WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

Thanks for your prayers! I feel better. Between Christmas and January 1, I came down with a virus. My Covid test was negative. Whatever it was, it seemed a slight nuisance until early Friday morning, when I was feeling much worse. My staff – who had some deserved time off – had to wheel into action to get priests lined up at the last minute. I usually do that myself, and I know how hard it has gotten to line up priests, even with weeks of notice. Thanks to Father Baker, Vonderhaar, Zink, and Batts (all retired), plus Father Eric Wood (who was visiting family) for covering Masses from Friday evening through Sunday morning. I was back at daily Mass on Tuesday.

This was an uncomfortable reminder of why changes are coming. I know people aren't happy about "Beacons of Light" creating new families of parishes, and I realize there is a lot of uncertainty. More on that below. But let me point out: what happened last weekend showed everyone how fragile our situation is. Our retired priests are tremendously generous, and this time, everything worked. But one of these weekends, when I get sick again (100% certain, sooner or later), we won't be so fortunate. One of these weekends, the parish staff will put out a last-minute announcement, via email and social media, telling you that one, two, or even all Masses are cancelled.

When I worked in Virginia, before the seminary, we sometimes had a must-do project that required "all hands on deck." The group I worked for, the National Right to Work Committee, would sometimes have to rush a mass mailing involving millions of pieces of mail out the door, and that meant lots of people working late hours to make it all happen.

Lots of employers know what I'm going to say next: Such experiences are valuable because: (1) they tell you what your staff can do or what your organization is capable of in a high-stress situation; (2) you will inevitably discover some weakness that you can later address; and (3) your staff gains confidence and cohesion because it successfully pulled off a big rush project. This is all good. <u>However</u>, it would be foolish to run an organization that way on a routine basis: you will wear out your staff, people become cynical, and you lose valuable employees.

Why do I tell this story? Because this is the situation with priests in the archdiocese, and it has been the reality for a long while. Yet it is invisible to 99% of Catholics who go to Mass weekly, and that was by design! Until "Beacons of Light," the direction higher-ups in Cincinnati gave to parish priests was precisely to keep everything going along with minimal disruption as if there were plenty of priests and always would be. Believe me, I know all this is upsetting, but one way to see it more positively is that Archbishop Schnurr pulled back the curtain and let you see the whole situation for yourself. That's a healthy thing.

I'm sorry I can't answer some questions, but don't hesitate to ASK. This is frustrating, but I can't help it. I truly want every parishioner to feel totally free to ask me ANYTHING about parish business and, specifically, about "Beacons of Light." But at the same time, there are questions I can't answer yet. Over Christmas, I know I frustrated some parishioners who were pressing me on several Beacons of Light issues, and I repeated variations of "I don't know" or "Be patient."

Until it's determined who will be pastor, and until all seven parishes in the new "family" are included in the planning, it is terribly imprudent for me to speculate. In fact, it is likely to cause harm, because anything I or any of the priests say about topics like Mass schedules is guaranteed to be repeated everywhere. Also guaranteed, it will come out like this: "Did you hear? The priest in Russia has already decided to do such-and-such, without us even being included."

The more any of us priests speculate about future arrangements, the worse we

make it. I do understand everyone wants to know, but I beg of you, be patient. We'll all know more in the next few weeks and months. It won't really be that long before EVERYONE in the seven parishes will be asked to give input – and some folks are always skeptical and cynical and say, "The fix is in." And the chattier I am now, the worse that negativity will be later.

From the Deacon's Desk

Today is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which marks the end of the Christmas Season. It is a good time to review what Baptism means for us. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* explains that there are five "fruits of Baptism." They include:

In Baptism, all sin, both original and personal, is forgiven. After Baptism, any mortal sins must be confessed. Through Baptism, we "put on Christ" and choose His way. Do our lives reflect the sanctity and purity of Jesus Christ?

Baptism makes us a new creature, that is, a Child of God and a temple of the Holy Spirit. If our Baptism has made us new, are we choosing to live and walk as temples of the Holy Spirit in the light of Christ? As a "new creature," we are given the gift of grace, participation in the life of God. We are given the virtues of faith, hope, and love and the ability to grow in goodness. Do we choose to live as an "old creature," or as a Child of God?

Baptism makes us members of the Body of Christ, the Church. No longer are we alone, but we are united to Jesus and His People, a Body that transcends time, place, and nation. Through Baptism, we become "priests" to offer our sufferings, work, families, and friendships to God. We become "prophets" to proclaim the Word of God by our words and deeds. We become "kings" to lead others to Jesus and to provide for those in need. How can we recommit ourselves as priests, prophets, and kings?

