# WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

**Plans to strengthen the financial future of the parish.** Last Tuesday, our Pastoral Advisory Council meeting went much longer than usual because we did a lot of business, which I will report on over several columns. First: the Pastoral Advisory Council approved a proposal made at a recent Finance Committee meeting to invest a portion of parish reserve funds in several "Catholic-values-compliant" mutual funds. Until fairly recently, the Archdiocese required that all parish reserves be kept either in a federally insured bank account, or else deposited with the archdiocese, where those funds are invested in various high-quality bonds. This longstanding policy aimed to protect you from a foolish pastor who might squander parish savings on unwise investments. The downside is that the archdiocese's bond fund earns only 1.4%, and that is a very poor return.

More options than there used to be. A couple of months ago, I contacted Tom Twilling, the top finance person at the Archdiocese, to ask about alternatives. He told me the Archdishop had recently decided to allow parishes to invest a portion of their reserves in selected mutual funds. To explain, such funds usually invest in a mix of stocks and bonds, designed to produce far better returns, but this involves some greater risk. By risk, I don't mean that the original investment would be lost, but that in any given year, the rate of return could be small, or even show a loss. Still, the funds he recommended all have done well, earning 10-12% a year over a ten-year track record. He recommended a fund operated by Fifth Third Bank called the "Catholic Value Fund." As the name suggests, the managers of the fund avoid investing in any businesses that may be morally objectionable, such as abortion drugs or pornography. He told me that funds managed by Ave Maria Funds would also be acceptable. Right now, the parish has a little more than \$500,000 in reserve funds set aside for a rainy day. Although that is a big number, it represents about one year's operating expenses. If, for example, we had to replace our church roof, we would easily spend most of this if we didn't raise any additional funds.

Where are reserve funds are kept now. Some of our reserves are deposited in our U.S. Bank checking account. The majority of our reserves are deposited with the Archdiocese, invested in the bond fund I described above. Some people get nervous when funds are placed in the care of the archdiocese. However, as a matter of civil and church law, these funds are the property of St. Remy. We can claim them at any time, and there has never been a problem. Of the amount mentioned earlier, about \$60,000 belongs to our Cemetery Fund, which is supposed to provide reserves to safeguard the financial stability of the cemetery. However, for such a purpose, this is a totally inadequate amount of money. As a result, we rarely even tap this fund, paying cemetery expenses out of annual revenues instead.

**Building a true endowment for the cemetery.** Fifty thousand of the \$64,000 in the cemetery account will be invested in two Ave Maria funds. We will simply leave this money alone, for a long time, so it can grow. Like a retirement fund, if we let it grow, and add to it over time, in 30 years or so this cemetery fund will eventually become a kind of endowment. This would provide real security for the needs of the cemetery, generating a bit of income to offset cemetery maintenance, and taking pressure off the parish budget. Having a substantial cemetery fund gives the parish options when – many, many years from now – we have to obtain property for a new cemetery. The second recommendation was to invest \$50,000 of the parish's unrestricted reserves in the Fifth-Third operated "Catholic Values Fund." Again, the point is to strengthen the financial security and stability of the parish by enabling our reserves to grow at a better rate. At some point in the future, we may increase the funds we invest in this way, but we're taking small steps in this direction, being very careful with your hard-earned dollars.

February 12 is when we'll know more about Beacons of Light. That is when all the assignments of priests in the archdiocese will be announced. It appears likely to be a lot of moving around. Once we have this information, it will be possible to start some planning in advance of July 1, when St. Remy begins to be part of a new "family" of parishes. Meanwhile, the Archbishop has various people writing up specific guidance for pastors and parishes to take as we go forward. I call this the "roadmap," and I think it will be very helpful to have. One issue that many people seem to have concern and anxiety about is how your weekly contributions are going to be spent. I anticipate all seven parishes' Finance Committees will be meeting together, even before July 1, to review all financial information and to work out a tentative approach to those costs that will be shared by all seven parishes, including the priests' pay and expenses. I believe if we have maximum transparency, this will allay a lot of concerns.



# **Unusual Announcement During a Football Game**

heard that line watching a football game before." However, the news is not overly surprising when you learn a little more about Landry's sporting and family background.


The 23-year-old comes from a family of athletes. His father, Stan, played football at Kansas State, and his big brother, Stanton, played for the Wildcats. His sister McKenzi got a volleyball scholarship to Kansas State at the same time Landry received his.

As a result, the family members have been highly invested in each other's sports progress and have encouraged each other over the years. What is especially beautiful to see is the way the siblings, in particular, have nothing but praise for each other—on and off the field.

Stanton shared with Kansas State's "The Collegian" when talking about his brother Landry: "He's incredibly insightful, smart, hardworking, and he's always doing the right thing and caring for people, and he's just an incredible person." This was echoed by the team's head coach, Chris Klieman, who pointed out: "He does everything right off the field, in the community, in the classroom, and that rubs off on young players. Young players can see the hard work you put in." But perhaps it is this cute anecdote by Landry's sister, McKenzi, that gives us a little more insight into the future seminarian's character: "So me and Landry both got on scholarship on the same day. I called him because I'm freaking out, I'm excited, and I call him and he says, 'McKenzi, that's so cool! We have to go get ice cream.' And he celebrated me for like fifteen minutes. It was awesome." However, McKenzi was totally oblivious to the fact that her brother had also received his scholarship, and when she asked him why he hadn't told her, he simply said, "I didn't want to take away your glory."

Well, now Landry will be preparing himself to give glory to God as he follows a new path, one that isn't very common among young men these days. It's a decision that will no doubt continue to be encouraged and supported by his family, since, as Stanton shared a few months ago, perhaps unaware of his brother's future plans at that time: "We always say 'God's got a plan that's always better than ours,' so I'm very interested to see how the rest of it plays out for him."

"That which our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ did and suffered for all men, He did and suffered for each one in particular; and He would not have thought it too much to do if it had been a question of saving only a single soul.

The salvation of a soul is, then, the price of the blood of God, the price of the death of God, the price of the greatest sacrifice that God, clothed in our human nature, could possibly make! This is incomprehensible! It proves that the dignity of a soul is beyond understanding—for God to abase Himself, for God to annihilate Himself, for God to sacrifice Himself, only to save that soul and make it happy forever!

As for us, who believe humbly and firmly all that God has revealed to us, let us learn, by the contemplation of God upon a Cross, what is the value of our souls. Let us not lose our soul; let us not prostitute it to creatures; and to make sure of our eternal salvation, which cost so much to the Son of God, let us beg of Jesus Christ Himself to take charge of it, to lead us in the right way and guide us always.

Such an inestimable treasure runs too great a risk in our own hands. Let us trust it to God and our Savior. Let us make Him the Master of our liberty, which we may so easily abuse, and the abuse of which may bring about such terrible consequences.

Once abandoned to the safe and infallible guidance of His grace, we have no more to fear. He loves us too much, He takes too much interest in our salvation, ever to lose the price of His blood and His sufferings."




