home by making a Sign of the Cross “in the air” in the direction where they live.
