

WHAT DOES FATHER FOX SAY?

How to navigate "transgender" issues. Let me address some everyday issues that may come up. "What if someone I know claims to switch from male to female (or vice versa)? How do I deal with this person going forward?" First, there is never any excuse for being rude and insulting. There is no need to avoid this person.

Some compromises are possible. Second, however strange it might be that someone you knew as "Sylvia" now claims to be "Irving," it really doesn't violate your conscience to call someone by whatever name s/he wants to be called. As far as "pronouns," it is easy to avoid conflict if you try. When I'm in your presence, the pronoun I use for you is "you," and that need never change. Otherwise, I can simply use your name, instead of pronouns.

While there are times when we need to make our points, even if that leads to conflict, the prudent and charitable approach is to seek ways to get along peaceably first, looking for middle ground.

Obviously, I'm not an expert, but it seems very possible that at least three factors may be involved in folks experiencing alienation from their own sexual identity. First, the person may have experienced some trauma, such as violence or abuse. Second, the person may have a strong negative self-image, perhaps about his or her appearance. And third, it's actually very normal for all of us, in our teen years, to feel awkward or inadequate.

If your child is experiencing these feelings, I can only suggest you seek the advice of a professional therapist, and first ask that therapist a lot of questions about his or her basic assumptions. It's absolute madness that professionals are actually saying sex isn't a biological fact, but a personal choice; but not all professionals have sold their souls to this ideology. The only advice I can offer is that people experiencing these things need love and kindness and patience, without agreeing with something that isn't true.

Many "transgender" people change their minds. There are more and more stories of people who attempted to live as a member of the opposite sex, even going so far as taking hormones and other drugs and having surgery that mutilated their bodies, only to find themselves no happier, and then returning to accept the reality of the biological sex with which they were born. It seems obvious, also, that some portion of children who claim to be "transgender" are likely to resolve their issues.

This isn't mainly a religious liberty issue. As strange as that sounds, it's true. As with several other "culture war" issues, you and I aren't actually defending any particular <u>religious</u> belief. In fact, we are bearing witness to scientific fact, and we should be wary of letting questions of objective fact being reduced to mere subjectivity.

Whether grace is real, whether the bread and wine at Mass become the true Body and Blood of Jesus, are certainly religious beliefs which we adhere to, but which you and I cannot prove scientifically, and that's OK: that's why we call it <u>faith</u>. That doesn't mean there aren't miracles and other events that point to these realities; that doesn't mean our faith isn't <u>reasonable</u>. It means that certain questions really are beyond what science can establish, and we understand that.

But what's happening now is that certain objective facts of reality are being called into question because they get in the way of people's desires. So we pretend that homosexual acts are innocuous and are, in fact, the same as the marital act. And now we must pretend that doctors merely "guess" about whether a newborn is a boy or a girl. (No, I'm not kidding, that's an actual claim being taught to children in many places as a so-called "fact.") So, in a sense, we're now called to be martyrs for the Seventh Commandment: "You shall not bear false witness." If you tell me the sky is plaid, I will politely disagree with you. If you insist I must "affirm" that a person can choose his or her gender, not only will I refuse, I must do so.

Message from Deacon Ethan Hoying

I will be ordained to the priesthood on May 21 (see invitation on page 4). I will offer my First Mass of Thanksgiving here at St. Remy on Sunday, May 22 at 1:30 p.m. An open house reception will follow from 2:30-5:30 at St. Remy Hall. All are welcome to attend the ordination, First Mass of Thanksgiving, and open house. I

will offer a blessing to individuals at the hall; if you attend the Mass but are not able to make it to the hall, please see me right after Mass to request a blessing. Blessings will also be offered at the cathedral after the ordination Mass.

You may ask, "What's so special about attending a newly ordained priest's First Mass?" When a priest celebrates his First Mass after ordination, the faithful in attendance may gain a plenary indulgence if all the usual conditions are met. The usual conditions to acquire a plenary indulgence are: detachment from all sin, reception of Holy Communion on the day the indulgence is sought, prayer for the intention of the Holy Father on the day the indulgence is sought (one Our Father and one Hail Mary suffice), and sacramental confession (usually within 8 days). If one of these conditions is not met, the indulgence is partial.

