

Next week we will study the Way of the Cross or also called, the Stations of the Cross. This is most appropriate for Lent.

From Our Hood in the Woods

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I once asked a contractor when I was responsible for building a two-story house for six priests what would be the most solid foundation. He suggested there were five choices to carefully ponder (I then began to realize this was not going to be a short or easy answer...I later learned it was also a trait of many contractors!). The five included: basement foundation, pile foundation, wall footing foundation, slab foundation and isolated column footing. Of course, it all depended on where the structure was being built, the soil, etc.

But there were TWO THINGS THAT CAME OUT VERY CLEARLY:

That the foundation being basically the lowest portion of a house structure would provide ultimate support to the entire structure of the house AND whatever foundation system was chosen, you must be careful it is made perfectly. Otherwise, it might fall or break down after some days.

As we continue on our 40 day journey of Lent on this Third Sunday, sojourning in our hearts in the wilderness with Jesus and each other, today's readings REMIND US OF THE IMPORTANCE OF THE FOUNDATIONS OF OUR OWN FAITH LIVES! Each reading provides us with an important dimension of our spiritual foundation as we proceed during Lent and for the rest of our lives.

In the first reading from Exodus, perhaps one of the vital parts of each of our faith foundations is THE TEN COMMANDMENTS! *Do we, first, remember what they are? Do we also understand what each one SHOULD TRULY MEAN IN OUR LIVES, and do we continue to keep these ten commandments in the essence of who we are?*

The second reading from 1 Corinthians reminds us to beware of the "stumbling blocks" which can trouble our foundation. As we hear proclaimed: *"Brothers and sisters: Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are called, Jews and Greeks alike, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God."* *Is part of the foundation of each of our faith lives during this Season of Lent that each of us PROCLAIMS CHRIST CRUCIFIED, that Christ is the power of God and the wisdom of God? What are the "stumbling blocks" in each of our own lives during this Lenten Season?*

Finally, in the Gospel of John, we encounter Christ showing justified anger in how many people used God's House for their own agendas and financial benefits. The echoing sound of scripture piercingly cuts through this story when we hear: *"Zeal for your house will consume me."* *How does "zeal" for God's House truly consume me? What would God want me to be "consumed by" in worshipping and coming to His House?*

And relative for us at this very moment: *How should zeal for God's House consume me as we continue to navigate through this pandemic as we come to worship?* Are we wearing our masks properly? Are we socially distancing? Are we even willing to consider that perhaps I need to simply and reverently receive the Body of Christ in my hand out of consideration for the Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist who are moving amongst God's People?

It's all about foundations on this Third Sunday of Lent. As I began with the foundation of the Ten Commandments in each of our lives, I now close with THE TEN COMMANDMENTS WE MIGHT CONSIDER IN OUR OLOW PARISH FAMILY:

- "You shall not have other gods besides me..." What here in our parish do we put as "a god" besides God? Certain projects? Certain organizations? The tradition and history of our parish? The way it "use to be..."
- "You shall not take the name of the LORD, your God, in vain." In what ways do we truly use God's name in our parish? What situations in our parish cause us to want to use God's name in vain? When we do not agree with something...
- "Remember to keep holy the sabbath day." After we leave OLOW on Sunday, what do we do to honor the Sabbath? If we went to the 4 pm on Saturday evening, what are we doing on Sunday to honor God? And if we are not able to be with our OLOW family in person at Mass, how do we keep holy the Lord's Day when livestreaming and afterwards. Do we believe that keeping the Sabbath holy is simply the quick fix of going to Mass and our "obligation" for the rest of Sabbath has then been honored?
- "Honor your father and your mother..." Do we honor and respect the elders here at OLOW? What do we do to remember them? Certainly, our homebound ministries have been a blessing, but what about the rest of us?

- “You shall not kill...” Do we “kill” any parishioners’ reputation, creativity, or ideas... “That’s not how we have ever done it here at OLOW before!”
- “You shall not commit adultery.” Do we enter relationships that can become unhealthy or we know are outside our boundaries, perhaps even conjecturing about some fellow parishioners or even parish staff by simply making assumptions? “Why is she/he receiving Communion? I know what they are doing...”
- “You shall not steal.” What perhaps have we “stolen” here at OLOW: another parishioner’s reputation? Another’s idea? Someone else’s suggestion...Registering to simply meet certain agendas? (And we are not talking about stealing someone’s pew! We all own the pews together at OLOW!))
- “You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.” Have we lied to fellow parishioners simply because we wanted to be popular or did not want to make some kind of commitment?
- “You shall not covet your neighbor’s house.” Do we look at other parishioners at Mass, at ZOOM Meetings or other gatherings wishing we had certain things they had, or were jealous by what they have or own?
- “You shall not covet your neighbor’s wife, nor his male or female slave, nor his ox or ass, nor anything else that belongs to him.” Do we covet certain things in other parishioners: their ideas, their outlook, their energy, their ministry? Do we even develop a certain attitude that some in ministry just “like to see themselves in the spotlight”? Do we covet other parishes nearby?

The word this weekend is FOUNDATIONS! What are we building on? Definitely important on what supports our faith lives, and to strive to be careful on how God is calling us to perfection during this Season of Lent.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Question:

What's the difference between priests and brothers, friars, etc.?

Answer:

The distinctions titles and categories used for priests and the male members of religious communities can be confusing, especially since the categories can sometimes be intertwined as a man can be both a priest and a monk, or a brother and a friar. So, to help to piece the puzzle together, it's important to begin by noting some basic distinctions:

The distinction between priests (who are ordained for sacramental ministry) and brothers (who are non-ordained members of religious communities and who are committed to lives of prayer and service).

