

For a year now, parishes in southeastern Michigan have been praying for men in the Archdiocese of Detroit to answer the call to become priests to serve in our local parishes.

This comes as the Archdiocese faces a priest shortage as we go forward. This shortage has been recognized by Archdiocesan leaders and was one of the main reasons the Archdiocese has embarked on grouping parishes into Families of Parishes.

Then in 2022, the Archdiocese didn't ordain any men to the priesthood. However, last weekend five men were ordained priests:

Ryan Walters, Michael Selvaraj, Andrew Smith, Jeremy Schupbach, and Richard Dorsch Jr.

Looking at this list of new priests, it reminds me of the ninth anniversary of my own ordination, which is this Wednesday.

I'm also reminded of my days in my seminary summer assignment because of one of the newly ordained, Richard Dorsch Jr.

Then, the 20-year-old Richard served as an altar server at St. Thecla Parish in Clinton Township, my seminarian summer assignment in 2012. He had a strong calling then to become a priest and I am happy to see he answered the Lord's call. Congratulations Fr. Richard to you and your classmates!

Richard was encouraged to become a priest by his family, friends, and church community. Encouragement from the community helps in a man's priestly discernment and is needed especially in today's world, which discourages men from serving God.

So, if you know of someone who would make a good priest, tell him, and tell him more than one time. We need priests! If we have no priests, there will be no Eucharist.



ALL THINGS CATHOLIC By Father Greg ARE YOU STEEPED IN THE HOLY TRINITY'S DIVINE AND SELF-GIVING LOVE?



To understand the Holy Trinity, we need to be open to the intimate relationship the Triune God has with us.

The most important dimension of the Holy Trinity is that it is a community of love and persons, who are a model for us.

For Catholics, the Trinity should be the primary symbol for us of community, relationship, and an outpouring of God's love.

The interaction between the Father and Son should remind us that community, relationship, and love are the hallmarks of God's life.

Celebrating Trinity Sunday this weekend, we should pray for grace to help us make those hallmarks a part of our lives and our parish.

The Trinity is the central mystery of our Christian faith and life, the Catechism of the Catholic Church says. "It is the mystery of God in Himself. However, it is the most fundamental and essential teaching in the hierarchy of the truths of faith," according to the Catechism.

We see in Holy Scripture, it's Jesus who reveals the eternal Father in relation to his only Son. And it was Jesus who announced the sending of the Holy Spirit.

It is also Scripture that depicts God as an eternal community of three persons pouring themselves out in love for one another and for us.

"God is love," the Epistle of John says and that is also

reflected in the John 3:16 Gospel passage: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son..."

The Holy Trinity has always been a community of self-giving love, which is reflected in the *Glory Be* prayer: "As it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be..."

To better understand the relationship of this self-giving Trinity, the Father <u>does not</u> create the Son and, then along with the Son, create the Spirit. The Father eternally generates the Son, who is begotten, the Word and Wisdom of God, and is of the same substance as the Father.

It is this same Word and Wisdom of God, who becomes human in Jesus Christ out of God's love for us. That's why we say that God shares in our humanity, so we can have a share in the Trinity's divinity.

The Holy Spirit, on the other hand, proceeds from the Father and the Son, and it is the Father who eternally breathes the Spirit with and through the Son as a personalized sigh of love, which comes to us in grace.

It is this sigh of love that comes to us in Baptism, other sacraments, and to us through prayer.

"By the grace of Baptism..., we are called to share in the life of the Blessed Trinity, here on earth in the obscurity of faith, and after death in eternal light," according to the Catechism.

Furthermore, it is the same Holy Spirit, who has inspired and guided the Catholic Church, despite Church leaders' sinfulness and scandal, since Pentecost 2,000 years ago.

And even today, the Trinity calls on Christ's Mystical Body, the Church, to be a community of love.

To know the Trinity, we should know ourselves, and why God created us. We are made man and woman in the image and likeness of God, a community of self-donating love. And we are to know, love and to serve God until we meet the Trinity at the end of our earthly lives.

Furthermore, with the Holy Trinity, we can never be satisfied in isolation, keeping ourselves from having a relationship with God and to invite others to have a relationship with God. We also cannot selfishly hold onto God's love and never express that love with others.

Unless we participate in the life of God and His people, we cannot understand what it really means to be Christ's disciple, steeped in the Trinity's divine and self-giving love.



RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

WE BEAR THE NAME OF THE LORD

The name of the Lord is a curiously powerful thing. Say it deliberately, even in a group of people who are not particularly religious, and you'll know what I mean. There is a shift in the mood, a change in the atmosphere. When we utter the name of the Lord. He turns His head.

No matter where you are at in your journey with Jesus Christ, this show is for you!



For the Apostles, Mary is their teacher of prayer, and being docile to the Paraclete. She teaches the Apostles to be confident in waiting for the Spirit.

Mary knew that just as the Holy Spirit brought about Jesus' Incarnation, likewise, in the Cenacle, the Spirit gives life to Christ's Mystical Body, the Church and we become beloved sons and daughters of God.

Mary is the Holy Spirit's spouse because of her love of God and her humility. Mary's faith, hope and love make her a prototype of the Church. She emptied herself and then fill herself with the love of doing's God's will.


Doing God's Will pleases the Holy Spirit, who continuously pours out graces on Mary's soul and through her the grace is spread to us.

We can learn from Mary as she lived continuously in God's presence and cooperated with the Spirit's promptings in living God's will. Her life was a Magnificat, where she magnifies God alone in everything because she is possessed by the Holy Spirit.

To be possessed by the Holy Spirit is to be loved in a perfect divine way that frees us from the vain love of ourself and the material world. Mary teaches us that docility puts us on the road to be overtaken by the Paraclete.

LET GO AND LET GOD

The Lord commanded Moses to come up to Mt. Sinai and to bring two new stone tablets with him. The original stone tablets were destroyed when Moses saw the people worshiping the golden calf that the Israelites made to adore as their God since Moses did not return from Mt. Sinai for a long time. The Lord was so angry with the people when he saw that they were worshiping a molten calf that he wanted to exterminate them. Moses implored the Lord not to strike down his people. After all the Lord brought the Israelites out of the land of Egypt with such power and with so strong a hand. Did he do this only to destroy his people? Moses reminded the Lord that he promised Abraham, Isaac, and Israel that he would make his descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky. Moses asked the Lord to relent in the punishment he had threatened to inflict on his people.

The Lord proclaimed his name "Lord." He told Moses and the people that "The Lord, the Lord, a merciful and gracious God, slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity." Moses asked the Lord to "... come along in our company." Even though they were a stiff-neck people.

In St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians, he admonishes them for creating a division among them and their lack of fidelity to the gospel way of life. St. Paul wanted them to "Mend their ways, encourage one another, agree with one another, live in peace, and the God of love and peace will be with you." St. Paul ends his letter to the Corinthians by saying, "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with all of you." This verse is one of the clearest trinitarian passages in the New Testament.

In St. John's reading he reminds us "...that God gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." We are reminded of this many times when we see someone holding the sign "John 3: 16" at a sporting event.
