WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

40 Hours of Eucharistic Adoration next weekend. Pope St. John Paul II tells us, “Jesus waits for us in this sacrament of love. Let us be generous with our time in going to meet Him in adoration, and in contemplation that is full of faith and ready to make reparation for the great faults and crimes of the world. May our adoration never cease.”

Next weekend, November 12-14, we have a great opportunity to put these powerful words of St. John Paul II into action by signing up to spend an hour in Eucharistic Adoration during the 40 hours devotion that we will be having here at St. Remy. In our busy lives, it can be challenging to make time to come into the quiet and focus on Jesus’ divine presence in the Blessed Sacrament. But often times this is the very thing we need to lift us up, to give us insights into unanswered questions that are weighing us down, to free ourselves from our pre-occupation with “self,” to unlock our hearts to a new, abundant outpouring of love of God and others. Don’t miss out on this opportunity to draw closer to our Lord.

I invite everyone to participate in our Closing Ceremony for 40 Hours on Sunday afternoon at 4:00. You may be interested to know that Deacon Stephen Jones, who spent a summer working here, is very excited to be the guest homilist at this event. He would be happy to reconnect with you at the conclusion of the ceremony.

Due to 40 Hours of Adoration on the weekend, we will not be exposing the Blessed Sacrament on Thursday as we usually do. However, the elementary children will still be meeting right after school on Thursday for a Holy Hour.

Do you know who your patron saint is? My patron saint is Martin de Porres (not to be confused with the more famous Martin, Bishop of Tours), and he was born in 1579 in Lima, Peru. He died November 3, 1639. While November 3 is his feast day, in this Archdiocese, that is when we recall the consecration of our cathedral. As a result, I usually have a votive Mass for St. Martin later in the week, as I did on Friday. Martin had a hard childhood, became a member of the Dominican order, and is renowned for his success in organizing help for the poor.

If you don’t know who your patron saint is, ask mom or dad if they had a specific saint in mind when they named you. If not, you can look up your saint; and if your name isn’t a saint’s name, then you can pick your own patron saint.

What’s up with “Beacons of Light?” I got a note from Father Steve Shoup, who is the dean for the Sidney Deanery (i.e., meaning, he is the “head priest” in our local grouping of parishes). He reported that all the deans throughout the archdiocese have been reviewing your feedback and offering changes to the groupings of parishes. This sort of thing, however, tends to go through several rounds. In case you missed it, the archbishop is not expected to make a final decision until December, instead of November as originally planned.

Is this a money-grab? I know this story is circulating. In my first draft of this column, I wrote at length about why this fear is unfounded, both for legal and practical reasons. But that draft was really long and boring, and I doubted many would read it. So here’s the short answer: the changes being proposed do not make it easier or harder to “grab” your money. Anyone who has questions or concerns, feel free to contact me.

Giving Tuesday, November 30. This year, for the first time, you will have an opportunity to give to the parish via “GiveCatholicAOC.” How this works: if you make a donation online, on that day, it will come to St. Remy Parish, and just on that day, no archdiocesan “tax” will be applied to your gift. Realize that if you opt for this, there is a transaction fee for using either an electronic check or a credit card – this fee goes to the company that provides the set-up.

Watch Facebook or Flocknote for the web address where you go to make a donation on Giving Tuesday, November 30. We have not done this before, but I wanted to give this a try to see how it worked out.

Gaining a Plenary Indulgence in November. The following is taken almost verbatim from the Catholic News Agency (<https://www.catholicnewsagency.com/news/249462/how-catholics-can-get-a-plenary-indulgence-all-november-2021>). The Vatican has decided to grant Catholics who visit a cemetery to pray for the dead on any day in the month of November a plenary indulgence. Previously, this was only through November 8, but the opportunity was extended in light of Covid.

The specific November 2 plenary indulgence that one can obtain for the souls in Purgatory by visiting a church or an oratory and reciting an Our Father and the Creed can now also be done on any day in November.

LIVE YOUR FAITH

From the Deacon's Desk

The following article was written by Deacon Mike Meyer.



Today's gospel text is familiar to us. We've read the commentaries and heard the sermons: "The poor widow is an example of generosity. You should be generous like her." I suspect most of us have heard this or something similar. Sometimes I think that we are so familiar with this story that we no longer hear or even look for another meaning. So, we expect and settle for the usual interpretations.

