Warning: defibrillators lack batteries. The batteries in the defib devices we have in church are running down and replacements are on order. Unfortunately, the replacements are delayed in delivery – another supply-chain issue.

What does IHS stand for? What about the P with an X over it? And what are the

letters "AQ"? If you look around our church, as well as lots of other churches, and lots of Christian artwork, you will see these symbols and might wonder what they stand for.



Let's start with A Ω , which appear on the front of the low altar. These are letters from the Greek alphabet: A is alpha and Ω is omega. This recalls Jesus' words in the Book of Revelation, "I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end" (Rev 22:13).



IHS is confusing because it started in Greek letters, but over time Roman (our alphabet is called "Roman" because that's where we got it) letters took their place. In Greek it is: $IH\Sigma$, which are iota, eta, and sigma, corresponding in Roman letters to I, E, S, the first three letters of "Jesus." Thus IH Σ or IHS is simply an abbreviation of the Holy Name of Jesus. The third symbol you might see is called the "chi-rho." It is two Greek letters that look like this, only on top of each other: XP. This again is an abbreviation, in this case, for the Greek word $XPI\Sigma TO\Sigma$, or, Christos – i.e., Christ.



Kprie, eleison Remember, the entire New Testament was written in Greek, which was one of two dominant languages when Jesus was born. Speaking of Greek: the words Kyrie Eleison/Christe Eleison are also Greek, for Christe, eleison Lord have mercy/Christ have mercy. Kprie, eleison

St. Remy Conference of St. Vincent de Paul "ROTO"—Reaching Out to Others



The mission of St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP) is to help others. Many St. Remy parishioners have long been involved in helping others through various efforts. In October of last year, I placed a notice in the bulletin asking for a few volunteers to help with a new ministry administered through the

St. Remy Conference of SVDP. Essentially, this appeal was sent out to potential volunteers who would be willing to help parishioners through a home visit, phone call, or check -in. The response to this request for volunteers was beyond expectation. Currently, we have 12 volunteers who are visiting the elderly, ill, widows, and widowers, or those who could just benefit from a visit to brighten their days.

I am pleased to report that the ROTO (Reaching Out to Others) group is off to a great start, due to the dedication and willingness to serve of the volunteers involved. We started home visits in late January of this year, and in the month of February alone, our group made 33 home visits, logging 32 hours.

Do you know of someone who would benefit from a visit or a contact? There are no predetermined times or durations regarding visits, and there are just a few simple guidelines. Beyond that, we try to individualize this as much as possible to the person to whom we are reaching out. Experiencing true Easter joy inspires us to long for the coming of God's Kingdom, leading us to eternal life with Him.

All of us want to be happy. It is a natural human desire, one that often eludes us. We might feel we do everything the world tells us to do to be happy, but discover that the world's recipes fail to satisfy our souls. St. Francis of Assisi has some powerful advice, going so far as to say that sadness belongs to the devil. He relates his thoughts in a series of *Conferences* that are attributed to him:

"It is only the devil and his followers who ought to be sad; we, on the contrary, should always rejoice in the Lord."

He then expands on his thoughts, suggesting two habits that will combat the devil's sadness:

"Always, my beloved Brethren, have a holy joy in God, both interior and exterior. If the servant of God endeavors to have and to keep spiritual joy, which springs from a pure heart, and is acquired by devout prayer, then the devils cannot harm him; they are forced to say, 'Since this servant of God rejoices alike in tribulation and prosperity, we cannot find an entrance into his heart,' and are unable to injure him."

St. Francis believed that the devil would do all that he could to prevent us from having a holy joy. If we want to combat that sadness, we need to focus on prayer and purity of heart:


"Therefore, my beloved Brethren, as this holy joy comes from cleanness of heart, and the purity of continual prayer, we must principally endeavor to acquire these two virtues, that thus we may have this joy both exterior and interior, which I desire so greatly, and love so much to see and feel, both for myself and you."

The devil and the world cannot provide this type of happiness. It is a joy that can endure any trial, for it is a joy that is found only in God.



As we celebrate Christ's victory over sin and death during this Easter Season, let us all contemplate the infinite power of Jesus'

Dívíne Mercy



St. Maria Faustina, a Polish nun who was canonized by Pope John Paul II on April 30, 2000, received many messages and visions from our Lord in the 1930's. In obedience to her spiritual director, she wrote these messages in a diary. *The italicized quotation below represents the words of Jesus to St. Faustina from this diary.* God, in His divine providence, chose to use St. Maria Faustina to remind the world in an exceptional way about the merciful love He has for everyone.

What does the Church teach about Divine Mercy?

The Church, by canonizing the messenger (St. Maria Faustina), canonizes the message (the revelations of Jesus to St. Faustina). Jesus requested of St. Maria Faustina a feast day in the Church to celebrate His Divine Mercy. On the day of this saint's canonization, the Holy Father officially declared that the Sunday after Easter will now be celebrated as **Divine Mercy Sunday** (on April 24 this year).

What does God want us to know about His Divine Mercy?

The concept of divine mercy is quite simple: God loves us infinitely, no matter how great our sins. More than anything, He wants us to turn away from our sins, turn toward His infinite mercy with the utmost trust and confidence, receive His mercy, and allow it to flow through us to others. Through the Passion and Death of Jesus, an infinite ocean of mercy was made available for all of us. But God, who created us with free will, will not force anything on us, not even His mercy. He must wait for us to turn from our sinfulness and ask for His mercy. Our Lord said to St. Faustina: *"This Feast emerged from the very depths of My mercy...It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter...I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day, the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fountain of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain <u>complete forgiveness of sins and punishment</u>. On that day all the Divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened."*
