From the Pastor

"Let nothing disturb thee, nothing affright thee; all things are passing, God never changeth! Patient endurance attaineth to all things; who God possesseth in nothing is wanting; alone God sufficeth."—<u>Lines Written in Her Breviary</u>— St. Theresa of Avila

Dear Parishioners:

Occasionally I make reference to *The Liturgy of the Hours*, commonly know in the clerical world as *The Breviary*. To be precise, the Breviary is the book that contains The Liturgy of the Hours.

The Liturgy of the Hours is composed of psalms, biblical canticles, biblical readings, non-scriptural readings from the Father of the Church, the saints, and others, prayers, and intercessions. These are spread out through the day, thus they are prayed at different "hours" of the day.

From the earliest days of the Church, the Christian community gathered to pray several times a day. This was continued in monastic orders in the Church. Prayer several time a day became the bedrock of the monastic life. All of the 150 psalms were prayed each week by the monks.

The Breviary, the "brief" form of the Liturgy of the Hours is the book that most of the secular clergy (those priests and deacons not in religious life) use for prayer. At ordination, a priest promises to pray fully the *Liturgy of the Hours* daily for the Church; a permanent deacon promises to pray parts. Because of this duty (in Latin, *officium*) another name for the *Liturgy of the Hours* is *The Divine Office*. (*Liturgy of the Hours*, [Divine] Office, and Breviary are used synonymously.) There are stories of priests on the side of the road praying with their breviary open in the headlights of the car to finish out the duty of prayer for the day.

The breviary was jokingly called by priests, "the wife" because it went with the priest everywhere he went and was allowed to ride in his car in the passenger seat when rules precluded a female from doing so. When I was traveling, the two things I checked for repeatedly were my breviary and my passport. Everything else could be easily replaced.

The Liturgy of the Hours corresponds to the liturgical season and celebrations of The Lord, Mary, and the saints. For example, on the 25th of January, the prayers will be for the Conversion of St. Paul. The current Liturgy of the Hours comes in four-volume set: Advent and the Christmas Season; Lent and the Easter Season; Ordinary Time weeks 1-17; Ordinary Time weeks 18-34. There is also a book called *Christian Prayer*, which is a condensed version and was what we used daily at Borromeo, the college-level seminary.

The Liturgy of the Hours is not the prayer of the clergy and religious-- It is the prayer of the Church! While some promise to pray it each day, all are encouraged. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, in article 1175:

"The Liturgy of the Hours is intended to become the prayer of the whole People of God. In it Christ himself 'continues his priestly work through his Church.' His members participate according to their own place in the Church and the circumstances of their lives: priests devoted to the pastoral ministry, because they are called to remain diligent in prayer and the service of the word; religious, by the charism of their consecrated lives; all the faithful as much as possible: ... The laity, too, are encouraged to recite the divine office, either with the priests, or among themselves, or even individually."


That being said, I do not recommend rushing out to buy a copy of the *Liturgy of the Hours* or *Christian Prayer*. The current English version is in revision by the U.S. Bishops. No use spending the money on something soon to change. (Unless you want to do so).

I recommend the iBreviary app. This organizes the prayers for you so you don't have to go searching for the parts, (more on that next week). There are also websites http://ibreviary.org and https://universalis.com. Thanks to the backlit app on my phone, there is no need to pray in the headlights and I no longer have to worry about not having my breviary when traveling, (though I usually do take it with me.)

Now, where is my passport?

A reading from the Book of Nehemiah.

Standing at one end of the open place that was before the Water Gate, he read out of the book from daybreak till midday, in the presence of the men, the women, and those children old enough to understand; and all the people listened attentively to the book of the law. Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden platform that had been made for the occasion. He opened the scroll so that all the people might see it — for he was standing higher up than any of the people —; and, as he opened it, all the people rose. Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people, their hands raised high, answered, "Amen, amen!" Then they bowed down and prostrated themselves before the LORD, their faces to the ground. Ezra read plainly from the book of the law of God, interpreting it so that all could understand what was read. Then Nehemiah, that is, His Excellency, and Ezra the priest-scribe and the Levites who were instructing the people said to all the people: "Today is holy to the LORD your God. Do not be sad, and do not weep"— for all the people were weeping as they heard the words of the law. He said further: "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our LORD. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the LORD must be your strength!" The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

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Second Reading

1 Corinthians 12:12-30

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians.

Brothers and sisters: As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we

were all given to drink of one Spirit.

Now the body is not a single part, but many. If a foot should say, "Because I am not a hand I do not belong to the body," it does not for this reason belong any less to the body. Or if an ear should say, "Because I am not an eye I do not belong to the body, "it does not for this reason belong any less to the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God placed the parts, each one of them, in the body as he intended. If they were all one part, where would the body be? But as it is, there are many parts, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I do not need you," nor again the head to the feet, "I do not need you." Indeed, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are all the more necessary, and those parts of the body that we consider less honorable we surround with greater honor, and our less presentable parts are treated with greater propriety, whereas our more presentable parts do not need this.

But God has so constructed the body as to give greater honor to a part that is without it, so that there may be no division in the body, but that the parts may have the same concern for one another. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one

part is honored, all the parts share its joy.

Now you are Christ's body, and individually parts of it. Some people God has designated in the church to be, first, apostles; second, prophets; third, teachers; then, mighty deeds; then gifts of healing, assistance, administration, and varieties of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work mighty deeds? Do all have gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret?