We are not surprised when this text is used for the annual stewardship campaign. Or we anticipate its use to criticize the rich for not giving more. And we all know there is an unequal and often unfair distribution of the world's resources, reminding us that the majority of the world lives without enough—enough money, food, shelter, education, or healthcare.

All of this is valid. There is truth in those interpretations. But there is also something else going on in the story. This gospel is not simply about the treasury of money. It is also about the treasury of poverty—the riches of poverty.

Most of us, I expect, have not seen or experienced the *riches* of poverty very often. Instead, we generally tend to view poverty as a problem to be fixed and eliminated—but not in today's gospel. The poverty of the poor widow is not a problem to be fixed, but rather a virtue to be interiorized. The poor widow becomes our teacher, and we are her students, for she embodies the virtue of spiritual poverty. She has no need for the money of the rich, the long robes of the scribes, or market-place respect. She has no need for the best seat in the house, or even the appearance of holiness. The absence of the widow's "need to have" becomes her "need *not* to have." So, she does what makes no sense. She gives her last two coins: "She, out of her poverty, has put in everything she had, all she had to live on." For what else does a poor widow have to give? She has no abundance, only the riches of poverty.

The riches of poverty came not from acquiring, but from letting go. All authentic spirituality is about letting go: letting go of comparison, competition, expectation, judgment, status, reputation, appearances; letting go of the need for power, to control, to succeed, to win, to be right; letting go of our need for approval and perfectionism; letting go of all illusions we create or buy in order to make ourselves feel better. Ultimately, it means letting go of ourselves and the ones we love the most.

Spiritual poverty begins with letting go, and it always reveals the fragility of life. It takes us to the border between life and death, where there are no guarantees—only hope; where there are no answers—only faith; where there is no security—only love. This is where the poor widow lives. This is where God lives. And they live in union as one. In the face of the poor widow—the face of spiritual poverty—Christ sees and recognizes Himself.

Finding Hope

Archbishop Jose Gomez of Los Angeles wrote this week: "There is a spiritual awakening going on

in America, underneath all the controversy of our politics, the continued clouds of the pandemic, all the uncertainty about where our country is heading." The archbishop's words struck a chord with me. I have to say, I agree with him.

The words of the Book of Wisdom come to mind: "Chastised a little, they shall be greatly blessed, because God tried them and found them worthy of himself. As gold in the furnace, he proved them, and as sacrificial offerings he took them to himself" (Wisdom 3:5-6). Not to be Pollyanna-ish, but it's been proven that time and time again, trial and suffering lead to renewal. Like gold in the furnace.

With that in mind, I'd like to expand a bit on the archbishop's instinct, offering some evidence of what I've seen. This past week, the Church has witnessed marvelous conversions. These happen quietly, often without being widely celebrated or discussed. One woman was received into the church just yesterday here in my religious community's chapel in Washington, D.C. In England, the Church witnessed the priestly ordination of Michael Nazir-Ali, a former Anglican bishop.

I've also seen a groundswell for the pro-life movement. With important legal battles around the corner, America's increasingly public and ever-growing pro-life movement is bringing attention to the fundamental right of every human person: the right to life.

Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram have been filled with pictures of children dressed up as saints! The sight of so many families learning about, depicting, and sharing the stories of holiness and heroism of the saints is fantastic. I wish social media would always be filled with so many pictures of the saints!

Speaking of the saints, we have some marvelous new saints capturing public attention. If you missed the beatification of Blessed Sandra Sabbatini, you've got to take a dive into her story. Her life (she died in 1984 in a car accident) is an incredible story of a Christian living out the Gospel in the modern world. Another great saint, the American priest Father Michael McGivney (the founder of the Knights of Columbus), was beatified just one year ago today! And we recently celebrated the feast day of Blessed Carlo Acutis, our first great millennial saint!

Political unrest, economic instability, even ordeals suffered in the Church, cannot hamper the grace and mercy of Jesus Christ. Archbishop Gomez says, "The bargain of our secular society and consumer economy has always been empty and false. It could never satisfy our deepest longings or answer the questions that we all hold in our hearts: Who am I? What kind of person should I be? What should I be living for, and why? What happens when I die?" When these questions are asked, let us be armed and ready, with stories of the good things we've seen. There is, and always will be, evidence of our Lord's work around us.
