WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

Holy Communion at the hospitals. It is very important, when you enter the hospital, to tell the staff you want to be on the list of Catholic patients. Why? Because that means you get Holy Communion on a regular basis! Although policies vary, in many cases hospitals will provide information to the local parish about Catholic patients, so that when the priest or a volunteer makes routine visits, they will call on all patients whose names are given to them. At Upper Valley Medical Center, for example, it was routine before Covid for someone to bring the Eucharist 3 or 4 times a week! But the only way you get included on such a list is if you tell the hospital you want this.

ALTAR SERVER TRAINING! ALERT! ALERT! This will be held on Tuesday, May 18 and Wednesday, May 19 from 3:15-4:45 p.m. in church. This is for boys and girls 5th grade and up – kids in later grades who missed it in prior years are welcome to sign up. You do need to attend both sessions. Permission forms were sent home with religion classes, but if yours got eaten by the dog or vaporized, please don't hesitate to call the parish office for a copy of the needed form.

Ascension observed next Sunday. Scripture is explicit on this: the Lord's Ascension to His heavenly throne took place 40 days after He rose from the dead. The resurrection took place on a Sunday; that means the Ascension took place on a Thursday, and most of the world still observes Ascension on a Thursday; this year that would be Thursday, May 13. But the bishops in Ohio (like many other places) decided to observe it on the following Sunday.

About "Beacons of Light" planning. I'll say here what I'll say at the next meeting of the Pastoral Advisory Council. The Archdiocese is engaged in another round of planning regarding where and how priests will be assigned as pastors, and – because there aren't enough priests to be pastors everywhere that may want one – how that may call for parishes to be grouped together and work together in sharing a priest. The planning assumes that in the very near future there will only be 65-75 priests available to serve as pastors. This leaves out of the equation our retired priests, and there are some other priests who are active, doing good work, but for various reasons aren't cut out to be pastors. Along with other priests, I've been attending meetings to hear how this is going. They are collecting data on the number of Masses celebrated in parishes and how full those Masses are, as this will be a factor. Many parishes have Mass schedules that reflect days of old with larger attendance and more priests, and this will need to change in order to enable priests to take care of more people without being run ragged. Similarly, where parishes are asked to collaborate, it will be necessary for some rethinking about meetings. When I was in Piqua, as pastor of both parishes, I faced a constant battle getting folks to work together, and it made things extremely difficult. No one likes these changes, but it can't be helped.

What about Saint Remy? I know everyone wonders this, and the best answer I can give is that I don't think we'll face any immediate change. I was just appointed for another term here, and Father Howard was appointed at North Star and Osgood (this is the grouping that has been considered but never implemented), so that suggests no change. Moreover, if that grouping were put in place, we would still need two priests, so this is a change that doesn't help that much. I'm writing about this because you may hear things, and I wanted you to have a clear idea. Later this year, the Archbishop will start sorting his plans, and we'll eventually hear something.

Some points about confession... We have a happy problem at St. Remy: lots of people take advantage of the sacrament of penance! Even though we have approximately seven hours of confession a week, sometimes there can be lines. Here are some things to remember to make it better for you and others:

Try to do your preparation and examination before coming into the confessional. There are guides in the prayer booklets located in the back of the blue binders that hold the hymnals.

You do not have to kneel. If you have any physical issues, feel free to remain standing or to sit in the chair provided.

Please do shut the door while you're IN, and please leave the door WIDE OPEN once you go out. Keeping the door open allows for some ventilation.

If the confessional or the times in the bulletin don't work for you, don't hesitate to contact me about hearing your confession in another place and at another time. Especially if you can't get out of the house easily, call me and I'll come to you.

Corpus Christi Procession on June 6 after the 11 a.m. Mass. If you aren't able to join in by walking, maybe come and gather along the route and join in prayer. The procession will begin around noon.


Soldiers of Christ are going Bowling!

"This is broken!" the son angrily yells as his favorite toy falls apart in front of him first thing in the morning.