Baptism brings us into communion with Christians. Through Baptism, we share a bond of unity with all those who bear the name Christian. Mindful of this, are we praying that all of Jesus' disciples might be fully united in His true Church as one flock?

Baptism configures us to Christ, claims us as Christ's own, and indelibly marks us. When we are Baptized, we receive an indelible mark on our soul. This seal of the Christian life can never be erased, even when we fall into sin. Do we strive to proclaim Jesus as our Lord and Savior? Do we long for Heaven as our ultimate happiness and trust in Christ's promises to attain it?

2020 Vision

While last year revealed our spiritual blind spots, prayer is the key to restoring perfect 20/20 vision.

The following article was written by Sister Deirdre Byrne, MD, and was found in "Day 41" magazine, a publication of 40 Days for Life.



In 2020, ironically, it became obvious that our vision is not clear. For much of the year, many Christians under coronavirus restrictions were unable to go to church. Catholics were deprived of the sacraments of the Holy Eucharist and confession. The grace of God we receive through our worship and our participation in the sacraments allows us to stay in a state of grace, helping us to see precisely. But as 2020 wore on and churches remained shuttered, I grew concerned that "Covid cataracts" had blinded many of our faithful.

In particular, I worried that many well-meaning folks were being misled by politicians campaigning for elected office as Catholics, while trying to cover up that they were running on the most anti-life platform in U.S. history. Troubled by what I was seeing, I begged God to allow me to be a voice and an instrument for

defending human life. God answered that plea by providing me the opportunity to speak at [a 2020 National Convention]. While the event was political, I used the platform to remind viewers that the sanctity of human life transcends politics.

As a retired surgeon with the U.S. Army, I can assure you that life begins at conception. That is the science. As a religious sister, I remind you that God made each of us in His image and likeness and that we are commissioned to know, love, and serve Him. *That is our faith.* But as I said at the convention, I'm not just *pro-life*; I'm *pro-eternal life*.

Eternity is our ultimate goal. As Christians, the great news is that we are eternal in God's eyes. Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." Supporting life here on earth—especially the most vulnerable (the unborn, the elderly, immigrants, the sick, the mentally ill, and the homeless)—is our doorway to Heaven. My time serving as both an Army colonel in Afghanistan and Egypt and as a missionary in Haiti, Kenya, Iraq, and Sudan introduced me to the poor, the sick, and those fleeing war-torn countries around the world. The sick I have cared for in mission countries have so very little. In Sudan, many lived under the stars and ate whatever they could catch. When they became ill, they had little medical support. But they are incredible and so grateful for whatever we could do to provide medical care for them. They were born innocently in poverty, totally dependent on the goodness of those caring for them.

It's folks like these whom we think about when we consider the poor and marginalized. But the unborn are also innocent, poor, and marginalized. The vast number of unborn babies killed in their mothers' wombs without any afterthought is horrifying—a perpetual slaughter of innocents beyond anything Herod could have imagined.

I fear for the souls of those blindly enforcing the death of children in the womb on a mass scale. Hell is real, and the individuals who support the destruction of children (and others) will only be saved by the grace of God. We must pray for them.

We cannot fight this battle on our own—this is a battle between our Lord and the devil. Many unfortunate souls are caught in the cross-fire because they do not know Jesus. We are missionaries of Christ and we might be the only Light of Christ that those who are prodeath will ever experience. So be that light—never angry or judgmental. Remember, many who are pro-death support abortion because they themselves have experienced abortion (or someone close to them has). So, we must look on them with compassion and love. We cannot give them what we do not have. So, work first and foremost on your own prayer life. Build up your spiritual muscles. We must be rooted in prayer.


Churches are open again, so go. I encourage Catholics to spend time—even if for only five minutes—before the Most Blessed Sacrament. Blessed Francisco Maria Greco, our founder of the Little Workers of the Sacred Hearts, said, "It was before the Most Blessed Sacrament that I found that love of Jesus and the power of that love." That is also why the greatest weapon, the Rosary, will help overcome any fear or anxiety one might feel confronting the evil one.

Faith grows stronger on the front lines of a battle...and that is where we are. Stay hopeful because ultimately God is in charge, and He is far greater than the devil. We will win this battle between life and death.





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
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