Priests: A priest is a man who has been ordained for sacramental ministry and these fall into two categories: A) Diocesan (or Secular) Priests can either be attached to a diocese and who serve under a bishop. Their ministry is usually oriented toward pastoral service. B) Religious Priests are members of religious communities (like the Franciscans, Jesuits, Salvatorians, or Carmelites) and their lives are guided by the special mission and charism of their community. While both kinds of priest practice sacramental ministry, their spirituality and how they live out their priesthood can be very different.

Brothers: Brothers are non-ordained members of religious communities (such as those mentioned above) who live lives committed to prayer and service. Religious priests and brothers serve together in their communities and their ministries include much more than the care of parishes.

Monks, Friars, and Canons: These are broad categories that include religious priests and brothers, and each of these is connected to specific ways of life and spiritualities.

LIVE THE LITURGY

With our world in such constant turmoil and conflict, it makes such good sense to return to the simple directives given in the Ten Commandments. God's unassuming guidelines provide the perfect recipe for ordering our relationships with God, others, and even ourselves. But yet, we are so quick to glance beyond them and even remove them from public view because we foolishly believe we can create something better. Arrogance runs far deeper in the members of our society than we can ever imagine. Lent is a perfect time to call ourselves back to our foundations and the basic relationships that comprise our lives. It is also a time to remember that Jesus is the true sign of God's presence. Everything he says and does, including his suffering and death, is a sign of the God who sent him. The anger we witness when Jesus exhorts those in the temple to stop making his Father's house a marketplace can equally be seen in his anger and frustration over humanity's constant mission to turn God's creation into a secular world. We have a lot of work to do for sure.

A Special Place for Your Preschool Child Catechesis of the Good Shepherd



Coming to Our Lady of the Woods this fall of 2021, this faith formation program for preschool children ages 4 and 5 focuses on the relationship very young children already have with God but they do not have the words to express it.

In previous bulletin articles I have tried to familiarize our parish with the various elements of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd such as 1) the *Atrium*, a prepared environment, 2) the *Materials*, founded in scripture or liturgy, and the *Trained Catechist*, using the Montessori Method in religious education.

During the season of Lent we are called to deepen our prayer life, so in this article I would like to further familiarize you with the child's experience in the Atrium by addressing briefly the children's prayers.

Within the Atrium a particular area is devoted to the focus on prayer called *The Prayer Corner*. You will see a low table and next to it is a shelf containing the articles that will go on the Prayer Table: a prayer cloth the color of the current liturgical season, a Bible on a beautiful pillow, a crucifix of the Risen Christ, a statue or picture of Our Blessed Mother Mary, a statue of the Good Shepherd, and a candle. The children prepare the Prayer Table with as little guidance is necessary from the catechist. Once the Prayer Table is ready the children are invited into *Silence*. The richness of silence is important as a means to listening and responding to God. Any adult who has ever observed a child will recall that the child is capable of spontaneous prayer and sometimes it can be a period of silence, but prayer none the less. Respect and patience are a requirement for the adult.

As always we need your continued prayers for all catechists who are committed to sharing their faith with our children and youth. We do have some material needs that perhaps you have in your home and no longer need, such as a medium sized globe of the world, a wall mirror approximately 18" x 24", a square plant stand approximately 30" high-wooden or ceramic, and a child size table.

Reflections On Scripture

OLD TESTAMENT READING

In God’s revelation to Moses of His “10 Commandments,” seven of the ten Commandments regulate how we are to relate to each other. Which of these seven Commandments challenges you most?

NEW TESTAMENT READING

Paul speaks of Jesus as both the “power of God and the wisdom of God.” How could you prove Paul’s assertion to a non-believer?

GOSPEL READING

Many prefer a “create as you go” approach to life where laws and protocols primarily exist to secure and protect liberties rather than dictate and outline proper and right behavior. There are no real benchmarks for acceptable ethical and moral behavior, with a “you can’t tell me what to do” attitude prevailing. Acceptable and expected conduct seems to amount to safeguarding each other’s space rather than increasing awareness of necessary relationships that require a more refined and higher response.

We have lost our axis to the world of “anything goes” and no longer see the Ten Commandments as practical and wise guideposts to effective living. We live on “relativism island” where only a possible suggestion to “love and do not harm” may be the only standard able to be preached. While Jesus most certainly emphasized love above anything else, it was never about warm fuzzy feelings or halfhearted humanitarian efforts. The love of which Jesus spoke establishes an intimate connection with God, neighbor, self, and creation. Because this love, who is God Himself, is at the foundational core of our lives, it demands actions and attitudes that serve to build up, increase, and free up those relationships. Love requires proper conduct. Preserving and enhancing these love centered relationships is at the heart of the Ten Commandments (and the Beatitudes) and the reason for Jesus’ display of anger in the temple.

The Ten Commandments can save the world from turmoil and conflict by instilling basic moral and relational principles within us. They also hold a healthy sense of sin in balance and always remind us of our relationship with God and the freedom God offers. Our faith preserves these jewels of truth that we often look beyond, dismiss altogether, or seek to remove from public view. Human beings can be so arrogant at times. Our Lenten journey, especially when embarked upon with sincerity and resolve, can restore all of our essential relationships. When we get absorbed in life’s preoccupations and demands, things can quickly get distorted and we can find ourselves way off track. In short, we find ourselves in sin. Humanity is losing a sense of both grace and sin. We need both to understand what is real and true. Until we do, the oppressive systems and ideologies that hurt so many will never change. We will never change. We are grateful for those courageous souls who willingly embrace the conversion and hard work Lent demands and stand against antiquated systems and ideologies. They give us hope that all is not lost.