"It's OK," the mother responds, gently and reassuringly. "Can I fix it for you?"

"No!" the young son continues to yell in anger. "Only Daddy can fix it! Daddy will fix it when he gets home."

The above is a recent real-life interaction between myself and my 3-year-old-son. I'm happy to report that he came to his senses about this and let me help him shortly after he stubbornly refused my assistance—for it certainly would have made for a very long day of waiting for his father to get home if he hadn't let me offer a hand. But though shortly lived, his defiance (or perhaps it was just confusion in the midst of his frustration) did get my wheels turning...I mean, isn't this the *exact* same thing so many of us Christians who struggle in our relationship with the Blessed Mother and in our understanding of her and her God-given role in our lives say and do?

"It's OK," Mary calls out, trying to gently reassure us in our sorrow. "Can I fix it for you?"

"No!" we stubbornly tell her in anger. "Only the Father is capable of helping me. I'll wait for Him!"

Long story short, when a mother offers you her helping hand, take it! If God can (and does) use little ole' us as His instruments to help others, the He can (and most certainly does) use Mary, the woman He chose to give us His beloved Son through, as one, too.

A Look at Pope St. John Paul II's *Familiaris Consortio*

Dr. Ken Craycraft, the speaker at our Valentines Dinner in February, referenced "*Familiaris Consortio*." The English title for this document is "*On the Role of the Christian Family in the Modern World*." It was written by St. Pope John Paul II in 1981. The document describes the position of the Catholic Church on the meaning and role of marriage and the family. It refers to marriage as "one of the most precious and most urgent tasks of Christian couples in our time," as "the foundation of the wider community of the family, since the very institution of marriage and conjugal love are ordained to the procreation and education of children, in whom they find their crowning." Following is a brief segment from Section 30 of this profound document:

The teaching of the Church in our day is placed in a social and cultural context which renders it more difficult to understand and yet more urgent and irreplaceable for promoting the true good of men and women.

Scientific and technical progress, which contemporary man is continually expanding in his dominion over nature, not only offers the hope of creating a new and better humanity, but also causes ever greater anxiety regarding the future. Some ask themselves if it is a good thing to be alive or if it would be better never to have been born; they doubt therefore if it is right to bring others into life when perhaps they will curse their existence in a cruel world with unforeseeable terrors. Others consider themselves to be the only ones for whom the advantages of technology are intended and they exclude others by imposing on them contraceptives or even worse means. Still others, imprisoned in a consumer mentality and whose sole concern is to bring about a continual growth of material goods, finish by ceasing to understand, and thus by refusing, the spiritual riches of a new human life. The ultimate reason for these mentalities is the absence in people's hearts of God, whose love alone is stronger than all the world's fears and can conquer them.

Thus an anti-life mentality is born, as can be seen in many current issues: one thinks, for example, of a certain panic deriving from the studies of ecologists and futurologists on population growth, which sometimes exaggerate the danger of demographic increase to the quality of life.

But the Church firmly believes that human life, even if weak and suffering, is always a splendid gift of God's goodness. Against the pessimism and selfishness which cast a shadow over the world, the Church stands for life: in each human life she sees the splendor of the "Yes," that "Amen," who is Christ Himself. To the "No" which assails and afflicts the world, she replies with this living "Yes," thus defending the human person and the world from all who plot against and harm life.

The Church is called to manifest anew to everyone, with clear and stronger conviction, her will to promote human life by every means and to defend it against all attacks, in whatever condition or state of development it is found.

Thus the Church condemns as a grave offense against human dignity and justice all those activities of governments or other public authorities which attempt to limit in any way the freedom of couples in deciding about children. Consequently, any violence applied by such authorities in favor of contraception or, still worse, of sterilization and procured abortion, must be altogether condemned and forcefully rejected. Likewise to be denounced as gravely unjust are cases where, in international relations, economic help given for the advancement of peoples is made conditional on programs of contraception, sterilization, and procured abortion.
