WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

DECEMBER 19, 2021

Pope Francis wants as many of the baptized as possible—of all ages—to participate in archdiocese-wide meetings taking place in January and February, 2022, to discuss how we can collectively better advance the message of salvation. Resolution of the Geoff Drew case. This is a grim matter, but it is essential to be transparent. As you may recall, Father Geoff Drew was arrested several years ago on charges of abusing a boy aged 10 at the time of the crime – something that happened before he entered the seminary. This came to light, however, after reports of interactions with teenage boys that weren't criminal, but which were, for lack of a better way to put it, weird. Namely, unwanted hugs, shoulder massages, pats on the leg, and inappropriate comments about appearance.

These latter concerns had been shared with Bishop Joseph Binzer, but he failed to share this information with Archbishop Dennis Schnurr, and likewise, did not share it with the personnel board that makes recommendations for priestly assignments. Bishop Binzer did, however, share the reports with law enforcement at the time, who found no crime had been committed by Father Drew. Bishop Binzer was removed from leading the priest personnel board. In any case, Father Drew was removed from his parish assignment and placed on administrative leave, pending investigation and resolution of both the problematic behaviors, and then, the criminal accusation from years before.

On Thursday, December 2, Father Drew pled guilty to nine counts of rape. He was sentenced to seven years in prison, with credit given for time already served. I knew Geoff Drew; our time overlapped in the seminary. I never saw anything problematic. People ask my reaction to these events. I think my disgust and anger are the same as yours.

Naturally, people wonder what this says about the seminary. All I can say is that we all had to answer a LOT of very personal questions, and we all took hours of psychological exams. But if someone is prepared to lie, I don't know how you overcome that.

Now that the criminal trial has ended and Drew's guilt is established, Archbishop Schnurr will pursue, with the Vatican, Drew's permanent removal from the priestly state.

Don't hesitate to speak up. This is a good time to say: if anyone, including a priest or anyone in the seminary, or a lay employee or volunteer, behaves in any improper manner, or worse, commits any kind of abuse or crime, <u>please do</u> <u>NOT hesitate to report it</u>! You can report such things directly to law enforcement, and if you want my help, don't hesitate to contact me.

Early Mass on Christmas. As you may have noticed, I always arrange for another priest to take the 7:30 a.m. Mass on Christmas Day. The reason is as follows. First, the Advent and Christmas seasons are always taxing, and even more so when Christmas falls close to the weekend. Second, it's not easy to turn around from Midnight Mass (i.e., falling asleep around 3 a.m.) to getting up for 7:30 a.m. Mass. Third, I can get sick, and the odds of finding help at the last minute are nil. It's one thing to cancel Sunday Masses, but imagine if I had to cancel all Christmas Masses. Having a visiting priest is a kind of insurance: if I were to get sick, there would still be ONE Mass available.

Time away after Christmas. I will be away from the parish from the afternoon of Sunday, December 26, until the afternoon of Wednesday, December 28, returning for confessions and Mass that evening.

Appropriating the Christmas Appropriators

The "woke" culture is, of course, the very latest thing these days—until the next self-proclaimed enlightenment comes along. You claim victim status, share your grievances with semi-serious drama, and scold opponents. Practicing Christians have become a ridiculed—even despised—minority in this country. It is more dangerous to your reputation and career to bring a Bible to work than dirty books. The less we talk about Jesus and Christmas—excuse me, "Winter Holiday"—the safer we are in an atheist culture. "Cultural appropriation" is just one of the grave injustices recently discovered by the "woke" culture. It is—according to authoritative sources—the inappropriate adoption of elements of a minority culture by members of a dominant culture. Most of mainstream culture has already taken Christ out of Christmas. But you might argue that, by "cultural appropriation," it continues to make money off of Him, while abusing the rights of Christians. So we have winter holiday trees, festive lights, wreaths, holiday spending without Jesus. How dare you!

I have no problem with atheists making an honest buck off Christmas. But when an atheistic culture cashes in on Jesus while impugning [attacking as false or questionable] His followers as intolerant and hateful, it's time to rise up and, well, claim victim status. How have they offended us? Let me count the ways:

They have appropriated [taken without permission or consent, especially by public authority] the **Christmas tree**. But the Christmas tree is a symbol of Jesus. In winter, what is evergreen becomes a sign of everlasting life, and it reminds Christians of the "tree of life," an image of Christ on the Cross.

They have appropriated **wreaths**. Wreaths adorn our shopping centers and businesses. But the circular shape—without beginning or end—represents God, and the evergreens represent eternal life.

They have appropriated **holly**. But the holly tree is another Christian symbol. The sharp leaves symbolize the crown of thorns worn by Jesus, while the berries represent drops of His blood.

They have appropriated seasonal **lights and candles**, but the festive glowing lights symbolize Jesus, the source of all light, the Light of the World.

The star atop the tree represents the star that led the Wise Men to Jesus. It directs us to follow the light of the Savior, just as the Wise Men found Him by following the star.

The **poinsettia** thrives during winter and symbolizes everlasting life. The shape resembles a star, the red flowers remind us of the blood that Jesus shed for us, and the white flowers symbolize His purity.

Christmas bells symbolize the hymn of the angels in Heaven, announcing the birth of Jesus and praising God: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men of goodwill."

Candy canes remind us of the staff carried by the shepherds who visited the baby Jesus—and that Jesus is the Good Shepherd who gently leads us to safety and peace.

Santa Claus brings gifts to children on Christmas. St. Nicholas forms the basis of his image.

Christmas is the season of giving—and consumer spending. The Wise Men offered Him gifts. But the greatest gift of all came from our Heavenly Father: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." On Christmas Day, we remember that the Savior is the true gift of Christmas. They can't even escape Jesus when they reduce Christmas to a "winter holiday." "Holiday" is a conflation of two words: "holy day." If they are serious about excluding Christianity, let's insist they get rid of all Christian symbolism in our public spaces and workplaces. No public displays of Christmas trees, wreaths, candy canes, festive lights, and Santa Claus. No Christmas music, ever. Not even "Santa Baby" or "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus!"

We can change this country into a workers' paradise without public expressions of generosity or joy or any public sign of Christmas. Demand honesty! Let's make our cities and workplaces look as lifeless and sterile as the concrete buildings of the Soviet Union. Our feast day, our choice! In the meantime, during Advent, Christians may continue to prepare for our Savior's birthday with a good Confession and light penitential practices: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths."

Amidst a harsh, barren, intolerant, and ugly culture, let's adorn the sanctuaries of our churches and homes with the symbols of Christmas: twinkling lights, evergreens, candy canes, and gifts—the reminders of Jesus and the sweetness of the Gospels. On Christmas Day, let's gather around the decorated Christmas tree and the Nativity Scene and sing hymns of peace and joy: *O Little Town of Bethlehem, Silent Night, Hark! The Herald Angels Sing.* At need, even throw in the Elvis Christmas album for good measure.
