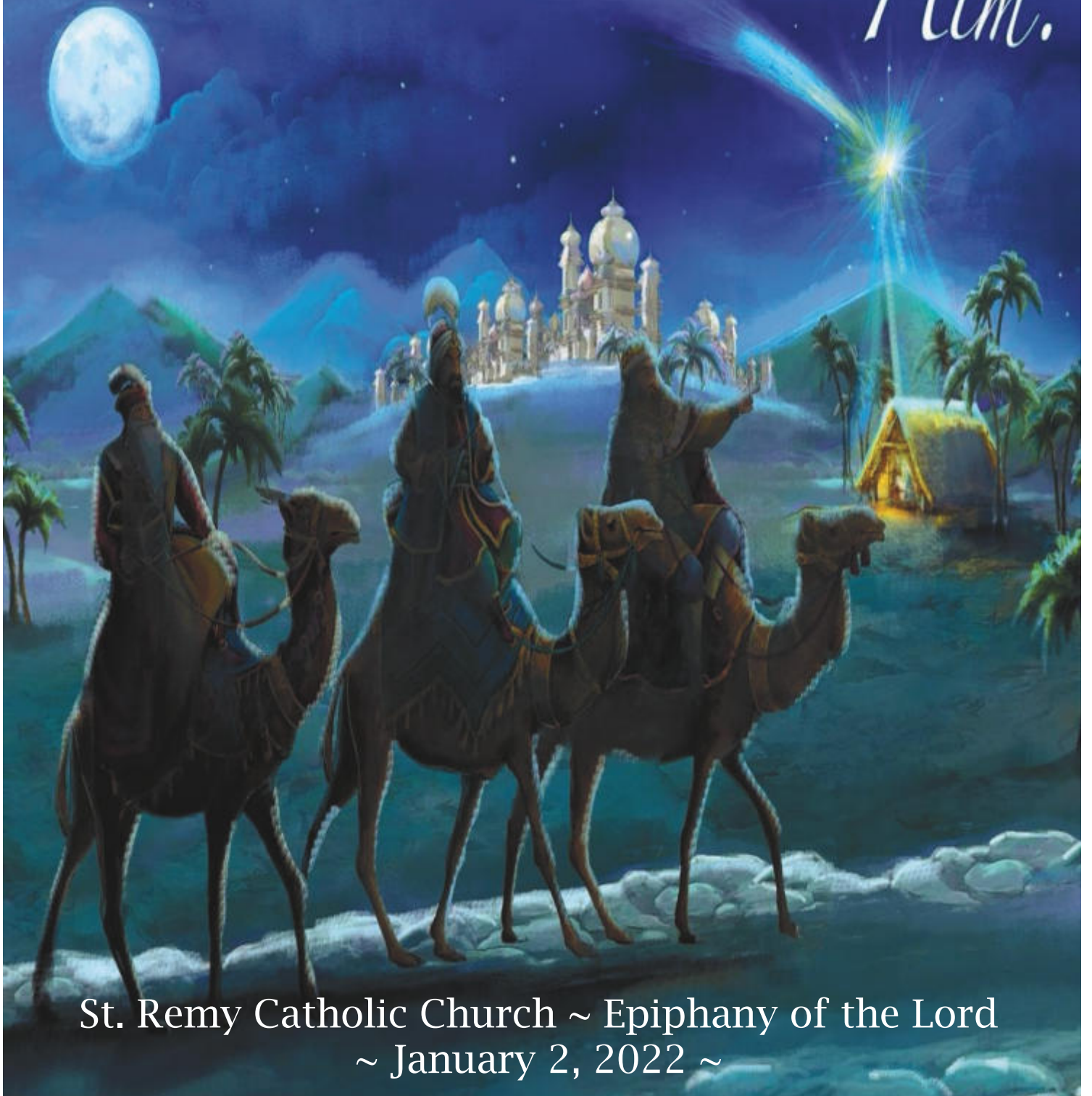

WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

Following up on proposal for Russia Activity Center. A few weeks ago, I wrote here about an idea being developed by some folks in the community: to raise approximately \$4 million in private donations in order to build an expansion to the west end of Russia School. This new facility would provide various facilities that could be used by the school, the parish, and the community.

I am bringing it up because if this goes forward, before long St. Remy Parish will likely be asked to commit to a long-term lease and agree to annual rent. The rationale for that is to help defray the maintenance costs associated with this new facility. You need to know about this, and you need to be heard before the Pastoral Advisory Council gives its recommendation either to agree to this or not.

If you are hearing about this for the first time, all I can suggest is to be in touch with Dan (Chelsea) Hoying, as he is working hard on this. He is trying to get the word out and would be very happy to explain his proposal to you.

The other reason I wrote about this is because I believe I owe it to you to explain that if this approach is what we all, as a community, decide to do, then it likely would mean that the parish will not build improved facilities on parish property in the foreseeable future. I say that because if there is a successful fund drive raising \$4 million, then it would seem unlikely that the parish would follow up with a building project of its own. So, it's a fork in the road: we go one way, we rule out going the other way.

Someone asked: "is there a plan for the parish to build something?" No one has drawn up plans, but it is an idea that has been kicked around for a while. My understanding is that the idea got some discussion many years ago but was not pursued. When Dan Hoying made his proposal, however, it got some people talking about this idea again, and so I'm sharing it with you. This is all your community, and your parish. You are the people who will write the checks for any building projects. So, I'm simply trying to encourage everyone to ask the question: "What's the best way to go?" That's all this is about.