Holy Mother Church grants a plenary indulgence to all "first" Masses that the newly ordained priest celebrates. An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints (Catechism of the Catholic Church, sec. 1471). It may be applied to oneself or may be applied to a poor soul in Purgatory.

You may also wonder, "What's so special about receiving a newly ordained priest's First Blessing?" A special grace may be gained from receiving a "first blessing" of a newly ordained priest. First blessings are powerful blessings which are customarily given when first Masses are celebrated, but they may be given up to a full year after ordination. After receiving the blessing, the faithful, in a long-standing tradition of the Church, kiss the palms of the newly ordained priest in recognition of the sacred character of his priesthood and of the hands that now hold the Most Holy Eucharist and confer the sacraments. The priest's palms were anointed with sacred chrism during the rite of priestly ordination.

Deacon Hoying, a son of the parish, has prepared for his ordination for many years. Let us make a firm commitment to pray for him as he prepares to dedicate his life to Christ and His Holy Church.



Lessons on Motherhood from the Mother of St. Therese


The following information was taken from an article written by Philip Kosloski and was found at www.aleteia.org.

Do you feel overwhelmed being a mother? Are you frustrated that your kids don't listen to you? Do you struggle with balancing work, family life, and prayer? Are you afraid for the salvation of your stubborn children? If you answered "yes" to any of those questions, you have much in common with St. Zelie Martin, mother of the "greatest saint of modern times," St. Therese of Lisieux.

It was not "all roses" raising the Little Flower and her eight siblings—not all who survived past infancy. She wanted the best for her children and was disappointed when their behavior was less than saintly. For example, Zelie recounts one incident with Therese that may sound all too

familiar to a mother: "One morning, before going downstairs, I wanted to kiss Therese...so I bent down toward her to give her a kiss, but she immediately hid herself under the clothes, saying with the tone of a spoilt child, 'I don't want anyone to look at me.' I was not pleased with her, and told her so." Zelie later wrote about how she worried about Therese and her future: "As for Therese, one cannot tell how she will turn out, she is so young and heedless...her stubbornness is almost unconquerable. When she has said 'no,' nothing will make her change; one could leave her all day in the cellar without getting her so say 'yes.' She would rather sleep there."

Zelie writes of her third daughter, Leonie: "If only one could succeed in...rendering her character more flexible, we could make her a good daughter...She has a will of iron...She is not at all religious...If the sacrifice of my life were necessary to make a saint of her, I would gladly offer it." She later wrote, "I long for rest. I have not even the courage to struggle on. I feel the need of quiet reflection to think of salvation, which the complications of the world have made me neglect." In the midst of these trials, Zelie maintained a spirit of hope and prayer, daily working for the salvation of her children. She wanted them to be saints and dedicated her children to God at the moment of their birth. Her labors eventually bore much fruit, with all five daughters entering religious life. Surprisingly, the two children Zelie worried about the most are now recognized for their lives of heroic virtue: Saint Therese and Servant of God Leonie. Zelie gives us a picture of motherhood that is very human and expresses the fears and longings of all mothers. She gives us hope that if we truly desire the sanctity of our children, our most stubborn child may become the greatest saint of their generation. St. Zelie, pray for us!



On April 27, our junior high and high school religion classes had the privilege of listening to nationally known pro-life advocate Bryan Kemper of Stand True, the prolife youth outreach of Priests for Life. Here is what some of our students had to say in response to his message:

"His story was so powerful, especially because we are so sheltered here in Russia that being told about life elsewhere can be shocking. Hearing his devotion to saving the unborn was super impactful and inspiring because we now know how to get involved and help the unborn alongside people like him."

"The speech really opened my eyes to how important it is to speak up for what you believe in, even if it seems like you may have no impact on the situation."

"I have always been and will always be prolife and fight for the unborn. However, I noticed that I have been shameful of those who have conceived a child outside of marriage. After hearing Bryan's talk, I have decided to celebrate the life that they will be bringing into the world instead of shaming them."

"Bryan's willingness to share all of his struggles and experiences was a strong testament to how powerful God can be for anyone in life."
"It really hit me and had me reevaluate how I thought and made me want to fight more to save those who are persecuted."