Basically, there are three options: 1) The Russia Activity Center, that would be an addition owned by the school. 2) Although this is no more than an idea at this point, the parish could build a facility that it would own rather than lease, situated on parish property, and much closer to the church. This wouldn't have athletic facilities and would cost much less. 3) Do nothing and make do with what we have.

Speaking for the parish, I can tell you that our present arrangements aren't great. The rooms we use in the parish center, in the office basement and in the church basement are cramped and weren't intended to be classrooms. It would be great to have larger rooms giving us a better learning environment and more options for uses beyond religious education. But in the end, it's your money and your parish, so it's up to you to decide which way you want to go. Right now, I just want you to be aware and to think about what you want.

Epiphany—Being Aware of Wonder

On a summer's day in 1879, an amateur archeologist named Marcelino de Satuola went into a cave in Altamira, Spain, looking for pre-historic artifacts. He had been there several times before and hadn't found much of interest. But this day, he brought with him his 5-year-old daughter. The two of them began to explore the cave. Marcelino was studying the ground, when he heard his little girl cry out, "Look, papa, oxen!" He couldn't imagine what she was talking about until he looked in her direction and saw she was pointing to the ceiling. There, Marcelino saw the most incredible images: pictures of animals and people that had been left there over 10,000 years earlier. What his little girl spotted was later hailed as one of the greatest artistic discoveries ever. To this day, thousands visit Altamira every year to see what many consider to be the very beginnings of art. And it happened because a 5-year-old didn't look down. She looked up. She brought to that adventure a sense of wonder. Just like the magi, the wise men, in today's Gospel reading. They also looked up. And then looked forward. And then followed. They discovered something far more valuable than anything painted on the ceiling of an ancient cave. **They followed a star to the Savior of the world.** And what led them there was more than astronomy. They were led by fascination, moved by wonder. They needed to find where that star would take them.

The biologist J.B.S. Haldane once said, "The world will not perish for want of wonders...but for want of wonder." **Wonder.** That is the great well-spring that nourishes us on this particular feast, the feast of the Epiphany. That word comes from the Latin *epiphania*, meaning "manifestation." A revelation, or as Webster's puts it, an "illuminating discovery." The magi discovered the greatest illumination of all: Christ. Isaiah describes it this way: "Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come." And it has. The birth of Christ means we will finally see what was hidden. What was in shadow is bathed in light. And it begins with the infinite light of a star. But to see it, to experience it, to discover it, we need to do what the magi did. We need to have wonder. And we need to travel—to journey outside our "comfort zones" and be open to the unexpected or the unplanned.

The magi had no idea where the star would take them. They couldn't anticipate what they would find. The journey to Jesus was, for them, as it is for all of us: unpredictable, uncharted, unknowable. **And it left them changed.** As Matthew writes: "They departed for their country by another way." After encountering Christ, they couldn't travel the same road. It should be that way for all of us. After discovering Jesus, after our own epiphanies, nothing can be quite the same. [Life] is a journey. No matter the problems or detours or setbacks, we continue to move forward, seeking the Truth. Look up! Look forward. And follow. Follow the light, the light that is Christ. It leads to grace. After that, we have no choice but to live differently—like the magi, returning to our lives "by another way."

Why the Pro-Life Movement Needs More Men

Preborn babies wouldn't have life without men's role in reproduction, and preborn babies won't have the right to life without men's role in the pro-life movement. Men play an essential role in producing babies, therefore we must play an essential role in protecting babies. But too many of us have accepted the narrative that our voices aren't valid or valuable on abortion. And in our silence, our laws shout that a vulnerable preborn baby's life isn't valid or valuable either.

There are devastating costs to our silence—the cost of almost 60 million aborted babies since *Roe v. Wade* was handed down by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1973. And while we cannot buy back time, while we cannot buy back decades of our silence and inaction, we can speak up today and prevent another 60 million murders over the next 50 years. After all, men aren't really silent on abortion. The most outspoken men on abortion are men who advocate for abortion—men who manipulate and pressure women into getting abortions.

A survey by the *Journal of American Physicians and Surgeons* discovered that nearly 75% of women in post-abortive counseling were pressured into getting abortions. And they received much of the pressure from their boyfriends, husbands, and fathers—men. I know that too well. Years ago, when I was 18, I received a call from a friend. And minutes into the phone call, she asked me, "Sam, what would you say to a girl considering an abortion?" She and I regularly asked each other hypothetical questions. So I believed that was just another one of her hypothetical questions. I didn't know that question was the most pressing issue in her life. I didn't know my answer could save a life. I didn't know she was pregnant at the time. I didn't know her boyfriend was pressuring her to get an abortion. I didn't know she needed a man—me—to protect her from that pressure. I didn't know she felt helpless. I didn't know she was asking for help—my help. But I didn't know much about abortion at the time, anyway. I didn't know abortion ripped babies apart, limb-by-limb. I didn't know abortion decapitated and disemboweled babies. I didn't know that happened to a million babies in America every year. I didn't know and I didn't care. So when my friend asked me, "Sam, what would you say to a girl considering an abortion?" I answered, "I don't know." A few days later, my 18-year-old friend went to an abortion clinic, and they killed her baby.

My grief over that incident—over my failure to protect my friend from pressure and her baby from murder—is why I've become a pro-life advocate at the Canadian Centre for Bio-Ethical Reform. Since I joined the pro-life movement, I've discovered the invaluable role for men within pro-life advocacy. And apparently, abortion activists are also deeply aware of this vital role. That's why they consistently attempt to shame and silence men who want to protect babies from injustice. Pre-born babies need our voice. Pro-life women need our voice. Pro-abortion women need our voice too.
